# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

**WASHINGTON**—The reconstruction of heavy and allied industries along the Atlantic coast is a recent cement basing point decision by the supreme court and the federal trade commission convince the war planners in their own minds that those Clytemnestra plan bodies need a military adviser in this alone age. The PTC's opinion runs in this case, which was upheld by the high tribunal, said that "manufacturers of heavy machinery have a duty to save freight costs so as to lay down their plants at strategic points in connection with a national defense program."

Shipments on an I. O. basis permit manufacturers to remove from their market.

Aside from the admitted trust at alleged monopolistic practices, the underlying economic idea was that this revolutionary revision of our production and delivery system would decentralize industry. It was expected that the plan would result in the establishment of large industrial centers in various parts of the country.

**EFFECT**—But the ruling has been just the opposite effect, as any practical manufacturer or economist would readily admit. The minds of the federal, trade commission and the supreme court, not a single member of either body has had any prior experience in the fields of production or transportation.

Instead of dispersing, companies dependent on their own resources will have to turn to their sources of supply. Already several firms are transferring their operations to the vicinity of Pittsburgh.

Many corporations have notified state employment offices and local chambers of commerce that they intend to close their plants in Pittsburgh and other steel centers—Baltimore, Birmingham, Geneva, Utah, and the San Francisco-Los Angeles area.

**REALITY**—Thus the industries so vital to the manufacture of weapons and other essential products in this emergency are being concentrated in a few, comparatively limited areas where they will be more vulnerable to hostile bombing than they are under their present widely scattered distribution. This is contrary to that advised by the national resources board and the general staff.

It calls matters worse, the plants shifting steelward are what is known as "boottleneck units," they produce manufactured articles without which autos, trucks, airplanes, ships, tanks, military aircraft, defense food and military ration, and a host of war-making gadgets cannot be turned out in quantity.

**PROBLEMS**—Moreover, the concentration creates terrific problems involving local housing, health, school transportation, public utilities, and general facilities of all kinds. Instead of being a boon to the localities, it has become a burden and a threat.

California has discovered from its wartime experience the respect which the PTC and SC accord the honorable gentlemen could not have done a greener desecration to the nation's pastimes or wartime industry than the concentration of these plants.

- 1) New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania; the latter being the main point of distribution.
- 2) Maryland to survive.
- 3) Illinois, Ohio and Michigan, for the same reason.
- 4) Alabama and the Delta valley, because of their proximity to Birmingham.
- 5) California, possibly Colorado and Utah, because of their steel expansion and prospective development of new steel plants.

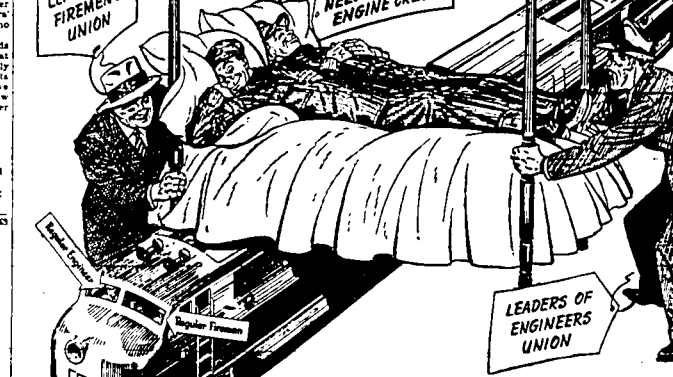

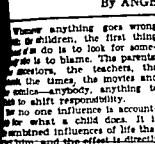

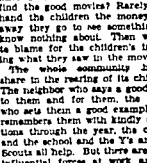

Survey Shows Ducks Still Face Starvation in Area

Ducks along Magic Valley waterways still face the imminent danger of starvation unless more feed and grit can be distributed to the birds, officials of the state fish and game department said after completing a week-long survey of the bird problem last Monday.

National Guard Helps Bird-Feeding Project

BOISE, Feb. 1 (AP)—An Idaho national guard C-47 airplane was to make an aerial survey of wildlife feeding problems Tuesday and drop corn to ducks in the Lake Lowell area and along the Boise and Snake rivers.

Robert S. Bach, who has been named federal coordinator for wildlife feeding aid, said increased funds have been assured and that feed will be forthcoming "as long as necessary."

Bach joined with T. R. Murray, director of the Idaho fish and game department, in urging all big game and wildlife feeding agencies and persons officially designated with authority to distribute and furnish official wildlife service.

The national guard headquarters at Army authorized Brigadier General John W. Hahn, Idaho national guard adjutant general, to use equipment of the 10th military division in giving assistance to the feeding project.

Bach said "indiscriminate dropping of feed may cause harm in some cases" and urged that feeding be discontinued through "federal or state agencies."

He said the fish and wildlife service is making an effort to get ducks and other birds to a planned feeding program.

He also said that "certain kinds of feed must be dropped in different kinds of areas."

The national guard C-47 Tuesday will make out surveys in the areas for migratory waterfowl and upland game birds. Corn grown in the Magic Valley will be dropped to the birds at Lake Lowell and along the Boise and Snake rivers.

When "banded" by planes, the birds would scatter. Before the start of feeding operations were begun, the birds would be banded together in large groups and banded with no fear of flying planes.

More feed for pheasants is needed in the Magic Valley, the survey showed. Birds are widely scattered in the Twin Falls area, largely because of the great amount of snow found in other sections of Magic Valley.

The state department has stepped up its feeding operation. Four thousand bushels of feed, including corn, beans and soybeans, have been moved into the district. McDermott is in charge of the operation.

McDermott urged all apartment in the area to continue working on the bird problem. He said that the amount of feed is the largest amount of breeding stock in recent years.

Millions in Area. Lately estimated more than 1,000,000 ducks are in the Magic Valley. Largest concentrations of birds are in Gooding county, where the Magic Valley, Shoshone and Twin Falls counties in the Magic Valley.

Officials also estimated several hundred thousand ducks are spending the winter in Magic Valley.

### House GOPs Ready Public Relations Bid

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—House Republicans are getting set to launch the biggest public relations and vote-lifting drive in the history of congress, it was disclosed today.

House GOP Leader Joseph W. Martin Jr., said the campaign is designed to let the voters know what the republicans are doing.

Though he denied that the plan resulted directly from President Truman's "give 'em hell" campaign, Martin conceded the chief executive's tactics did give impetus to the idea.

Charges Not Answered  
In the opinion of Martin and some other leading Republicans on Capitol Hill, Mr. Truman's sharp criticism of the 80th congress was never actually answered in the last campaign.

Martin got an okay from a conference of all the Republicans last week for the public relations project. He is to choose a publicity committee of which he will be an ex-officio member, to carry the Republican message to the people.

Mass "Eat Peas"  
"Our big job will be to let the people know what we Republicans are doing in congress," he said, "I don't think that for the last three or four years we've been telling our people the record we made has been distorted and unfairly presented. It's time we took matters in our own hands and let the people know where we stand."

Martin said the publicity committee would have a staff to prepare its messages to the people. He indicated the GOP presidential nominee that would be chosen to carry the job he has in mind.

Not Worried on Funds  
He said he didn't mind if the money would come from carry over the program. He left the issue, though, that he had a major concern.

"Will you get the money," he said, "Martin said he probably will name the other members of the committee next week. An ex-officio member will be Rep. Leonard W. Hall, New York, chairman of the House Republican congressional committee."

### Bill Is Entered to Curb Wheat Crop

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—A bill to discourage surplus production of wheat from cotton acreage in 1952 was introduced by administration senators.

The bill provides that if and when controls are clamped on the amount of acreage a farmer may plant the acreage in the previous five years shall be used as a base in determining the allotment.

Officials have expressed fear the farmers may plant as much as they possibly can this year, so as to build up a large surplus to raise controls and income in 1953.

### Big Firm Control Of Oil Is Rapped

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—The Senate small business committee has criticized the way a few big business companies control a major part of the petroleum industry from oil wells to filling stations. It said that "presents a real challenge to American ideas of free enterprise."

In ceremonies at Governor's Island and at city hall, Hodges, who led American forces in their sweep through France and Germany in World war II, gave up command of the 10th Army and retired after 42 years' service.

New 63, Hodges had served in all ranks from private to full general.

### Israel Seeks Trans-Jordan Peace Parley

TEL AVIV, Israel, Feb. 1 (AP)—A reliable source said today Israel has proposed to Trans-Jordan that talks be opened for an armistice as soon as the current negotiations with the Egyptians are concluded at Rhodes.

The proposal was transmitted to King Abdullah of Trans-Jordan last week by an Israeli official, the source said. The talks with the neighbor Arab kingdom also would be held at Rhodes either with or without United Nations sponsorship, he added.

U. S. Gives Recognition  
Full legal recognition of both Israel and Trans-Jordan by the United States has been expected to speed an settlement of the holy land war. However, this informant indicated the overture to Trans-Jordan were made before full American recognition was announced by Washington.

The same source said another proposal for three-way talks by Israel, Egypt and Trans-Jordan at Rhodes had been dropped after Egypt rejected the suggestion.

Striving for full recognition of his state, Prime Minister David Ben Gurion said last night Israel intends to seek friendship both with the United States and Russia, and to press for peaceful relations with her Arab neighbors.
