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Valley Gradually Is Shaking Off Effects of Latest Winter Blast: More "Winter's Tales" Are Told

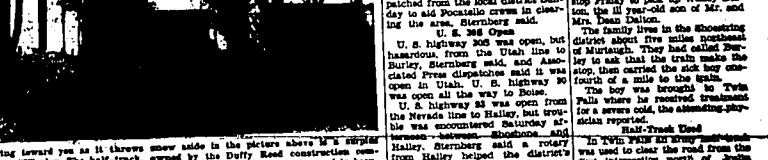

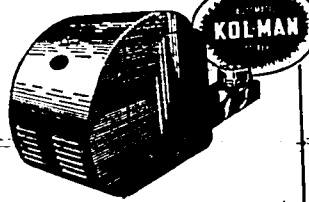

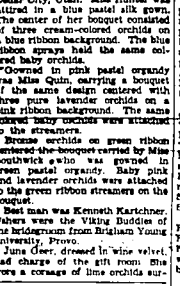
