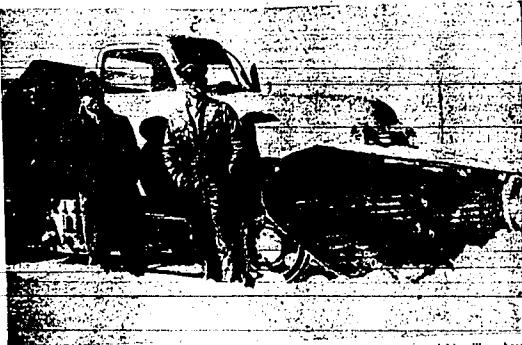

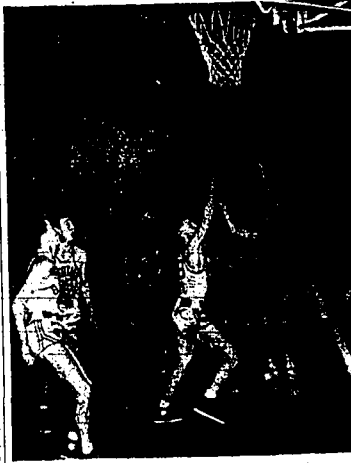

Tests Reveal Atomic Helps For Farming

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19—First results of experiments using by-products of the atomic bomb in farming are looking—in from the department of agriculture.

Most of the atomic experiments in agriculture raised more new questions than they solved. Practical information for the farmer has been delayed in reaching him.

Some new general knowledge has been gained, and before long the department's scientists hope to be able to give farmers more definite answers.

Example Is Cited

As an example of generalised information being learned, the first experiments failed to show that radioactivity itself had much effect as a fertilizer.

After the atomic bombs were dropped in Japan there were reports that enormous crops were raised on the ground exposed to rays from the atomic explosion.

These materials were mixed with farm soil in experiments in 14 states. These materials, with no fertilizer value themselves, produced rays similar to those in an atomic explosion.

18 Crops Tested

Nineteen crops were grown. Department scientists reported, "these widespread one-season field experiments indicate strongly that the farmer can not expect increased yields from money invested in radioactive materials available at present."

But some interesting information is being learned by using radioactive materials as tools. These materials become sort of a giant magnifying glass through which the scientists can watch the processes of plant life.

If fertilizer, such as phosphate, is made radioactive, the scientists can place it in soil and then trace it as the plants grown in that soil pick it up as food.

Moons Galore Awed Experts For Centuries

Hardly 240 years ago the term "moon" as a noun correctly referred to only one celestial body. To be sure, in adjectival or verbal use, it had sundry applications, ludicrous and otherwise.

Thus one could mean certain conditions it was thought, be "moon-struck." Hence came the expression "lunatic" from luna, the Latin word meaning moon. But there was only one astronomical moon in the imagination of the common man of that time, both religious and scientific.

In 1610 Galileo announced his belief that the earth was not the only world beset with moons.

Careful scanning through his little telescope through which he viewed the four small stars which always appeared near Jupiter, Galileo claimed from one to the other, were so truly moons as was the orb which he had just discovered. It was established as clear as daylight that there were "four erratic globes" performing their revolutions around Jupiter.

In his writings Galileo strongly deprecated the theories of the contemporaries to have such reverence for the old theories. He considered the new theories must be "proved" as speedily as possible. But Galileo's hindrance to advance, most finally accepted as moon, Jupiter were the little stars Io, Europa, Callisto and Ganymede.

In 1686, a sixth moon was elected to full membership in the approved lunar assembly when Huygens discovered Titan, the largest satellite of Saturn. Later that century, Cassini discovered four more Saturnian moons.

More entrancing planetary attendants were gradually spotted, and by 1815 the total list stood at 26. In 1838 Nicholson discovered two more for Jupiter, and in 1846 Kupfer found another for Uranus. The known satellites at present are: for Mercury, Venus and Pluto, none; Earth, 1; Mars, 2; Jupiter, 11; Saturn, 9; Uranus, 5; and Neptune, 1. In addition, Saturn has the beautiful ring system composed of countless little "moonlets" which revolve around the planet.

Origin of Satellites

In nearly all cases, the satellite revolves around their primary from west to east, as does our moon around the earth. The exceptions with the revolution from east to west are the three outer moons of Jupiter, the outer one of Saturn and the three attendants of Neptune. One theory holds that these retrograde satellites at one time were "independent" independent bodies, but were captured by the planets and forced to revolve in their after in revolutionary orbits. The origin of the other moons is equally hazy.

A great variation exists in the size of the moons. Those of Mars are only 3 and 10 miles in diameter. Most of the others range upward from this to that of our moon, 2,160 miles. The largest are the Jovian, Ganymede and Callisto, with diameters of 2,208 miles.

Poor Weather Delays Crews On Acid Plant

WENDELL, Feb. 15.—Construction workers are ready to complete the nation's newest phosphate fertilizer plant here as soon as weather moderates sufficiently.

Charles T. Gies, president of Gates Brothers, Inc., which is erecting the plant, said Saturday that crews were staid by waiting to resume construction on the phosphoric acid division, which will be one of the plant's major buildings.

Already completed is the main grinding and pulverizing division, with plastic crushing machinery already installed. Also in the completed stage are the chemical laboratory, where Chief Chemist A. C. McDonald and staff already have been conducting experiments and one of two spur lines laid by the United States railway.

The phosphoric acid plant, where the Gates Brothers firm will produce its own acid necessary for the manufacture of triple superphosphate, is about halfway finished, with the foundation laid and siding and roofing applied.

Gates named a storage warehouse and a second spur line by the U. S. on the yet-to-be-constructed line.

"Our most severe winter in history naturally has delayed outdoor construction work," he said. "However, we can report plenty of progress in the chemical lab and in arranging other details necessary before start of actual production of phosphate fertilizer this summer. The weather has softened considerably the last few days, and if the milder trend continues, workmen will be back on the job again next week."

The local company is building the new plant with the cooperation of the Idaho Farm Bureau federation as financial partner. Two members of the FFB are on the construction company's board of directors—John Frederickson, Malad, and Cyril Levi, Soda Springs. Frederickson and Levi are the president and vice president, respectively, of the Idaho Farm Bureau.

The new plant will obtain its phosphate ore from southeastern Idaho, where Gates brothers and the Farm Bureau own extensive acreage on two tracts near Montpelier and Paris.

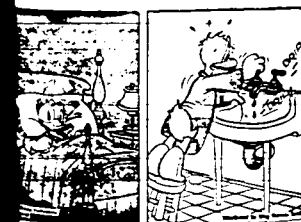

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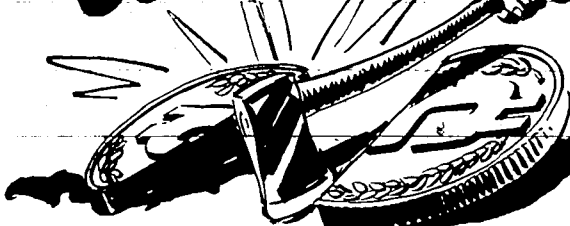
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
