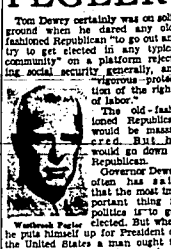

It would also do any immediate action to get the state highway department out of politics and would provide the legislators with some excuse to offer those voters who will be more interested in good highways than in political fences, come the next election.

Senator Wall was among those instrumental in killing a highway bill sponsored by the Idaho State Grange and the Nez Perce Farmers' Association to placate those who were demanding that our system of highway administration be changed.

Senator Wall stepped up with his compromise measure. In the heat of it all, he advocated a \$100,000 appropriation for a highway investigation that would be completed in time for a special session of the legislature in 1930.

Now that a huge time has elapsed, however, has he modified his political posture? The recommended appropriation has been reduced to \$50,000 and the report would not be made until the next regular session of the legislature in 1931.

As for reducing the proposed appropriation by \$50,000, that's a good idea. It would be just that much less money wasted. If he would now log out of either \$500,000 or \$100,000 and get the state together, that would be better off. Instead of the possibility of a two year delay which might result from such a political maneuver, the fight to get the state highway department out of politics interrupted and with renewed determination—even with an initiative referendum if necessary!

As former state Sen. Fred Reynolds of Fairfield has pointed out in voicing opposition to such a study, there is no reason to believe that the next legislature would pay any attention to it. Most surveys in the past have been "of no avail," he said, citing similar studies on such controversial issues as liquor and taxes, which previous legislatures have had the same results.

We don't need any studies to tell us what is fundamentally wrong with our highway department. That we already know. Give some of the engineers already in the department the opportunity to express themselves without any danger of political suicide and they'll tell us in a minute how much more could be accomplished under a system directed from politics.

So let's not waste any more money trying to find out something which we are only pretending we do not already know.

FILIBUSTERING FIZZLE

The comedy of errors at Boise is drawing to a close with the legislature bogged down over things relatively inconsequential, compared to those state affairs of far greater importance, which are being talked, pigeon-holed and indefinitely postponed.

For several days the log-rabbiting interests and clubs with selfish motives have tied the legislature up in a knot with a filibuster which serves as a ridiculous climax to the present session. They are demonstrating that unless they can force through their demands all other legislative work can no longer be done.

Idaho Scenes Inspire Hailey Artist in Her Decoration of Fine China Objects

By ROBERTA McKECHIE

HAILEY, Feb. 26—Through in hand etchings of gold and platinum upon china of the highest quality by Mrs. Marie L. Anthony, Hailey, is the drama of Idaho history in combination with the beautiful shades of the state's sage-covered plains, rugged mountains, silver streams and delicate wild flowers.

For her inspiration and designs she uses familiar flowers, colors and scenes from Idaho history. Her work is a masterpiece of such magnificent sights as the Idaho sky at sunset of sunset, the green-gold of the springtime sage, the gorgeous purple of the evening desert and other scenes and legends of her beloved Idaho.

She considers her outstanding historical work to be "Idaho," a punchbowl which was one of several pieces she made at the invitation of the Port Hall restaurant committee in 1934. The bowl has an intricate border of sunset colors with a platinum etched band in a spring design set out the state flower.

A wide band, etched in gold on the outer top, shows the first state-house built at Lewiston in 1863 beside the present capitol in Boise. Pictured around these are the people buildings and transportation of the two periods. The bowl is of people's place only with gold etched in a pioneer and broken wheel design on the base.

A composition tray, dated 1836, shows the Indian in possession of the domain, and another tray, dated 1836, depicts the arrival of the Spanish wagon along with two of their major crises—an Indian raid on a novel Idaho mountain pass and the loss of much of their goods as they crossed the Snake river. The trays are done in purple sage and platinum.

The largest piece in the group is a jardiniere which is etched in white gold upon a purple background. The date is 1849 when a permanent building was erected at Fort Teton, beginning the history shown on this piece. Mrs. Anthony uses white gold instead of silver to avoid tarnishing.

"No 'Yellow' 'then' her work is Mrs. Anthony's fund of knowledge of Idaho history, shown as she slowly turns the jardiniere and tells the story of each picture. However, so perfectly is the story told in the pictures that they plainly show the bewilderment of the Indian watching the many wagons entering his land, the trial and triumph of the settlers and the formation of the Idaho empire.

For the outline of the mountain crest, Mrs. Anthony drew the path of the Oregon Trail. The figures in the satiny etching show the early activities of the settlers, raising birds and animals, and Fort Hall as it was originally. Every detail is perfect. From the United wagon wheel to the portholes in the fort. The interior of this piece is springtime sage in iridescent luster.

Mrs. Anthony's family were Idaho pioneers, coming by covered wagon in 1866 from Canada. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. John Tinsam and several members of her family have lived in Idaho more than 60 years. She was living in Pocatello when the centennial was observed and she was invited to make her historical pieces.

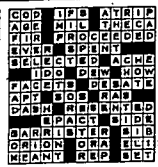

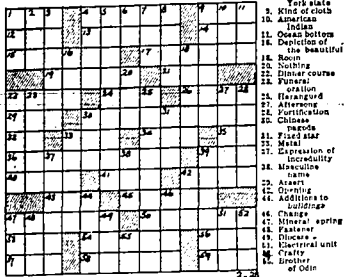
