WASHINGTON, March 1 (AP)—The agricultural department said today its legal yardstick for measuring how well farmers are doing compared with city folks, isn't much good.

That yardstick showed that per capita farm income last year was 69 percent above "parity." But, the department said, that doesn't mean the farmer is 69 per cent better-off even better off than the non-farmer. It simply means that his income is 69 per cent above a level which in 1910-1914—the base period on which parity is computed. But, the department said, it doesn't give a true comparison of farm and non-farm living standards.

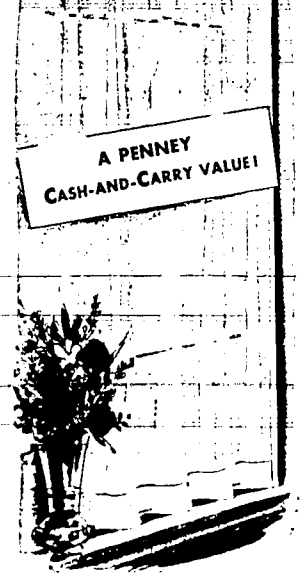

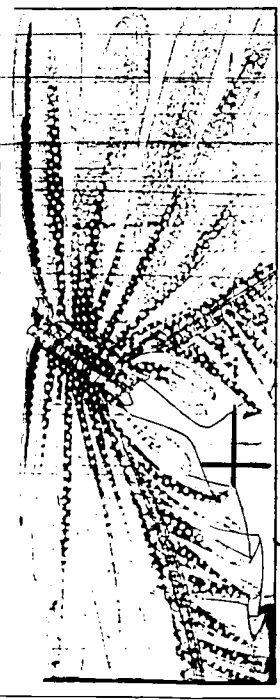

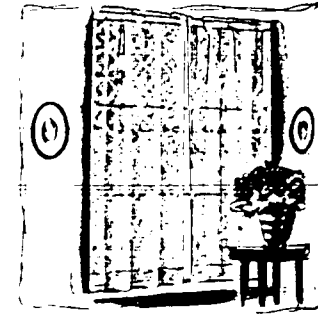
