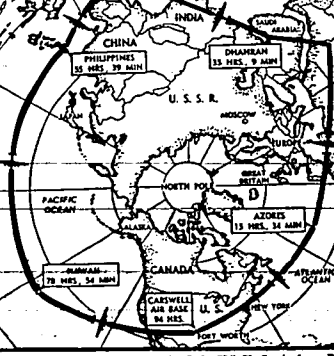

Major Issues Of Pact OK, Says Acheson

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson has said all major issues involved in the North Atlantic security pact have been settled.

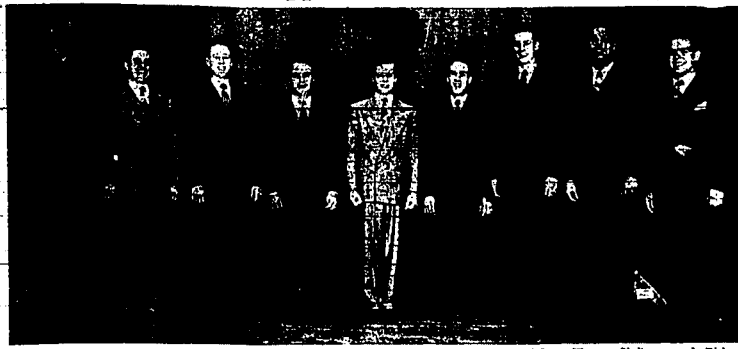
The seven countries drafting the pact, however, have not yet determined what other nations should be brought in as original signatories. The question of inviting Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg today and possibly early next week to try to win details of drafting.

The treaty would commit the United States and all other nations to resist an attack by any one of them, but each country would decide what steps it takes in fulfilling the commitment.

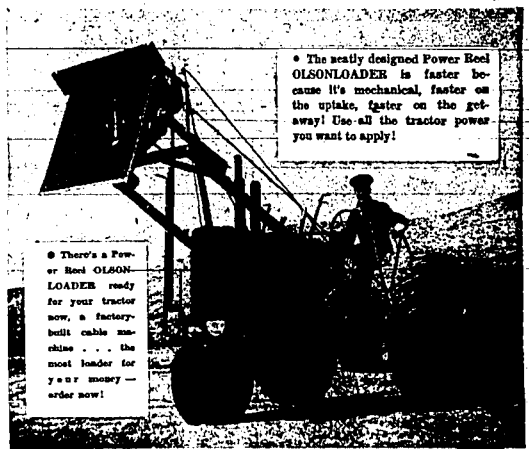
'Tail Wind' Pushes 'Jet' to Fast Speed

Elizabeth Kelly, president of the auxiliary, made the presentation on behalf of the organization. She said funds to purchase the equipment had been raised from communications received for sales of a magazine. Mrs. Anne Knight, staff public health nurse, accepted the equipment for the health unit.

Included in the equipment are an adult-size wheelchair, junior-size wheelchair, polo pack heater, adjustable crutches, four rubber crutch pads and two rubber cushions.

Miss Kelly pointed out that recovery of some patients has been retarded because the proper equipment had not been available. She said the auxiliary had purchased the equipment in an effort to hasten the recovery of patients who could not afford to purchase such items.

Truman Asks 25 Million for Flood Relief

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—President Truman has asked the senate for a \$25,000,000 emergency appropriation to meet a potentially untold flood hazard in the hard-stricken west.

Mr. Truman acted shortly after the agriculture department took steps that could lead to removal of sizable grain supplies from possible flood areas.

Loans Are Called

The department started calling loans to growers on grain stored under its price support program in lowland areas—mostly on farms. If the farmer-borrowers decide to turn over the grain to the government in lieu of payment the grain then could be moved elsewhere.

The money advanced by Mr. Truman for use in advance flood control steps would be spent by army engineers. What the president actually did was to ask the senate to boost the \$2,000,000 already voted by the house for the purpose. Mr. Truman said conditions indicate a need for \$22,000,000 more.

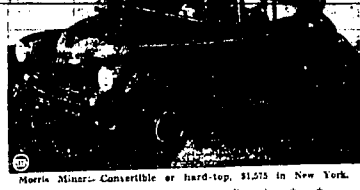

Pocket-Sized Radio Device Is Perfected

FORT MONMOUTH, N. J., March 3 (AP)—A radio receiver and transmitter as small as a king-size package of cigarettes has been perfected, the U. S. army signal corps announced today. It weighs 11 ounces. The tiny radio "station" will be exhibited for the first time at the Institute of Radio Engineers exhibit in New York City, opening Monday, the signal corps said. 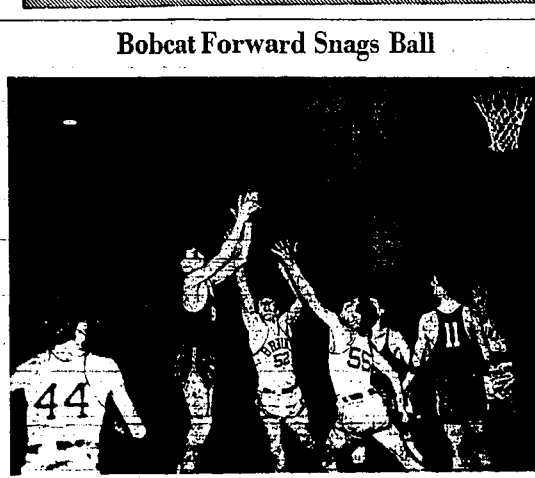

"Atomic" Ore Being Hunted Around State

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, March 3.—Dean A. W. Fahrenwald has traded gold pans for Geiger counters? Dean A. W. Fahrenwald of the University of Idaho school of mines has begun to wonder.

Correspondence during the past year to the Idaho Bureau of Geology, of which Dean Fahrenwald is the director, would indicate that he is interested in uranium. Most people realize that Geiger counters are used there in the Idaho mountains searching for radioactive material. Letters to the bureau have asked about uranium, at present the most sought for of the radioactive minerals, and how to interpret the antics of a Geiger counter.

Leaflet issued

To meet this new turn in mineral hunting the bureau has just issued a leaflet containing hints on uranium and thorium prospecting. It was prepared by Lewis S. Prater, metallurgist with the bureau.

Some 100 minerals are known to contain uranium but of these only two are commercially significant as sources of the metal.

Prater writes, "These are pitchblende and carnotite."

Thorium is of particular interest in Idaho because it is a constituent of the monazite present in many of the placers in the state. At present, however, thorium is not being used as a source of atomic energy. Monazite is of commercial value for its rare earth content. The thorium, however, is being recovered and that which is not used for gas uranium and other uses is being stock piled.

Methods Told

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Secretary of the Interior, Harold I. Krug, said today there is a long delay in settling the court dispute over the ownership of oil bearing titlelands in the Gulf of Mexico. He said it may become necessary to develop them as naval oil reserves. It was reported today Krug told a news conference. President has authority to direct naval development of the submerged oil fields, ownership of which currently is in dispute between the federal government and the states. He said he prefers the normal procedure of granting oil development leases to private operators. He said if the delay continues indefinitely consideration must be given government action.

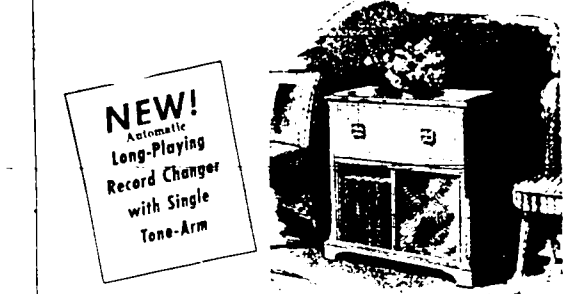
