

Proposed Western Atomic Plant To Be 'Major New Installation'

SPRINGFIELD, March 8 (AP)—A
newly proposed atomic power plant
will become a major new installation
in the next four years,
according to a report today
issued by the Atomic Energy
Commission. The report
revealed the new plant will be
located in the western United States
and will be the largest atomic power
plant yet constructed in this country.
The report, which was issued
after a study of the feasibility
of building a large atomic power
plant in the western United States,
concluded that such a plant
would be a major new installation
in the atomic energy industry.
The report also stated that
the construction of such a plant
would require the development
of a new type of atomic reactor

**Senate Group
Approves Full
ECA Request**

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—The full \$5,500,000,000 the administration asked for the second installment of the Marshall plan was approved last night by the senate foreign relations committee, 13 to 0.

The committee added an amendment encouraging the "unification of Europe" despite objections from Chairman Connally, D., Tex., that it would give a "holier point" to Russia, which charges the U. S. with dictating to foreign nations.

The committee decided against making any cuts at this time in the \$5,500,000,000, which is designed to speed recovery of western Europe. Price fluctuations are too uncertain, committee leaders felt, to warrant a cut now, but several senators reserved the right to ask one later.

The committee made a significant decision not to turn ECA into an instrument for supporting the domestic commodity market.

ECA Chief Paul Hoffman was directed by a statement in the record to "give sympathetic consideration" to the U. S. economy in commodity purchases. But this was not made mandatory.

Wherever possible, Hoffman is to purchase surplus American farm products. But the only mandatory provision on commodity buying is that 15 per cent of the wheat shipped to Europe must be in the form of flour.

The fund authorized in the measure is the second installment of the Marshall plan. To become law, the bill must be passed by the senate and house and signed by the President. Then an actual appropriation bill to carry out the program must be passed by congress.

Connally predicted that the bill will win senate approval.

Kentucky drew 167 first-place votes in the poll. The Wildcats led the poll in the last week of balloting this season. And virtually all of those who didn't put the Wildcats on top, gave them second place.

Entering two tourneys. Heading into the national eastern tournament and the national NCAA elimination next week, Kentucky rolled up a total of 1,248 points in the usual 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 scoring system.

Wabash fell from seventh to ninth. Bowling Green of Ohio dropped back one place to tenth. The second ten showed even greater changes than usual in this phase. Indiana followed by Utah, North Carolina State, Villanova, UCLA, Loyola of Chicago, Wyoming, Butler, Hamilton and Ohio State.

Two of Every Nine Nimrods Go Game in U.S. Forests Last Year

WASHINGTON, March 8—About two of every nine big game hunters in the Alaskan national forests, succeeded in bagging their quarry last year, the forest said Monday.

Annual reports of forest supervisors showed that 1,200,000 hunters killed all 900 animals on government forest lands in 1948. Deer, elk, bear and other animals made up the total.

Despite the kill, the forest service said, the big game population in the U.S. national forests increased 66,000 over the 1927-28 season. This was the smallest increase in years and reported trend that has prevailed for 25 years, the agency added.

Many big game areas now are fully stocked and some are overstocked, the forest service said. In very few areas are there indications of "open woods."

Deer accounted for 233,000 of the 900 animals killed. Other figures: Elk, 220,000; moose, 45,000; caribou, 15,000; sheep, 200,000; and mountain goat, 120,000.

In region 2, comprising forest in Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota and eastern Wyoming, slightly more than every eighth hunter killed with his "kill." About the same ratio prevailed in region 4, including Utah, Nevada, Idaho, Oregon, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and southern Idaho.

70 Arrested for Game Violations During February

BOLING, March 8—The state fish and game department made 70 arrests during February. Director T. B. Murray announced today.

He said that 44 of those arrested were trappers who had failed to report their catch. This, he said, showed that conservation officers must what they said when they advised trappers that the law requires reports would have to be observed. Fines were on an average of \$10 for each offense.

The other 26 arrests were for a variety of violations, 11 of those involving big game cases. Three involved fishing in closed waters and three unlawful bird shooting.

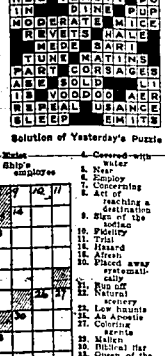

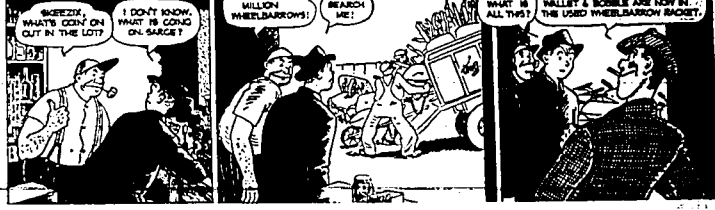

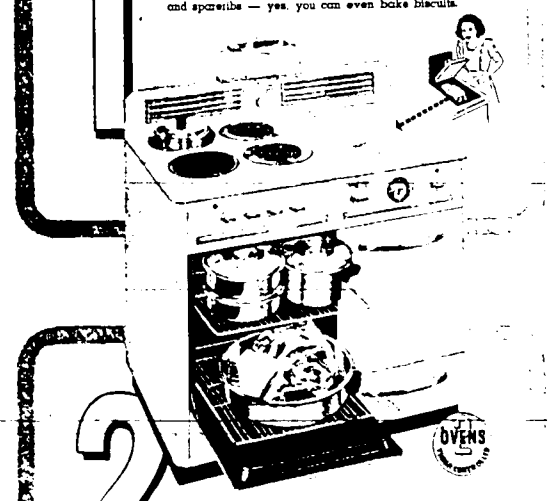
