### Appropriation Group Boosts Medical Fund

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—Millions of dollars more in federal funds to fight cancer, heart disease and mental illness have been approved by the house appropriations committee.

In each instance, the committee recommended a greater appropriation than had been asked in President Truman's budget.

The funds were set up in a \$2,211,974,000 labor department-federal security agency appropriation bill to be debated by the house today. The measure also carries money to finance the national medication board and the railroad retirement board.

FSA Gets Bulk

The federal security agency gets the bulk of the money—\$1,478,000,000, of which \$1,038,000,000 is to match state payments of old-age assistance and aid to dependent children and blind persons.

On the health front, the committee recommended:

- For cancer research and control, \$16,400,000 in cash and \$5,000,000 in contract authority, an increase of \$4,600,000 over budget requests.
- For the national heart institute, \$80,000.

The rodeo grounds will be the scene of all performances and good specialty acts are being lined up according to Cameron. The performance will be staged at night. A carnival also has been arranged.

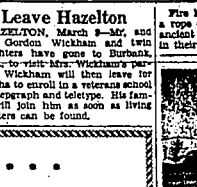
