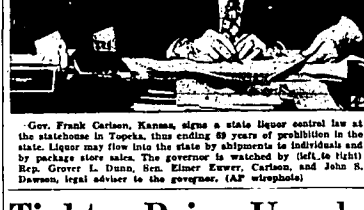

Soviet Forces Not Geared to Land-Sea War

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—Top American military strategists believe Soviet forces do not have what it takes to attack continental United States by air or sea, it was learned today.

In fact, a high military authority said, Russia is not equipped to carry out anywhere in the world "large-scale amphibious operations" because of the "allies during World War II."

Consequently, U. S. military leaders are basing their strategic plans on the premise that if Russia, now militarily, she will do so on land. This could include attacks of military expansion in western Europe, Scandinavia, the middle east and the Far East.

This estimate of Russia's military limitations has led the joint chiefs of staff to the conclusion that it is not necessary to have a large staff to decide against setting up now in continental United States a unified command of military forces like those in outside area.

However, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower may have to perform his temporary duty as chairman of the joint chiefs of staff and chief military adviser to President Truman.

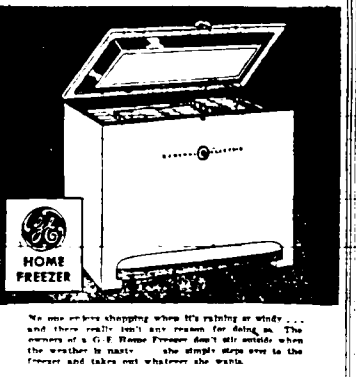

Solon Defends New Measure For Law Rule

PAYETTE, March 10 (AP)—Sen. Herman Walker, R., Payette, has jumped to the defense of a bill sponsored by the Idaho Legislature requiring requirements for admission to the bar.

Walker was credited with obtaining passage of the measure which would admit in practice of law without examination graduates of the University of Idaho law school or graduates of other accredited law schools by two senators of residence at Idaho.

The measure, which became a law without the signature of Gov. C. Robinson, has been attacked by the Idaho Bar association as unconstitutional.

A supreme court hearing has been set for April 4 in case involving the Idaho graduates who have filed applications to practice.

Walker said that his observations of the Idaho graduates who have filed applications to practice, "without reading the petition in the supreme court, the matter of admission to practice law is an exclusive and inherent power of the supreme court to regulate, when under the old law and prior to passage of senate bill 32 (the challenge) that bar commission could willfully and without any applicant's consent and every applicant denied by the supreme court."

On the bar commission's contention that the legislature infringed the exclusive right of the supreme court to fix rules and regulations for persons entering to practice law, Walker said that all the lawmakers did by enactment of SB 32 was to amend old law, section 3-101, Idaho code annotated.

He said that act provided that anyone over 21 years of age, of good moral character, possessing the necessary qualifications of learning and ability under such rules as the supreme court may prescribe, may practice law.

"It is obvious from reading this section that the supreme court received its power from section 3-101," Walker went on. "It seems obvious then that the legislature could amend this statute which has been in effect since 1893, and which the legislature amended in 1927 and re-enacted in 1930."

Placid Duty as Librarian Camouflages Pioneering Adventures of Buhl Woman

Twin Falls, March 10.—Residents of Buhl and vicinity who have patronized the Buhl Public Library have known Martina Yetter, the friendly and pleasant librarian who has quietly but efficiently returned over the little domain for the past seven years.

But many of them have had no knowledge of her varied experiences until casual conversations have revealed the many hours of curiosity to the point where they wished to know much more.

It takes a bit of persuasion as Mrs. Yetter seems of the opinion that past accomplishments are of little importance in the present day; however, an unusual story unfolds.

The homestead site was at the headwaters of the east fork of the Salmon river. The beauty of the region was without question, as it was a little mountain-meadow cup surrounded by towering peaks, but the possibility of successful homesteading presented a greater question.

But with indomitable spirit and a winter's supply of food, the homesteading project was launched. The supply of groceries was a considerable necessary quantity.

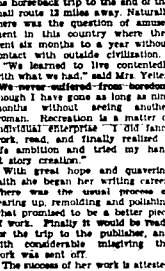

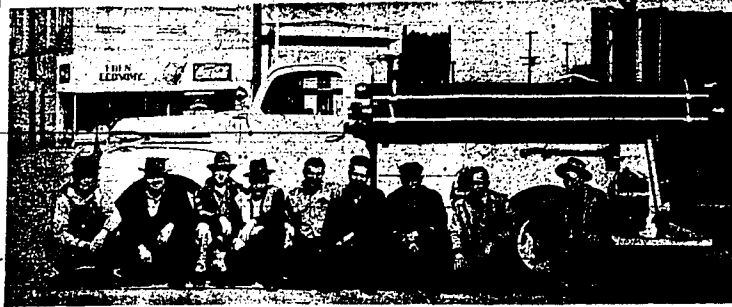

Eden Volunteer Firemen Have Truck in Place of Hose Cart

EDEN, March 10—Members of the Eden volunteer fire department aren't likely to be wishing for the return of "the good old days" so far as their equipment is concerned.

The department has a new fire truck complete with gauges, pumps, nozzles, hoses, ladders, lights, tanks, axes and all the other equipment which adorn a modern, first-class fire-fighting machine.

Things are different now. The new truck carries the firemen to fires. Mounted on the side of the truck are chemical fire extinguishers and on the bed of the truck is 1,000 feet of two and one-half inch hose and 300 feet of one and one-half inch hose. Built into the truck is a 400-gallon booster tank which has an additional 500 feet of hose attached.

A booster pump, with a rating of 550 gallons of water per minute, is mounted in front of the truck and can be used to pump water from canals or may be coupled to hydrants.

Many types of nozzles are available in a nozzle and connection box at the rear of the truck. A 20-foot hardwood extension ladder is carried on the truck as standard equipment.

The truck has answered one call. A chimney fire, which could have caused considerable damage, was easily extinguished.

Fire Chief Ralph McCauley opined that the new truck was a great improvement over the old methods of fighting fire. The two-wheeled cart has been rolled back into a corner where it's out of the way.

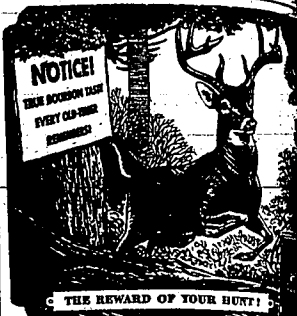

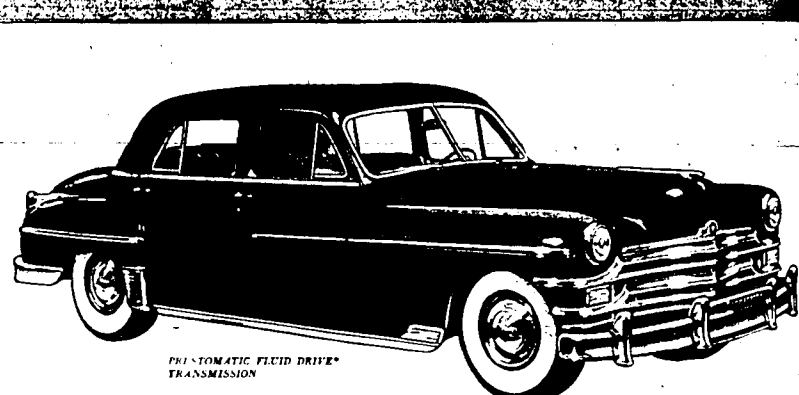

Crack Opened In Price Wall For Soft Coal

PITTSBURGH, March 10 (AP)—A crack has opened in post-war soft coal prices. But it's too early to tell if it means your furnace coal will be cheaper.

Pittsburgh Consolidated Coal company, often called the world's largest commercial producer, announced price reductions of from 18 to 40 cents a ton, according to grade, in coal from some of its northern West Virginia fields.

Produce Low Cost Coal
These fields produce so-called low cost coal for the firm. That simply means the production lab is not so high.

So far, only big industrial coal consumers—the utilities—have benefited and not all of them.

The price cuts are being made in several new yearly contracts being negotiated with industries. The contract usually are effective each April 1.

The new range of prices is not available. Contract prices of soft coal usually are a closely kept secret between buyer and seller.

Competitive Conditions
A Pittsburgh Consolidated spokesman said the reductions were made in response to competitive conditions.

The bituminous market has been softer of late. Coal men said that condition resulted from slack exports, high production rates and from a lighter domestic demand. The price development finds the coal industry with a record 70,000,000 tons of soft coal stored here-ground. The big supply of stocks and the softening market are widely considered to be factors which will handicap President John L. Lewis of the United Mine Workers when he begins contract negotiations for a better contract next summer.
