### Murtaugh Hot Lunch Program Is Rated High by Inspectors

MURTAUGH, March 10—The hot lunch project here was described as one of the best he has visited by E. M. Hoyt, Boise, field representative for the federal school lunch program, following a recent inspection. Earlier the project had been given a "grade A" rating by Keith Harvey, sanitarian for the south central Idaho district health unit, Twin Falls.

The high ratings are the result of improvements made since last year, including the purchase of 300 sectioned stainless steel trays, new cups and soup bowls and three additional workers which replaces equipment which was condemned last year. A sink on a cup is sufficient for it to be condemned.

Hoyt stated the meals being served here are perfectly balanced and meet all federal requirements for school lunches. He also commended on the spacious dining hall. A serving window was recently built so the children do not have to go through the kitchen. The next improvement planned is initial linoleum for the kitchen.

The hot lunch project is sponsored by the Community council of which Mrs. Ralph Denton is president and Mrs. Norman Decker is hot lunch chairman. Cooks are Mrs. Lewis Olsen, Mrs. Martin Wright and Mrs. Thomas Doolin.

They are interest in bills in the legislature by residents from cities other than Boise, inability of people to travel on the ground and high percentage of completed flights. Only 14 per cent of scheduled flights were not completed in February.

Meanwhile, a majority of the delegates were of the opinion that a statement that the U. S. "must maintain sufficient strength to control the forces of reaction in the world" is essential to the maintenance of religious liberty.

### Farm Training Offered Under GI Bill in Courses at Carey

CAREY, March 11—Under the leadership of superintendent and experienced instructor, Carey GI's are obtaining valuable instructional on the farm training including theory classes, field supervision, farm shop and farm carpentry. The course is made possible by the veterans administration and requirements are set up by the state department of vocational education.

The veterans have been meeting two nights a week, Mondays and Thursdays, at the Carey high school for practical and technical education in animal husbandry, crop production, livestock diseases, animal nutrition, vegetable production, soil management, farm accounting, auditing, mail and insect control.
