Importance of Road Signals Is Emphasized

The mounting toll of automobile accidents has not decreased and will not show any noticeable decrease until the motorist public pays more serious attention to simple safety precautions," according to Ray Peronius, Twin Falls, president of the Idaho Trucking Association.

Renewing this month's segment of the American Trucking Association's national courtesy and safety campaign, Peronius stressed the importance of recognizing area and signs. "That is the theme of this month's campaign," Peronius said, "and the important message that suggestion cannot be minimized."

Contract Drivers

In years passed, the accident rate of the professional driver has shown a marked decrease, while the accident rate of the passenger car driver has shown a slight increase. Much of this can be traced to the professional driver's strict adherence to traffic rules in contrast to the average passenger car driver's attitude of indifference. Peronius stated:

"I am not attempting to set the trucking industry up as a bastion of virtue when it comes to obeying traffic regulations, but what I am trying to say is that an intensive safety campaign within the trucking industry has shown a marked reduction in truck accidents and what we have learned should be passed on to the motorist."

Signs Important

This month's campaign of recognizing signs and signals is a case in point, he added. Although the stop sign of the "danger-curve" sign may seem almost too common to mention, obeying these signs has saved many lives. Therefore, he emphasized their meaning by the shape alone, even before reading them, is one of the tricks of the trucking trade which has often spelled the difference between accident and safety.

"The trucking industry and the Idaho Trucking Association are anxious and willing to work with the public of this state to reduce highway accidents," Peronius concluded. "Our drivers are well trained and the American Trucking Association through its affiliated state association is carrying on a never-ending safety program."

County Board Has Authority To Levy Tax

BOISE, March 13 (AP)—The attorney general's office ruled today that a county board of education has legislative authority to levy a tax for school services.
 This finding was made by assist- ant Attorney General J. N. Leggett in an opinion written in response to an inquiry from State Department of Public Instruction Alton B. Jones.
 Jones wrote the attorney general that the commissioners of a certain county have refused to approve a three-fourth mill levy requested by the county board of education. He did not name the county but called for an answer to questions involving the relationship between county education boards and county commissioners.
 Leggett cited a section of law which authorizes the county board of education "to budget and certify for levy, a county-wide tax for county school services, but not in excess of two mills on each dollar of assessed valuation of property in each county under its jurisdiction."
 "It is our opinion," Leggett wrote, "that the county board of education has been granted the legislative authority to levy the tax. When the amount of the levy, within the imposed limitation, is certified to the board of county commissioners, the latter have no discretion in the matter and their function in the premises is purely clerical or ministerial, nor has it any supervisory authority over the disposition of any money collected under a county board of education levy."

Solons Approve 292 Out of 506 Bills Introduced

BOISE, March 13 (AP)—There were 506 bills introduced in the Idaho legislature this session, but not quite half of this number got through both the senate and the house of representatives.
 Figures compiled by legislative clerks showed that 292 bills were passed and sent to Gov. C. A. Holt for his signature. He has still not acted upon about 130 of these. This rest have been enacted into law.
 There were 358 bills introduced in the house and 154 of those measures cleared both chambers. Both branches passed 134 of the 238 bills introduced in the senate.
 Many bills were introduced and then withdrawn, were voted down on the floor or died in committee.

 He emphasized that the worst cause of tooth decay is candy, soft drinks and food sugars.
 "Children would never acquire a taste for sugar if adults would not introduce it," he said.

Cubans Stone U. S. Embassy in Retaliation

HAVANA, March 12 (AP)—A band of Cubans stoned the American embassy here today and tried to burn a United States flag in front of it. Several persons were injured when police moved in to the demonstrators and dispersed them. The demonstration followed an incident in which a group of sailors from the U. S. destroyer Rodman were rescued by police from an angry crowd after they allegedly desecrated a statue of Jose Marti, hero of Cuban independence. U. S. Ambassador Robert Butler emerged from the embassy and tried to calm the demonstrators as they sought to run down the flag amid shouts of "out with the American!" Police arrived at the moment. They fired several shots in the air. Butler, accompanied by Foreign Minister Carlos Horta and Oscar Ojeda, ambassador-designate to the United States, visited the Marti monument in Central park and placed a floral offering at its base. In a brief speech Butler apologized to the Cuban people for the "un-speakable conduct of the sailors." Witnesses of the incident last night claimed that the American sailors climbed the Marti monument and desecrated it. They were pursued by angry Cubans, and were saved only by the arrival of the police.

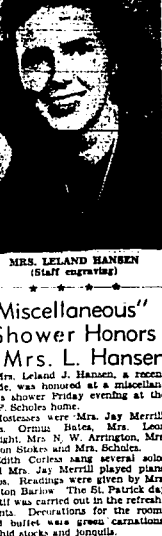

Pioneer Loop Sets Rules for Speedup

POCATELLO, March 12 (AP)—President J. P. Halliwell of the Pioneer League has set a general speed-up in play.

Three long, drawn-out balls are doing the league no good, and everyone should cooperate to improve the situation, Halliwell said.

In an 1,800-word directive to managers, Halliwell demanded that all teams, managers and players take action to end "grandstanding," unnecessary delays, needless protests and other time-consuming activities.

In unadorned and forceful language he put it squarely up to the managers to see that his instructions are complied with, and left little doubt that he will deal summarily with anyone ignoring his orders.

Spring training begins for all league clubs within a few weeks. "This was sick and tired of such grandstanding," he wrote at the beginning of the letter. "I hope you are not blasphemers." He repeatedly hammered at the "point is, we want the delay stopped."

His long message also set forth several general instructions as to interpretation of rules and regulations of other major baseball leagues and managers. But the emphasis was on the "speedup" action by "all ball players." Arguments with the umpire, "gambles" or a "man's rush attitude," are prohibited.

And he repeatedly urged "cooperation" to the fans' hobby.

He called this a "maximum of 30 minutes" for a manager to make his case, making the home club responsible for enforcing this regulation.

Other points were:

The so-called huddle is allowed in the manager's room. Players are permitted to gather at the pitcher's mound on the playing field for discussion.

Managers can only stop games for a 30-minute timeout to go to the pitcher. If he goes to the mound the second time he will have to remove the pitcher.

Line Warnings

Belief pitchers coming in to bat is to be suspended for one day immediately and will be allowed no more than eight warmup throws. If the pitcher is suspended, the manager must go to the mound and announce the suspension. If he does not, the pitcher will be removed from the game. 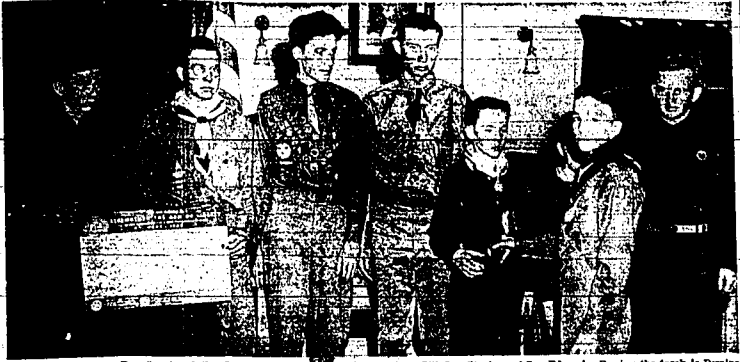

State's Board Denies Plan to Plant Poppies

BOISE, March 12 (AP)—The state land board today quashed a plan to plant poppies on an area from Taber's mountain to Horseshoe Bend north of Boise. "The natural beauty of our state should be preserved and improved," said State Land Commissioner Edward Wootley, "but it is possible for noxious weeds, poison weeds and flowers that choke out grass and crops to become dangerously scattered through such measures." Wootley pointed out that some types of poppy are noxious weeds and that parts of Utah and large areas of California have not become infested with poppies that it is impossible to graze livestock on the hills or raise crops in competition with the poppies. Dr. Albert Beck of Boise has seeded a portion of the area by airplane. He described the area as a potential beauty spot for the growth of poppies. Wootley said a follow-up will be made on the germination and growth of the poppies and if necessary the area will be sprayed with weed killer so that the range, waterholes and farming area will not become infested with the flower. "The planting of the poppies has caused grave concern among administrators of the lands, water users of the watershed involved and the cattle and sheep grazers who use this area," Wootley declared.

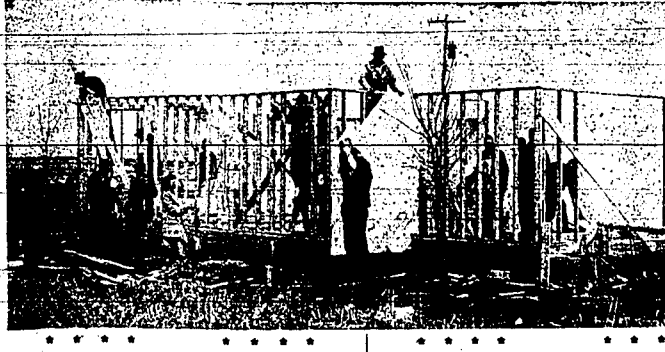

They returned and moved into a small bungalow which had escaped the flames, settling down to what seemed to be a dismal future. Loughmiller said he would not have been able to build another house because he had been in ill health for some time. The situation looked hopeless.

It was then that members of the Grange, the local Farm Bureau and church groups took a hand and decided on the "house-raising." The insurance for the burned home would almost cover the cost of lumber for rebuilding.

With warmer weather and melting snows preparations were made to start construction. Last Monday morning work began. Everyone pitched in. Saws, axes and hammers thumped out a rhythm of friendship as the 30-odd workers lifted, jacked and worked. The walls grew as if by magic.

Grange OK's Deleting Part Of T-H Law

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—The National Grange today recommended dropping some provisions from the Taft-Hartley act, such as the non-communist affidavit section, but keeping the labor law's "basic purposes."

The Grange contended that some provisions of the act could be used by "Unscrupulous" management to harass labor unions unnecessarily.

T. Sanders, legislative counsel of the Grange, told a subcommittee that legislation should aim for "equitable" treatment for unions and management, and the Taft-Hartley act tried to approach this objective.

The subcommittee, headed by Rep. Augustine H. Kelley, D., Pa., is considering the administration's bill to repeal the Taft-Hartley act. The measure would re-construct the old Wagner act with some changes.

Sanders listed as sections of the law which could be used to "undermine" unions:

1. Permission for strike replacements to vote in collective bargaining elections.
2. Provisions making unions responsible for the acts of their agents.

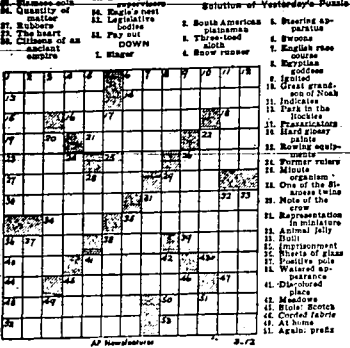

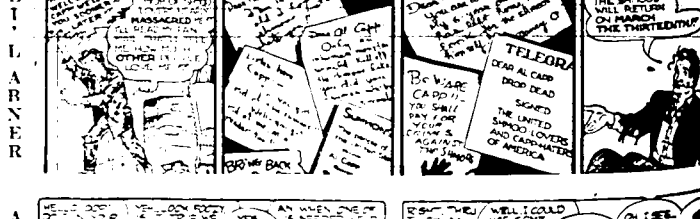
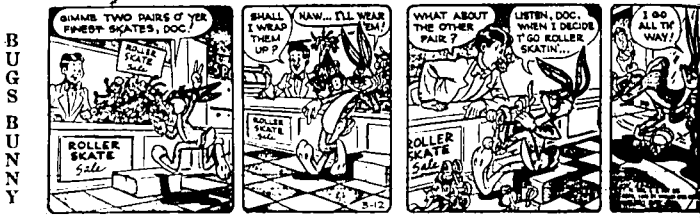

B-36 Record For Non-Stop Flight Is Set

PORT WORTH, Tex., March 12 (AP)—A B-36 super-bomber landed at Carswell air base here at 7:57 a. m. (CST) today after a 9,000 mile non-stop flight, the longest ever made by a plane. The plane was not refueled in flight and had 20 hours of fuel left, it landed, Carswell air base said.

The plane landed with fuel to spare because of failure today of two of the six engines.

Directs Flight

Col. John D. Bartlett, project officer for B-36 training for the seventh bombardment wing of the air force, directed the flight, which exceeded by 687 miles the similar non-stop simulated bomb run from Fort Worth to Honolulu and return which he headed last Dec. 6, ending on Pearl Harbor day.

Bartlett said fuel for two hours more flying was left, but the pilot, plane commander and co-pilot, Clarence F. Horton, San Antonio as copilot, carried a "stripper" crew of only 12 men instead of the usual B-36 crew of 15.

The crew silver ship climbed into the air at 12:30 p. m. Thursday and flew 43 hours and 37 minutes, carrying 100,000 pounds of bombs and 5,000 miles. The bombs were jettisoned in the Gulf of Mexico at 1:15 p. m. Thursday after 24 hours and 16 minutes of flight.

Wide Loop

Leaving Fort Worth the bomber flew northward over Minneapolis; then westward to circle Over, Pa.; then south to circle New York City, across the nation in a great diagonal course to Key West, Fla. where it landed.

After jettisoning its bombs in the Gulf of Mexico, the bomber turned northward, passing over Denver at 7:15 p. m. last night.

The flight was dignified for the second time at 10:34 p. m. last night and the plane made a "Great Loop" over the United States in 36 hours, 15 minutes, 57 seconds, according to officials of the Sun Valley club.
