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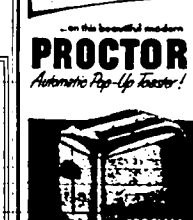

A large portion of the Burley high school student body attended the contest event Thursday afternoon. All speakers were allowed 10 minutes, followed by a question period of subject matter conducted by the judges.

Judges were Clyde Rose, Jerome Cooperative Creamery; Betty Clark, English instructor and librarian at Burley high school; and L. Christensen, English instructor of Burley junior high school. In speaking of the contest, Bill Keller, Burley Future Farmers advisor, said:

"It might be added that Future Farmers of America place public speaking experience high in importance on their yearly list of educational events since such training is vital to perpetuating good farm leadership in our democratic way of life. This ability of your farm leader to stand on their own feet and to wisely express themselves and their problems to the American public is probably more important today than ever before."

Project Mark Is Neared by Yakima Yield

BOISE, March 15 (AP)—The Yakima federal reclamation project produced crops worth \$60,291,973 in 1948—fifth highest on record for the development.

The regional office of the bureau of reclamation said returns from the south central Washington project hit an all-time high in 1948 when farmers grossed \$7,222,253.

According to the bureau's annual crop census, the average per-acre return from the 363,000-acre area was \$165.93. Heading this was the Tieton division, chiefly devoted to apple production, with a gross per-acre value of \$270.

High returns were also reported from the Hoca division where water was first delivered in 1941. The bureau said the per-acre value from the 37,229 acres recently reclaimed and now under cultivation was \$202.51. This is the sixth straight year the Hoca division per-acre figure has exceeded \$200.

Congress Action Said Needed for Dams Re-Naming

BOISE, March 15 (AP)—Re-naming of four proposed Snake river dams in Idaho will probably have to be done through congressional action, a spokesman for the army engineers said.

Secretary of State J. D. Price said he had received a letter from Lieut.-Col. R. L. Jewett, acting assistant chief of engineers for civil works, in response to requests to change the name of four contemplated dam projects.

Jewett said the bureau of reclamation had received requests that the names of Ice Harbor, Lower Monumental, Little Goose and Lower Granite dams be changed to Whitman, Lewis, Clark and Spaulding dam, all early Pacific northwest explorers and missionaries.

Jewett said the original names were decided upon by local designation and to change them would probably require congressional action.
