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### THE FEDERAL POWER SURVEY

During the 80th congress, the house public works committee has entered the public power business, including rates, charges and methods of accounting for such service.

It was conducted by Col. A. B. Roberts of Colorado, nationally-known consulting engineer, and W. H. Sigeren, certified public accountant, under the general supervision of Robert E. Lee, former special agent of the FBI.

The report, requiring nearly a year for completion, just recently was published in full and introduced as a part of the formal record in hearings currently being conducted by the senate sub-committee on deficiency appropriations regarding the federal power program.

Some of the highlights in the report:

- 1. A total of 435 federal projects under way, authorized or proposed, to add 14,230,970 kilowatts of generating power at an average cost of \$50 per kilowatt. (When the cost of hydro-electric generating capacity goes above \$300 per kilowatt, the investigators pointed out, it is apt to be out of line competitively with steam plants, threatening future ability of the project to pay out.)

- 2. A survey of reclamation and the corps of engineers estimated the cost of these projects at some \$120,000,000.

- 3. All federal power projects now proposed for power, flood control and irrigation works are taken into account, some \$40,000,000 total national budget for the current year.

- 4. One of the strongest worded sections in the report hits at the federal power system's accounting matters and its failure to pay taxes. No provision is made for payment in lieu of federal taxes, it points out, and payment to local and state tax bodies is less than that paid by privately-owned utilities. Compared with rates, according to the survey, the 114 per cent federal revenue paid by private utilities to the federal government and 8 per cent paid to state and local governments. Only two projects, Boulder dam and TVA, made payments in lieu of taxes as these amounts to only \$3,000,000.

- 5. The investigators reported these two projects should have paid \$22,144,852.

- 6. On an average, the federal power projects will have to double their rates if they are to pay their own way completely, the investigators reported in concluding their survey throughout the country are paying for the so-called "cheap" power provided customers of federal plants in a few communities.

- 7. The survey recommended that all federal projects, authorized or proposed, should be studied to determine whether they are economically justified, and that the federal power commission, in order to obtain uniformity in lawmaking in public power, should conduct a study to determine whether grant licenses for all hydro-electric projects and determine rates to be charged.

- 8. The federal accounting methods are not the conventional type, the experts learned. Life and, in most cases, no provision is made for depreciation on the assets. These methods "obscure the true picture of the government's investment."

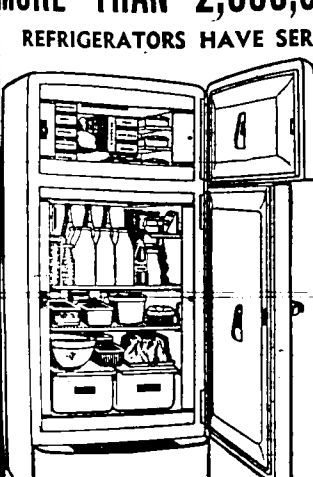

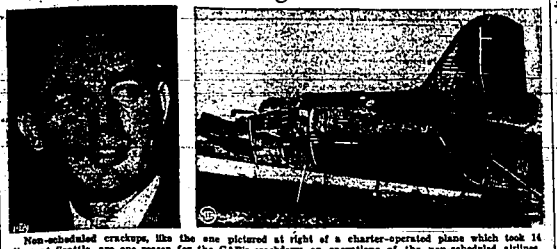

### Red Cross Accident Prevention, First Aid Work Declared Valuable Services

One of the most valuable public services of the Red Cross in Twin Falls is the accident prevention of first aid program, according to James Reynolds, chairman of first aid and safety.

Two standard and advance first aid classes with special emphasis on first aid for aid patrol were taught recently to 13 members of the Twin Falls aid patrol and members of the sheriff's department. The city hall by members of the fire department. Instructors were Chief E. H. Freese, Kenneth Boyer, George Mann and Robert Miller.

The standard course required 18 hours with 12 hours for the advanced. Each class lasted for three hours and included a lecture as well as the instructor's manual, were furnished by the Red Cross, while the first department furnished the stretcher and resuscitator.

The course proved so popular that firemen received requests for an instructor's course. Certified Red Cross instructor cards are given after the completion of the first aid course. A series of classes stretching industrial first aid will be taught the latter part of April.

Eight classes in a Red Cross home nursing course are being taught twice weekly at the high school now by Mrs. Anne Knight. These classes, which were begun three weeks ago, will continue until school closes.

The course includes simple procedures of taking care of the sick in the home and also isolation techniques to prevent the spread of communicable disease. Proper method of washing dishes, bed-making and bed linen as well as use of thermometers are taught.

The students will also take up community projects, studying garbage disposal as it affects the health of the city, and community resources available. The Red Cross furnishes all materials for the classes, which are taught to high school boys as well as girls.

A modified home nursing course is taught in Piler by Mrs. Marie Wullschlaeger, public health nurse.

A course in accident prevention is taught in the junior high school to seventh grade students by the physical education teacher. The course is accredited and students receive Red Cross certificates. It is also taught in Multahull, Piler, and rural schools under the supervision of the superintendent of Piler schools. Next year the course will be available in all schools.

Another authorized Red Cross class is one of first aid taught to eighth grade students in the Twin Falls school system.

This year the Red Cross is planning the most extensive program in its history ever held in Twin Falls, Reynolds said.

Three students will be sent to aquatic school which will be held in the Pacific northwest in June. These students will then help conduct the aquatic campaign under the leadership of Bill Jones.

Last summer 509 children were taught to swim. Reynolds said, and with the new pool in Twin Falls, facilities will be even better.

### Science Editor's Analysis of Russ Status Reverses Ideas

One of the most logical minds now in possession by my colleague, Howard Blackaker, science editor for the AP. He is so logical as to be almost terrifying to his tiny mentalities.

Every once in a while he breaks away from his atomic theories and takes a critical view of foreign affairs, applying the same cold reasoning he develops his scientific arguments. Recently I got the product of his mind, generally in the form of a note or letter, delivered by messenger although Blackaker's quarters are only a few steps from my desk. The latest is the following:

"Dear Sir:

"May I suggest that your column take time out to state the right and left of things?

"The Russians, for example, are farther to the right—politically and socially speaking—than any other great nation and probably have as much social equality as any other nation on earth, even those with absolute potential for government.

"Russia is governed by a small aristocracy, the communists are the largest estimates. These Russian communists are not more than four per cent of the Russian people.

"They form a high caste, a higher than the traditional aristocracy that was based on inheritance.

"Their government is despotic. It is as despotic as that of the traditional despots. Possibly the extreme restriction of the Russians is not surprising. For generations they were kept chained. They still have the same sort of extreme right government as the rest of the world.

"The communists of the United States, Britain, France, any great nation you can name, are far to the left.

"Does it give you a shock to be told that what you have been calling 'left' is really 'right'?"

"The terms 'left' and 'right' as used by the communists and many in Europe in many particulars the designation of 'right' was applied to the conservatives and 'left' to the socialists. They opposed the so-called liberal and to the left side of the officers and so were termed 'left'.

"On this basis we see an American politician that the further we go to the left the more we move toward the right. The further we go to the left the nearer we approach 'democracy.' which is rule by the majority. Bolshevism, which is the modern Russian version of communism, is rule by a small minority, although the term 'bolshevism' actually means 'majority'.

"Thus we arrive at the conclusion that the greater the restrictions placed upon the individual by government, the further we swing to the right and the further away we get from democracy. The greater our democracy the more we swing to the left.

"And the moment an act or law which should say it is to exercise care in employing the terms 'left' and 'right.' The safest way is to be specific and say 'democracy' or 'absolutism'."
