**Boyle Discovers Real Lesson In Courage at Vets' Hospital**

By HAL BOYLE

NEW YORK, March 18 (AP)—A sudden bolt in the brain struck down an elderly civil engineer at the peak of his career.

The stroke left him bed-ridden, voiceless, hopeless.

In time he came to a stretcher—

and he found himself among the forgotten and neglected veterans of the first and second World wars with ailments so serious as to make their recovery chances very doubtful.

And he found women there who were willing to spend endless time to help him find his voice again. They were volunteer gray ladies from the Brooklyn chapter of the Red Cross.

They took him into a small room for treatment of victims of speech, the loss or impairment of speech, that comes from certain illnesses and brain injuries. It was a bright sunny room, but the engineer felt alone and lost. He wanted to be by himself.

He would get hysterical and weep, recalled Elizabeth Kelly, one of the gray ladies.

The engineer watched morosely as Miss Kelly and Florence Conklin, another volunteer, held up small cards on which words had been printed. He saw other patients pronounce anew the words—"book," "meat," "eat"—simple, childish words that had become lost in the broken pattern of the vocal parts of their brains.

There was a young combat veteran whose head had been struck by a splinter. He learned 400 words in a year. There was little Frank, a veteran of the first war who learned to walk after being paralyzed for 13 years.

The story said the blackmailers worked around the clock and after recording enough "damaging" information would contact the victims.

"Fear of exposure led the victims to pay huge sums," the World-Telegram said. "The ring concentrated only on the wealthy, particularly those who could ill-afford to have scandal crop up in their lives."

The story said that the names of the blackmailers were known to police. However, it said that police action had been stymied because authorities had been "unable to turn up a single complainant whose charges could lead to arrest."

## Surplus Noted, but Solons Cut Game Fund Needs, Official Says

PARMA, March 18.—Funds of the fish and game department are in healthy and will be put to work for the long-range benefit of the state's 200,000 hunters and over they are appropriate to be approved by the legislature, R. G. Cole, chairman of the Idaho Game Commission, said Thursday evening in an address to the Parma Rod and Gun Club.

The commission chairman pointed out although there is a surplus of approximately \$760,000 in the fish and game fund and there are many projects that are being carried out, the appropriation for the year beginning July 1 was trimmed nearly \$100,000, below the department's request. The amount the department may spend during the year is \$1,064,000. The request was \$1,164,000.

Members of the commission are fully aware that either sum is a lot of money. They appreciate the people in administering the funds carefully, thriftily, and for the best interest of wildlife. No waste is tolerated. At the same time the commission recognizes that the state's game laws have been built up by the license fees of hunters and fishermen. The fund was built by a certain purpose and name.

"The purpose is the increase and maintenance of fish and hunting opportunity. The very fact that the number of licenses purchased has increased in the past 10 years is an indication of the public demand for recreation of this type."

"There is no reason why the people should not have the progressive development they desire. The money is in the fund. It is your money. The fish and game fund has been built up by the license fees of hunters and fishermen. The fund was built by a certain purpose and name."

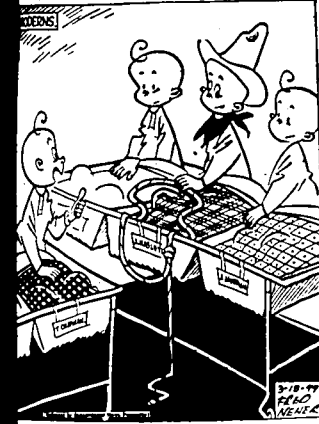

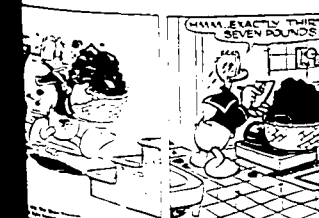

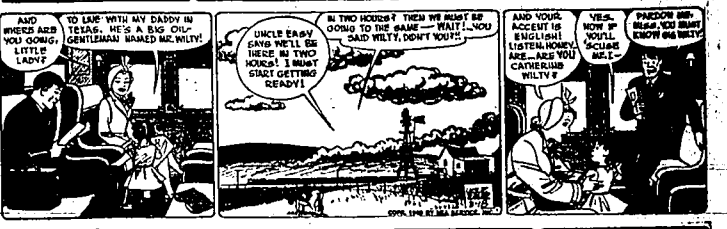

### Home Living "Dangerous," Report Shows

CHICAGO, March 18 (AP)—There's no place like home—if you like to live dangerously.

That may not sound right to you. You probably regard your home as the one safe harbor on the riled sea of postwar life. If you think so, you are wrong. And if you think you are safest in the peace and quiet of your bedroom, you are wrong again. Nowhere under the roof are the risks greater.

The National Safety Council has compiled figures that show there were more accidental deaths in homes than anywhere else last year.

Third in Homes

More than one-third (34,500) of the 100,000 lives lost in 1948 accidents were lost in homes. Fatal injuries incurred in homes while they engaged in traffic on the job and in other categories.

What's the reason?

Well, the population of the U. S. is growing. People are living longer. There have been bumper crops of babies. That means more old folks and more small children are around. The very old and the very young are the ones most likely to get hurt.

Many "Double-ups"

The housing shortage has caused thousands of families to double up. Many households are overcrowded. How many old folks, used to order, are living in a clutter of their grandchildren's toys?

In how many new houses have safety features been eliminated to cut costs? How many jerry-built rooms have been knocked together in attics and basements with such built-in perils as steep, narrow stairs and makeshift wiring?

Fourth in Bedrooms

A council analysis of fatal home accidents based on detailed information by the state of Kansas and Nassau county, New York, shows that one-fourth of such accidents occur in bedrooms.

They are the result of a wide range of half-wake actions—such things as smoking in bed, leaping out of bed in the dark, skidding on a throw rug, tripping on a light cover.

Other home accident locations, in the order of their menace to life, are the yard, kitchen, inside stairs, living room, outside stairs, bathroom, dining room, porch, hall, basement, garage.

You can't, it would seem, be safe anywhere. But you can be careful.

### Speedy Plane Is Blamed for Boise Mishap

BOISE, March 18 (AP)—A mid-air plane collision which claimed two lives and injured a third national guard aviator apparently was caused by a T-61 fighter plane overtaking a slower moving T-6 trainer.

Idaho national guard officials said the two planes were flying near the edge of separate sectors on a routine night training mission when the fighter plane apparently zoomed into the underneath side of the T-61 from the rear.

Two Men Killed

Killed in the crash were Lieut. John C. Breach, Boise, pilot of the T-61, and Pvt. James D. McNeil, Nampa, a student at the College of Idaho. McNeil was an observer in the two-seated T-6.

Lieut. Eugene C. Smith, Boise, pilot of the training plane, parachuted to safety. He is in a Boise hospital recovering from minor injuries.

Breach's body was found at a ranch near the scene of the wreckage. His parachute had not been opened. Investigating officers said he likely was killed or knocked unconscious by a portion of the plane as he jumped.

Smith said the planes were flying about 4,500 feet above the ground when his plane "gave a lurch." Smith said he shouted over the plane's intercommunication system to McNeil to bail out. Then he jumped. The accident occurred about eight miles west of Boise, directly over U. S. highway 30. Wreckage of the planes fell on different sides of the road.
