Asks More Aid for Roads

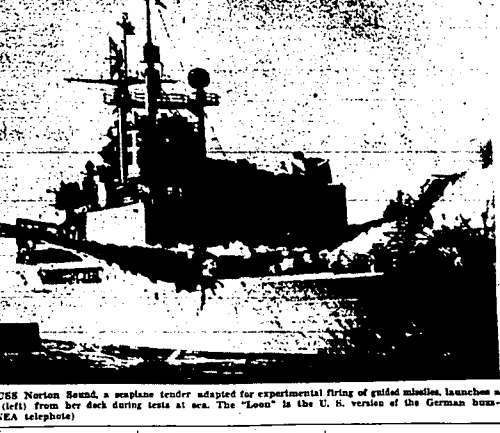
WASHINGTON, March 22 (UP)—The United States congress today approved a bill to increase the "traffic" of American cities by giving their usual share of highway funds.

The bill, which is sponsored by Rep. Wm. C. Cramer, R-Ill., would increase the federal share of highway funds from 50 to 60 percent.

The bill also would provide for the construction of new highways and the improvement of existing ones.

The bill is expected to pass the House of Representatives in the next few days.

5 Governors Expected for Water Talks

POCAHELLO, March 22 (AP)—Governors of five states and representatives of the Columbia River basin inter-agency conference are expected to meet Thursday for the Columbia river basin inter-agency conference.

The meeting, which will be held at the Idaho State Reclamation Association, will discuss the proposed plan for the Columbia river basin.

The plan, which was developed by the Army Engineers, calls for the construction of a dam at the mouth of the river and the construction of a canal to divert water to the agricultural lands of the basin.

Early Federal Help Accepted for New Building

The city council Monday night passed resolutions accepting a federal grant of a maximum of \$12,300 for the construction of a new building for the city.

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—A breakdown in the railroad-union labor law is troubling employment in the industry.

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Idaho Location 'Definite' For West Atomic Plant, Montana's Push Reveals

WASHINGTON, March 22 (UP)—Rep. Mike Mansfield, D. Mont., said today the atomic energy commission has decided to locate its new atomic power reactor plant in Idaho.

He said Gov. John Bonner, Montana, and the entire Montana delegation—campaigning to get the plant in their state—were told of the Idaho selection during a conference with atomic energy commission Chairman David E. Lilienthal.

Mansfield said the commission decided March 1 on a site near Poacetto, Ida., that now includes the Arco ordnance proving ground—a Navy facility he said the commission is negotiating with the navy for the land.

Solons Wary On Truman's New Attitude Project Aired By 2 Groups; Details Asked

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—Southern Democrats were openly skeptical about President Truman's new bid to Congress to reauthorize the Atomic Energy Act.

But Democratic leaders like the Senator from Idaho, Wm. C. Cramer, were just as openly pleased that Mr. Truman has decided to do it.

Mr. Cramer said that the bill may help turn away legislative wrath from part of his program.

1949 Acreage For Wheat to Make Record

WASHINGTON, March 22 (UP)—Farmers plan a record wheat acreage this year and planted acreage for all crops is one per cent greater than the record recommended by the government, according to a survey by the Department of Agriculture.

If farmers carry out these plans, and if growing conditions are good, the 1949 crop of wheat will be greater than any other crop of wheat in the country's history.

Low Than 1948
On the basis of a survey of farmers' planting intentions, the department estimated total plantings at 161,000,000 acres. This would be about 1,000,000 acres less than last year, but would be higher than the 150,000,000 acres planted in 1948.

WASHINGTON—Navy's toppler gunners have begun to deliver a counter-blast against the administration and unrivaled campaign to high-pressure congress into allowing to their arm the lion's share of the \$15,000,000 appropriated for national defense.

Jerome Motorist Is Fined \$25 for Reckless Driving

Dolph H. Callen, Jerome, who on Dec. 8, 1947, pleaded not guilty to the charge of reckless driving, appeared Monday before justice court to change the plea to guilty and was fined \$75 and assessed \$3 court costs. He had been scheduled for trial this month.

Idaho Handed Sixth Spot for Power Rating

BOISE, March 22 (AP)—Idaho has the sixth highest potential water power rating in the United States, according to a report received here today from the U. S. geological survey.

The survey said Idaho had a potential 3,111,000 horsepower in water resources 90 per cent of which is untapped. This potential is based on a survey of all present developments and probably future developments along the rivers and streams of the state.

Possible major developments in the state include dams along the Salmon river; at Hell's canyon on the Snake among the Kootenai and Coeur d'Alene rivers.

Washington Leads

State leading in potential water power development is Washington, with 8,835,000 horsepower. Oregon was listed as second with 6,812,000 horsepower; California third with 4,811,000 horsepower; New York fourth with 3,944,000; Arizona fifth with 2,450,000 horsepower, and Idaho sixth.

In horsepower potentially available 50 per cent of the time Idaho has a potential of 1,555,500 horsepower while Arizona 50 per cent of the time has a potential of only 1,227,500 horsepower.

Usual Feature Cited

The most unusual feature of the report, according to reclamationists, is that Arizona and New York top Idaho. New York's potential can be explained from the present electrical generating plants at Niagara Falls, and the probably future developments along the St. Lawrence river, which New York will share with Canada.

Arizona's potential is contained in such developments as Parker dam, and the further expansion of facilities already in operation in that state.

Life Upset by 1914 Slaying, Scribe Avers

NEW YORK (AP)—The assassination of Archduke Ferdinand, the spark that set off World War I, was then turning a point of civilization, Malcolm W. Binzay, editor of the Detroit Free Press, says in his new book published here.

Binzay has been a newspaperman for 50 years. His second book, "Of 1914: A Scribe's Story," is a history of the Detroit of that time.

"The chain reaction that started at Sarajevo on June 28, 1914, closed our eyes on history and opened a new hell," Binzay writes in the first paragraph of his introduction. "It was a blood of each generation," he writes.

"The 'Wife' Feeding Life

"On that day in the Bosnian city where a youth shot a succession of shots, the book seemed as solid and as lasting as the Rocky mountains. We were looking for a way that everything was said, leaving order, habits of mind, more were so taken for granted that we even a Jew's name or a Karl Marx questioned their durability.

"Then without warning civilization crumbled up. Anarchy broke out. We have been living in Miltonian chaos ever since. We are no longer know life as a reality but see only Plato's shadow on the walls of our imagination.

Faded Men Remembered

"The story's book is the stage for the passage of historical characters from President William McKinley to Gen. Pershing. It is a history, however, as he claims to have the precise shadow of a president, Member of the House of Representatives, and a privateer.

"The book is a running argument over the relative quality of newspapermen of Binzay's era and the young reporters and editors of today.

"World War I was also the turning point for journalists. It was the American newspapers with but few down who understood world affairs, he writes.

Operating Top Dance Band Is Not All Glamor, Boyle Learns

NEW YORK, March 22 (AP)—Operating a top dance orchestra could be a top dance orchestra for a band leader.

"Most people take an orchestra for granted," said Elliot Lawrence, a boy leader in this field. "They realize it's all what it takes to keep it playing."

"They just say, 'They look like a band leader,' but they don't know what it takes to run a band."

"The 34-year-old leader, whose record is impressive, has made over \$300,000 last year, says a few statistics, but he is not a rich man, he is a hard worker, he says, during an interview between the band leader and the writer.

He began playing the piano at the age of 11. When he was an eight-month-old child, his father, who apparently had ended his hopes for a musical career. But he recovered and started his own orchestra at 17.

After graduating from University of Pennsylvania he was then only 18-Elloit entered the highly competitive popular dance field. Today he draws in the \$10,000 a year. His orchestra has 17 members, including two vocalists, and they get from \$4,000 to \$1,000 a year each.

"And the boys get paid whether they work or not," said Elliot.

"But it just doesn't get to me. I make a truck and five cars. And we have two to three arrangers, at \$100 a week apiece."

"You have to have an advance man to go ahead of the band to make arrangements and a publicity agent. Together they cost \$250 a week."

"You have to have a booking agency that gets you 20 or 30 per cent of your gross. You have to have a road manager along at \$100 a week."

"And you have to take along two hand boys to drive trucks set up the band and take care of the music."

"There are another \$125 a week."

"There are a lot of other incidents. You have to have equipment—uniforms, stands, music, and pictures, and so on."

Lawrence is one of the few leaders who neither smokes nor drinks. He had back and took a six from a paper carton full of orange juice.

ACA Officials Meet in Boise To Map Aims

BOISE, March 22 (AP)—Nearly 200 county agricultural conservation association commissioners have resumed discussion of farming problems during the second day of a three-day convention here.

C. A. Downing, Washington, D. C. administrative field representative of the grant-making and marketing administration, yesterday told the group that farmers must adjust their production to potential consumption.

"If we must have abundance of farm production, it must not be cumbersome so as to decrease the market of our farm people, or they'll lose their purchasing power," Downing declared.

W. H. Price, member of the board of directors of the commodity credit corporation in Washington, D. C., outlined the functions of that organization.

Stresses Community System

Quilley, acting state director of the production and marketing administration, stressed the importance of the producer committee system and said its object was "to give farm people a decent living and secure the future of the generation."

He also noted the importance of soil conservation in protecting the security of the future generation.

Preving Ground

"The committee system has been the proving ground for national and international farm leadership," Rice said, pointing out that some of the nation's top agriculture administrators had been on the farm and had served on county committees.

Gov. C. A. Robins, in a welcome address, said he was gratified to see a large number of farmers taking part in the convention and their own problems and doing something about it, instead of depending upon the state.

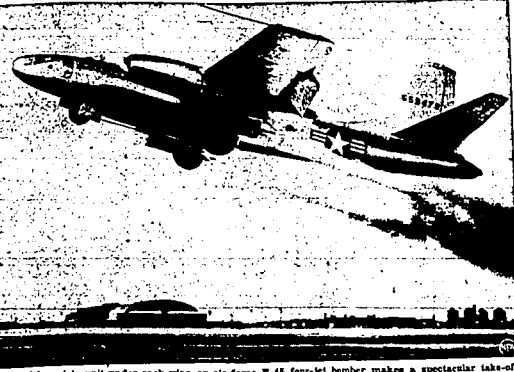

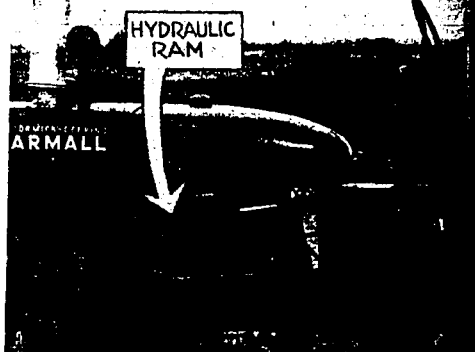

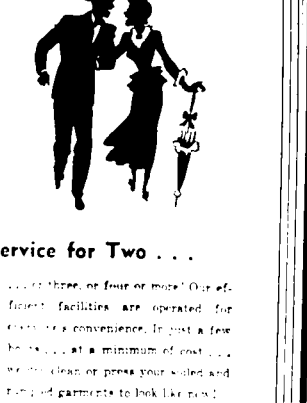

Russ Oppose Atlantic Pact In Usual Way

Russian reaction to publication of the terms of the Atlantic pact has been about as expected. Coupled with moves on the colonial developments in the dispute over Berlin, it brings the war of words to a new crescendo, but without any sign of new action.

The pact is being published and broadcasted in the Soviet Union against a background of weeks-long protest in the patches from Tass correspondents all over the world interpreting it as a western move toward war.

Termed Aggression

During the pact negotiations the communist propaganda took the line that it was a "preparation for aggression" by the west. Western people, except for the communist circles which have been losing strength steadily for months, didn't accept that interpretation. The new line has been obvious to this means war. It is an obvious effort to turn natural western sympathy for concrete movement against ratification. But relief and reassurance can be the dominating reaction of the western people.

The timing of the proclamation of a coalition government for eastern Germany, giving it the status of an equal within the Soviet orbit, may have been influenced by the pact negotiations. But it has been in the air since the Berlin crisis and is directly connected with the organization of an allied-sponsored government for western Germany.

Man on Mark

Meanwhile, the allied ban on Russian east marks as currently in western Berlin comes coincidentally following the failure of United Nations efforts for a mutual agreement, rather than as a part of the dispute over the pact.

Some may be surprised to find a signature of the Atlantic pact may provoke violent "preventive" action on the part of the USSR. It is an actual Russian belief in its own "western aggression" propaganda. The westerners are making a tremendous effort to dispel this idea and to obtain general world recognition of the pact as a strictly defensive alliance.

Russia can be expected to step up her efforts to represent herself as the true friend of peace, menaced by the aggressors.

The allies will counter with continued efforts to prepare themselves for any contingency, in the event of a strategic defense plan, a coordinated rearmament program, and possibly new alliances will be the allied answer.

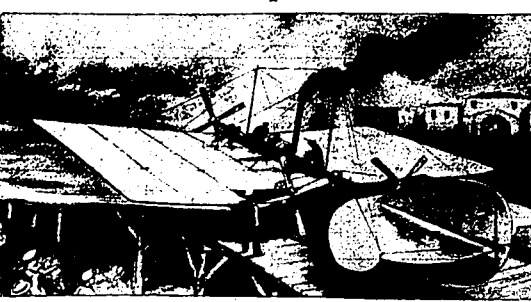

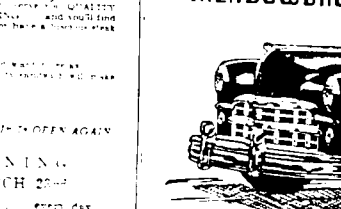

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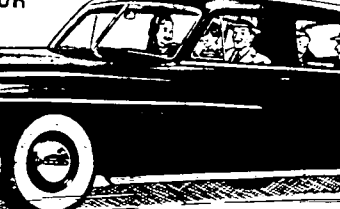

"The brakes, if they need adjusting, may freeze without warning; a worn tire may blow; defective wiring may cause a short circuit, and the steering key, if any, if not properly checked, may give at 60 miles an hour."

Sinks said he is in favor of a law that would require all motorists to have their brakes, lights, tires and steering apparatus examined every three months.

Call It the Law of Self-Protection

"Call it the law of self-protection," he said.

Sinks can't recall how many auto accidents he has driven. He said he has raced on almost every track, dirt and paved, in the country.

He also has spent 18 years in Hollywood as a movie stunt man, driving cars through fires, plate glass and brick walls. Aside from a few scratches, he always has managed to pull through to face the camera again.

During his career he has "set up" more than 1,500 fake accidents and never had a serious injury.

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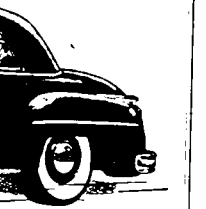

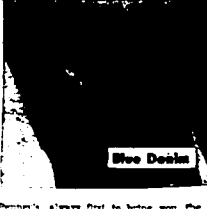
