Editor's note: Each year thousands of alcoholics are plucked from the gutter and restored to health by the aid of Alcoholics Anonymous. They are now being shown at the following in service one of our own citizens who has had this step by step "hat" between his feet.

NEW YORK, March 23 (AP)—George W. Sutton, Jr., man his thin fingers and the side of a glass of milk today and said, "This is the 10th day I've been on the wagon."

"You live by the day," Sutton said. "You even live by the hour. You keep saying 'I won't drink today.' Or you say 'I won't take a drink for an hour.' Then you add another hour and another hour."

Sutton is in his late 60s. He's head of a successful public relations firm. He fidgets with objects on his desk while he talks and pulls at his face. He is practically a chain smoker.

"Alcoholics Anonymous ended for me a career of 42 years of steady, heavy drinking," he said.

He stopped repeatedly to stifle a choking cough.

"A lot of people think an alcoholic enjoys drinking and should be punished for his foolish pleasure. He doesn't drink for fun. He drinks because he has to have liquor in him to feel normal."

"I was in a bad way. I took seven or eight drinks before breakfast. These usually held me out for a little before noon when I would dash across the street and grab a couple of hookers. Then I had several at lunch. I left the office for some cocktails in the afternoon. Then at dinner, I set down to serious drinking."

On some nights this amounted to 20 drinks or the equivalent of a fifth of Scotch, he said.

"My wife had gone to Europe to get away from his foolish pleasure. She was usually the only one who would staidly started trying. It was the first time I had ever done that."

Freight Loss Is Sighted in Hike of Rates

BOISE, March 24 (AP)—Further freight rate increases will result in loss for the railroads, L. P. Purvis, chief of transportation for the Idaho public utilities commission, predicted.

Commenting on a reported 13 per cent freight rate increase by the nation's railroads, Purvis said "every percentage increase granted the railroads magnifies the disadvantage under which western growers are laboring."

Purvis cited the present handicap under which western fruit and vegetable growers operate. In 1946 growers in the Idaho Falls area had a rate disadvantage of 23 cents per 100 pounds of produce in the Chicago market as compared with growers in the Grand Forks, Minn. area, he said.

At the present time this disadvantage amounts to 43 cents per 100 pounds of produce carried by the railroads to Chicago markets, he explained.

Purvis said he will have exemption for San Francisco to participate in a regional hearing by the interstate commerce commission on the proposed increase.

"It would be a real tragedy in behalf of the fruit and vegetable growers of the 11 western states."

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS



WASHINGTON—Southern senators triumph in their first major clash with the Truman administration—the filibuster fight—provides a gala atmosphere for the opening here of a National States Rights congress under the leadership of Senator Tucker.

Former Gov. Ben T. Lacey, Arkansas, presiding over the congress, provided the results of a recent medical examination at the Mayo clinic in St. Paul, Minn., which showed that Tucker is in excellent health.

Ray Tucker, one of the two principal aims, he stated, is to have the other political party, the Democrats, and the Negro party interested only remotely in the Negro problem, and that their main objective is to repeal federal encroachment on the rights of individual states.

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Folks at Oak Ridge Relate Fast Change

OAK RIDGE, Tenn., March 24 (AP)—Folks here can give those in Idaho a pretty good idea of what it's like to have a modern atomic city suddenly sprout from empty land.

Seven years ago Oak Ridge, now a city of 8500, was a quiet rural valley bordered by wooded hills. It wasn't even on pre-war maps as a town. Men here show the site designated a range of hills called "Black Oak ridge."

One phase of the growth of Oak Ridge will be lacking in the building of the new southeastern Idaho facility. At least the people in Idaho will know what's going on.

Guarded With Secrecy

Those who lived as Oak Ridge didn't, because then the atomic bomb was just an idea on paper guarded with secrecy.

Howard W. Phillips, 23, who was born on Oak Ridge farm land and now works a plant there, says he "has just seen a bunch of surveyors traveling around one day, driving posts here and there. They didn't say what their business was. Next time we learned the government was going to buy the land. The next was that they would give for it. A lot of old-timers are going to give up their homes and leave."

Chased of 1,000 Families

Those after that the 30-square-mile area was cleared of some 1,000 families in 1943 the government.

D. K. Shields, a member of the first work crew, recalls "at first there were no buildings. The hole there was stuck full of them. Most things were there and people moving in."

From that time until last Saturday Oak Ridge grew and flourished under a policy of secrecy. People in Clinton, a scant 15 miles away, could only speculate. The hole was the big project. They knew only that the government was spending extra dollars into the hole and at the same time taking telephone lines away.

Scientifically Laid Out

Now Oak Ridge, though still guarded as operated by the government, is being built for the first time. There are no modern roads, no business sections, no schools, no houses, and no 2,800 wartime housing units have been converted into permanent structures.

All of it has meant a shot in the arm for the community. It has also brought progress. There have been law suits over how much the plant is operating companies over the counties and state.

On several occasions the city vote in Oak Ridge has turned out contrary to sentiment in other parts of the county. That happened in the local option liquor vote. Oak Ridge carried the rest of Anderson county, which had been dry. Ironically, liquor became an incorporated city.

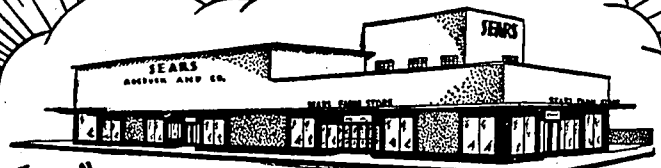

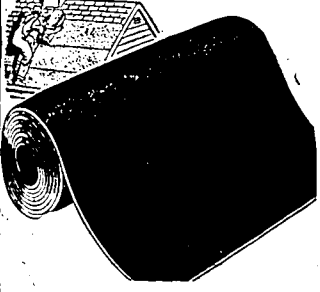

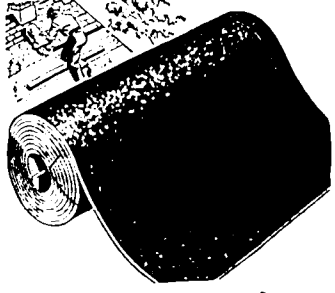

Byrnes Avers Russ Causing Globe Unrest

SPARTANBURG, S. C., March 24 (AP)—Secretary of State James P. Byrnes last night called for a strong national defense and charged the Soviet Union is directly responsible for the present unrest in the world.

"Right thinking people the world over will acquit us of responsibility for the existing situation," Byrnes declared in an address to a banquet during which he received the national citizenship award from the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

National VFW Comdr. Loyal T. Boggs made the presentation.

"There is No Peace"

"It is regrettable we must talk of war, but it is nearly four years since the cessation of hostilities in Europe. Today there is no peace," he said.

"Our efforts to make the peace have been futile," Byrnes declared.

He continued:

"The Soviets violated many solemn agreements with us. They took over by political infiltration and coercion governing after government until they control one half of Europe and indicate a desire to control the world. Finally they have caused the communists in this and in the countries of western Europe to announce that in case of war they will support the Soviet Union against the countries in which they live.

"Freedom to Draft Peace

"These are some of the things that have forced us to draft the Atlantic pact... when submitted to the state it should be ratified without delay.

"Because the Soviets seem to understand only the language of force we must continue our rearmament program and continue the production of atomic bombs... The present government in the Soviet Union will keep the peace as long as it is in their interest to do so. It will be in their interest to keep the peace as long as America stands firm and keeps strong."

ACA Officials Urge Support Plan Increase

BOISE, March 24 (AP)—Idaho ACA county committeemen favor continuing the price support program and its expansion to include several more crops.

A resolution adopted at the concluding session of the state-wide meeting yesterday asked that dry beans, barley, dry edible peas and Austrian peas be added to the list of basic commodities for acreage control and price support.

The group also recommended that an acreage equal to that diverted on each farm because of acreage allotments be put to soil conserving use.

Mini Insure Falls Price

"To insure farmers a fair share of the national income we must assure them fair prices—stable prices," the price support committee reported.

"We therefore consider that price support in its reality price stabilization and we believe that in return for the assurance of price stabilization the farmers of America will maintain production at levels high enough to meet the needs of an expanding economy and that they will willingly accept production adjustments, marketing quotas and other controls to prevent wasteful over-production."

Spud Grower Reports

The potato committee of the group made several recommendations which were adopted in a resolution. They included:

Provisions that marketing of any potatoes from the late goal acreage prior to Sept. 1 will render the operator ineligible for price support.

Retention of the regulations pertaining to storage requirements in connection with the 1949 potato program.

"Perishable Program Urged"

Provisions that the purchase program be flexible to allow the purchase of potatoes either on a fully-graded or on a grade-composition basis.

Provisions that conservation practices be used in the eligibility requirements for price support.

Provisions that in setting up acreage pools a five-year period be used for which the latest figures are available.

Tydings Sees Pact Boosting Service Need

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—Chairman William C. Tydings of the senate armed services committee believes America's military forces may have to be increased to meet the needs of the Atlantic pact defense commitments.

But the Maryland Democrat said that in the long run, the pact and its companion project for arms shipments to Europe should enable cutbacks in U. S. defense spending and in the size of American armed forces.

Plans Disclosed

As the arms program took shape, meanwhile, it was learned that:

1. Three regional defense setups may be established under the north Atlantic alliance. A tentative plan under consideration calls for three groupings: (a) The United States, Canada, Greenland and Iceland; (b) Britain, France and the Benelux countries; (c) the Scandinavian countries.

2. The national security requirements board has advised the state department that \$2,000,000,000 in first-year lend-lease spending would not dangerously deplete American resources or require new economic controls.

3. Diplomatic officials are ready to ask congress for "at least" a four-year program to build up the military strength of free nations with American arms.

Tydings' armed services committee soon will begin consideration of the military implications stemming from the anti-aggression treaty. He estimated that in four or five years the defense strength of western Europe could be built up to a point where it could supply and produce its own army, navy and air force.

European manpower equipped in part with American arms, Tydings reasoned, could take over an "appreciable" portion of the responsibility for defense of the Atlantic security zone.

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—Reclamation Commissioner Michael W. Straus, key figure in the latest fight between congress and the White House over the report, said he has no idea what the FBI says about him.

BALT LAKE CITY, March 24 (UP)—A mysterious 60-year-old prospector of the traditional "desert rat" description will lead an ultra-modern expedition being formed here today.

The scientific joint will bring the atom-age up to date on the southeastern plains area of Utah when the expedition begins the search for uranium by jeep and helicopter.

The grizzled old prospector and a few of his cronies will be joined on the search by geologists, meteorologists, mining engineers and students from the University of Utah and Stanford University.

Modern devices used: Two-way radios, Geiger counters, jeep and a helicopter will replace the old-timer traditional pickaxe, burro and bed roll.

A. E. Williams organizer of the expedition for the W-R-U Exploration company, said the old-timer know where the valuable bright yellow ore—once considered worthless—is to be found. All modern equipment and devices to be used in the search are ready to go and waiting at the staging area on the Green river.

By-products of uranium are expected to be found to pay for the expedition. The prospectors they hope to find for the big payoff is uranium which the raw material that made the atom bomb.

The identity of the old-timer—and his knowledge of the uranium deposits—are being held secret. Williams is afraid someone else will hire his prospector. The search will extend over a large area, facilitated by the adaptation of modern devices.

Amy Bernis Withheld Williams said that petrified wood one of the most profitable strata of the radioactive metal. He added that it bears 10 per cent uranium in its veins, but refused to divulge any reports on the samples. The atomic energy commission guarantees a price of \$250 per pound, less deductions for milling and smelting. This price is guaranteed for 10 years in order to stimulate the search for new sources. In addition a bonus of \$10,000 is offered by the commission for discovery and bringing into production any new major sources of the metal.

Grazing Fee Cut Seen for Winter Loss

WASHINGTON, March 24 (UP)—Western ranchers who had losses in the February blizzards may get a cut in federal grazing fees. Senator McCarran, D. Nev., said the interior department has agreed that some adjustment may be made pending that fees cannot be paid but that fees called under the grazing act is limited to the time during which the range is unusable by livestock.

Full Session Asked McCarran has asked for suspension of all fees in the storm-swept areas during 1949 and 1950.

Secretary of the Interior Krug told the senate in a letter that the relief could not be taken into consideration any financial distress of the range users.

However, congress has passed the Oranger bill to provide emergency loans to stockmen whose losses were so great as to impair their ability to obtain commercial loans.

New in Conference The bill is now in conference to adjust differences between senate and house versions.

Krug wrote that stockmen want to replace livestock lost in the blizzards and be given adjustment and that these adjustments may extend for one year or longer as circumstances warrant.
