It seems to me Mayor Lutterbeck's statement in the March 19 issue of the Times-News on the slot machine issue deserves careful consideration by every citizen of Twin Falls. The mayor lists a number of needed civic improvements which he says can be paid with funds obtained from the "one-armed bandit" and states "Twin Falls cannot afford these improvements otherwise."

The question which comes to me is: Can Twin Falls afford slot machines? When we read of little children going without their Christmas toys because their fathers pay check went into slot machines, of families falling to meet their payments on appliances needed in their homes because the money went into a slot machine, doesn't it appear that these civic improvements will

cost more than they are worth? If our county treasurer and tax collector demanded a salary equal to one-half of all the money he collected for the county, wouldn't his services come rather high? Can our city afford such an expensive tax collector as the slot machine? Of the 48 states, only Idaho and Nevada have legalized slot machines. Our citizens make frequent trips to other states and return to tell of wonderful roads and other civic improvements built with the funds of slot machines. Is it true that our beloved city cannot provide the money for these improvements without this device which takes the money from little children, food from their mouths and comforts from their homes? Being merely a resident and voter in Twin Falls, I wonder.

No Small Job—Moving 6,500 Sheep in Truck Fleet From Lambing Pens to Range

Truckloads of Sheep Are Transferred From Gooding Area to Spring Ranges

BY LETHA W. TESTER
GOODING, March 26.—Little lamb and their mamma, once not too many years ago, had to walk long weary miles to spring and summer pastures. Not so in this modern age—they ride in special double-deck trucks, a whole band at a time.

Probably some of the noisy din of traffic on a sheep ranch at this time of the year is the sound of double-deck trucks and trailers stretching almost endlessly down the highway waiting to be loaded. This scene is being duplicated on many a sheep ranch at this time of the year in the state as the bands are being moved from lambing sheds and feed lots out on the spring ranges.

The constant bleating of sheep, bawling of sheep dogs and shouting of men was an exhilarating scene on an early March morning as the sheep were being loaded on the J. C. Arkoosh ranch northeast of Gooding.

Five bands, four of ewes and lambs and one of yearlings, making a total of 6,500, were being moved to grazing areas in Owyhee, Lincoln and Gooding counties.

The operation has been made many times that people often are like sheep when it comes to accepting new ideas. The first one up the loading chute is hardest. The rest are handled easier. A man would be tending the truck to coax the first animal up toward the front.

If they were awarded more sheep could be loaded at a time. Some of the old ewes are so heavy with wool they can hardly make it up the loading chute.

Trucking lines are generally hired for the big job of moving sheep from winter quarters to spring and summer ranges, although some are used for smaller jobs. The cost is not too great and terrain is negotiable.

The care of sheep is a tedious task and requires the experience and knowledge of the animal. The Basques of Spain are among the best breeders and shepherders in Idaho particularly, most sheep herders are Basques.

It is here that the sheep dog is invaluable. A shepherd without a good dog is greatly handicapped. In fact the dog is a partner in the business.

Depending on the size of the band, that is the value placed on the care of the shepherd by the owner leaving him in complete charge. These employes are not bonded as required in many businesses.

The Greenhorn ranch, so named by Arkoosh when he came to the United States from Syria and undertook his new life as a complete ranchman, has now expanded to a total of 2,800 acres of irrigated land. There are 640 acres on the old home place from which the sheep were being moved.

No great winter loss of lambs was noted. However, most of the ewes are young and there were few multiple births, which did cut production to a small extent. Eweperman at the Greenhorn is Vic Pelech.

Last year 7,000 turkeys were raised at the Greenhorn, helping to supply the bird for festive holiday tables all over the country.

This year 7,000 poulets have been ordered and it is hoped to boost that number to 11,000.

Aside from the usual spring work on the ranch the next major project will be in connection with the turkey production.

Where there are hard-working men there must also be lots of good food. A visit to the cook house on the ranch was an amazing revelation. Such quantities of food! Such good food and so well cooked, too.

Twenty-pound beef roasts are average size. Mrs. Omer Fricke, cook, reports that she is now using the fifth beef for the winter. She has averaged 14 men a day since lambing got under way about Jan. 1.

Only instruction she had when taking the job was that the men should well-fed, on the floor that well-fed men are happy men.

and bell-ringer, but the dogs always have the last bow.
The dining room quickly fills and the seats at the table are taken. The small of good food is related as the large plates and dishes are passed.

After the first hunger pangs are satisfied, friendly chatter rises and laughter fills the room. There is much jesting about the morning's work, talk about the wool market and speculation of the summer ahead with the sheep.

As the bands of sheep go out the size of the crowd around the table daily grows smaller, until there soon will be only the ranch hands left. Not much time is wasted at the table. Each man gathers his dishes neatly and carries them to the wash table for the cook.

The men who eat at the cook-house, most of whom are Basques are not married. Family men live in tenant houses on the place. Mrs. Fricke and her family have their quarters in the cook-house.

There is much pride of the home place and its prospects felt by the two sons, John and George. They now operate the place established and built up by their father, who settled there soon after World War I.

The greatest pride of all, though, is shown toward little Joe and baby Michael, grandsons of the man who established the home. They are the sons of George, the younger brother, and the "finest there are," according to their Uncle John.

Britons Learn Virus May Be Cancer Cause

LONDON, March 26 (AP)—The British Medical Journal said today that recent experiments point to the conclusion that cancer is actually caused by a virus.

The nature of the virus and how to control it has not yet been established, according to the article by W. B. Oye, director of the Imperial Cancer Research fund.

But if this conclusion is correct, it would be the biggest advance in years of cancer research. Experiments conducted by Oye reported that he and Dr. Alan, Dr. James Craigie and Dr. A. M. Berg had found supporting evidence in experiments on mice during the past decade.

He said they determined that cancer disease which had been frozen for a few minutes and then transplanted to another mouse results in the original tissue multiplying.

Later experiments, however, indicated that malignant cancer cells, killed by extreme cold, are "revived" because of starting a new, strictly new tumor in virtue of the intrinsic virus which they contain.

Whether the virus is of intrinsic or extrinsic origin is still unknown, he said.

The experimental evidence points to the conclusion that cancer has a continuing cause, and that this is a virus, he concluded.

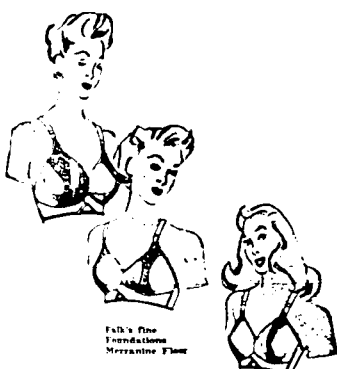

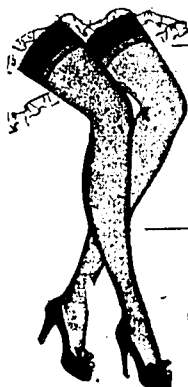

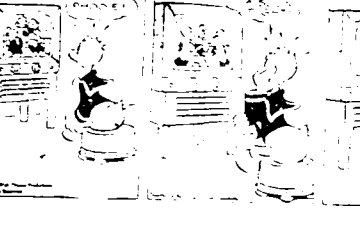

Those who are privileged to walk in the country on a clear, moonless night, far from interfering artificial illumination, are quite aware that by no means is it really dark. Buildings, trees and objects are easily distinguished, and it is not difficult to see their outlines. While it is natural to suppose that the stars light our way, yet studies by astronomers without doubt indicate that hardly more than four percent of the light of the night sky is from visible stars. The rest of the light comes from the sun, moon and planets. The sun's light is scattered by the atmosphere and is visible as a faint glow. 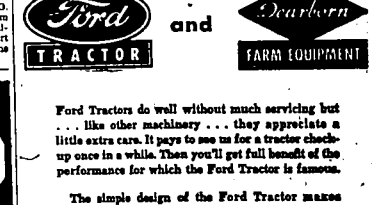

ACA's Labor Pay on Beets Is Announced

RUPERT, March 26—Carl Mers, chairman of the Mindoka county agricultural conservation committee, has announced the minimum wage rate which farmers must pay for work performed on the 1948 crop of sugar beets in Idaho for government payment eligibility. The rates were determined to be fair and reasonable following public hearings held during January in the main sugar producing areas of the United States.

Work performed on a time basis, the chairman explained, the minimum wage rate is 60 cents per hour for thinning, hoeing or weeding; and 65 cents per hour for pulling, topping and loading.

Teen-Age Rates
For workers between 15 and 16 years of age, Mers added, the above wage rates may be reduced by not more than one-third. Also, workers of this age group may not be employed more than eight hours per day.

For work performed on a piece rate basis in southern and eastern Idaho the minimum rate for hoeing and finger-thinning fields planted with segmented seed without machine hoeing will be 112 per acre and for fields with machine blocking the rate will be 89 per acre. The rate for hoe thinning with finger thinning will be 87 per acre, regardless of the type of seed.

Subsequent Work
A minimum rate of 84 per acre is set for the first hoeing following hoe and finger thinning of any type seed, and 81 is the minimum rate for the first hoeing following hoe-thinning of any type seed. For the second and each subsequent hoeing or weeding of any type seed, the minimum rate is 61 per acre. The basic piecework rate for thinning fields planted with natural whole seed shall be 82 more per acre than those specified above.

Mers said that certain reductions may be made where field are planted in wider rows than usual. Also, he said, in instances where cross hoeing or weeding, the specified first hoeing rate may be reduced not in excess of 41 per acre, and the specified subsequent hoeing or weeding rate may be reduced not in excess of 30 cents per acre.

Other Rates
Where a written agreement provides for a combined rate for "summer work," the rate for such work, regardless of the number of hoeing or weeding operations, shall be the sum of the applicable thinning, hoeing and weeding rates specified above.

These minimum wage rates must be met in full by producers, the chairman advised, before they become eligible to receive the government payment provided by the sugar act of 1948. He encouraged producers whose sugar beet labor will be performed on a different basis than that mentioned above to contact the county office in Rupert to make sure he is meeting the minimum requirements adequately.
