TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—Under severe cross-examination at a closed conference with foreign affairs experts on both sides of Capitol Hill, Secretary Acheson has convinced the press that he will actually hold the national flag aloft to declare war when it appears the north Atlantic treaty, with its guarantee that an attack on any signatory shall be regarded as aggression against all.

The former corporation lawyer, however, did not say whether he was "abandoning" his previous position of proposed approval of a pact that would have authorized the United States to take its measure under certain circumstances. He admitted, though, that the treaty was actually drafted by the State Department's exclusive war-making authority to the chief executive.

State department lawyers wrestled for weeks to devise language that would appear to reconcile American participation in the anti-Russian alliance with the constitutional requirement that only the elected representatives should make a formal commitment. It was their most difficult task in framing the actual document.

SITUATION—As the situation now stands, according to the Acheson and congressional veranda, the president still has the exclusive power to recognize and declare the existence of a state of war. He has divided this authority with the State Department, but the latter's power is limited to the first time the president can go to war, even though an outbreak does not directly involve U. S. territory, national interests or honor.

State department lawyers wrestled for weeks to devise language that would appear to reconcile American participation in the anti-Russian alliance with the constitutional requirement that only the elected representatives should make a formal commitment. It was their most difficult task in framing the actual document.

CHASTENED—President Truman exhibited a chastened mood when he conferred with the members of the cabinet on his recent return from the White House. He is not so bold or optimistic for the four days which he has spent during his first vacation. He apparently means to try the "mole" clause in the legislation as a result of their failure to respond to the "mole" clause.

Speaker Rayburn and Vice President Barkley assured him that they could find enough from the bill to permit the president to act. The bill cannot lead, and that a Democratic congress will not follow. Here is the outline they gave him of prospective action on the four issues that have gone sour from his original viewpoint:

CONGRESS—Recent action: Congress will enact a law permitting a 10 or 15 per cent increase in the right to decontrol in areas no longer suffering from housing shortage. They assured Mr. Truman that the latter provision will be included in the national statute package, as Sam Rayburn said, will dare to lift a lid on rent. It would be political death.

Red Rights—Congress will probably get around to taking action against labor's right to strike. Legislation to bar segregation or to establish the fair employment practices committee is out. Southern members may expect to get a bill out of the committee that they are harmless under present conditions.

FILIBUSTERS—Clairmont. The Hayden-Wherry resolution for barring filibusters except on bills providing for a constitutional two-thirds vote will be adopted. The White House maintains that it is an improvement on the existing statute and that the southern bloc for failure of the Truman plan.

MARCANTONIO—Vito Marcantonio, a Wallace party member of the only American labor party member of the Senate, has been elected to the Senate. He has a record of liberal and house associate by his justice and anti-segregation laws during consideration of the rent control and anti-segregation bills.

He did not insist on a non-segregation clause when the rent measure was before the house, although he had been asked to do so. He bowed to the arguments of Democratic Whip Frank Potts, whose caucus had indicated that the renewal of rent control would be a political disaster if it were incorporated, or if it were defeated by a floor vote.

On this question, Marcantonio abandoned his ideological case.

LINE—But he pressed the same proposal when the anti-segregation bill was before the Senate. He wanted to amend the measure. He also forced a vote on the final action in order to express his sentiment.

Now his New York seat side followers figure he ran out on the anti-segregation bill. His insistence on introducing this controversial question into the Senate is accepted as evidence that he follows the "mole" clause.

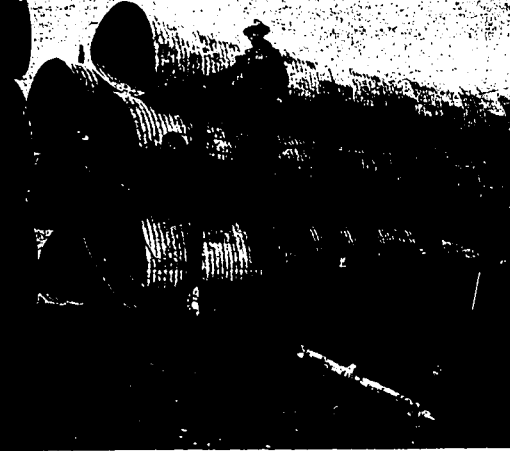
