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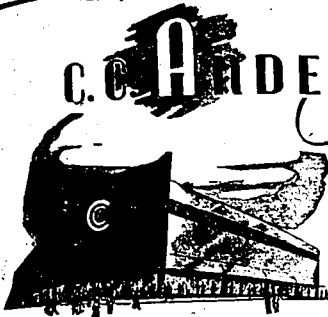

USDA Does Darndest Things; Now It's 'Survey' on Clothes

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—Your department of agriculture, which knows all about oats, peas, beans and barley and how much wool you can scrape off a lamb's back, has come up with a startling announcement.

It's a survey of the clothing habits of the men in America. The survey is being conducted by the Bureau of Economic Warfare, not only in the United States, but in 42 other countries.

All of this interesting stuff and a lot more is contained in a 16-page, single-spaced document (printed on both sides) which the department had got out.

The agriculture people said they were working in the interest of the cotton, wool, rayon and nylon folks. During a six-week period, agents of the department surveyed the male population (cross-sectionwise) by actual count, 2,000 from all walks of life for information about who wears what and who buys it.

The survey people got pretty noisy. They asked about buttons, shirts, summer sports shirts, extra pants, summer suits, socks, underwear, pajamas, rubbers and raincoats. The department figures the cross-section speaks for some 50,000,000 males over the age of 16.

In a summary, it says that while all men own underwear, socks and at least one Sunday-go-to-meetin' suit, only about half have a wool shirt, or a bathrobe or a cool suit for summer.

Of the cross-section, it says on page seven, only 53 per cent of our men folks own pajamas. Apparently 47 per cent sleep in the raw, although my agents say "this may vary from California to Arkansas, to Texas."

Sixty per cent of our men are prepared when it rains, although it isn't known how many have the raincoat at home or at the office when it rains in the morning and vice versa. "Thirty-six per cent wear any old thing in the rain and the other four per cent interviewed didn't know whether they own! raincoats or not, not having looked in the attic or basement recently."

Clinics of the report was most fascinating.

The table was a result of the question: "Do you select most of your clothing or does someone else buy it for you?"

Fifty-nine per cent of those polled will let the little woman go along to help her pick out a suit. As a matter of fact, except for pajamas and bedlinens, most guys don't want to make any more noise when they pick out things to wear.

BOISE, March 31 (AP)—Only five counties in Idaho remain completely unreorganized, figures in the state department of education revealed today.

The counties are Elmore, Lewis, Blaine, Gooding and Owyhee.

The department of education figures show that 74 per cent of the children attending school in Idaho now are attending in reorganized districts.

This has saved the state and counties approximately \$47,000 in school apportionment.

Most of the districts which have refused to come into reorganization programs are small districts with high property evaluation, the department figures show. In some of the districts, children of high school age are sent to nearby districts which have high schools.

Concessioner Lark Bothers Park Service

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—The national park service had disapproved today it is having some trouble getting persons to run the 250 concessions in the national parks.

The concessioners have an annual gross revenue of more than \$20,000,000.

Within the past year, however, the interior department has adopted a formal concession policy. It calls for government ownership and private operation, fair returns for the concessioner and, in general, contracts to a single concessioner for all operations in a given area.

"With our policy established, we have been trying to firm up our contracts," Oliver O. Taylor, chief of concessions, told a reporter.

"We have advertised in a number of cases, without much success."

"As a result, for some small operations we are getting the work by permit rather than by contract."

"And for larger dealings it has been necessary to extend some contracts, due to expire this June, until the end of the year. During the additional six months they will be advertised in another try for a concession contract."

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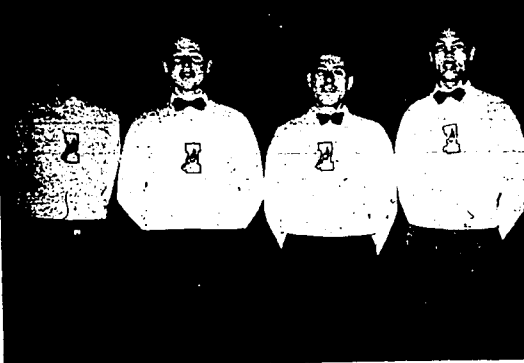

Pacific States Top Nation in Jobless Rolls

SAN FRANCISCO, March 31—Unemployment in California, Washington and Oregon is double the rate for the nation as a whole, a United Press survey showed today.

In fact, one fifth of the nation's unemployment is located in the three Pacific Coast states.

The federal security agency estimates there are more than 700,000 able-bodied working men and women out of jobs in the three states.

As many as 300,000 are unemployed in California, state officials estimated almost 800,000 are unemployed—figures the state CIO criticizes as too low. The union claims more than 800,000 unemployed in California.

In Oregon, unemployment hit a new postwar peak of 91,200 this winter and in Washington about 120,000 out of work in February, the CIO says.

These statistics do not provide the full picture, for they fail to show the under-employment picture that occurs when men are not working full time.

Two Reasons Cited

Labor unions and federal state employment experts say there are two reasons for the high unemployment rates in the Pacific states are leading the U. S. in unemployment:

1. The collapse of the tremendous wartime boom in heavy industries and related small shop plants.

2. Seasonal layoffs in the lumber, agriculture and food processing industries.

"I have invited these Europeans to help find the answer to the most important questions of our time: How can we bridge the dangerously widening gap between east and west? How can we find an amicable solution, with justice for both sides?"

Wallace identified the three men who he said have accepted his invitation as H. Lester Hutchinson, labor party member of the British house of commons; Pierre Cot, independent member of the French chamber of deputies, and Michele Clusa, left socialist member of the Italian senate.

Surplus of 1948 Grain to Remain At Harvest Time
