### Copper Price Eyed for Hike Of Its Supply

NEW YORK, April 1.—Things seemed to prosper in the copper market. Copper, steel and crude oil have been the major holdouts this spring as other commodities slipped up to lower levels.

Producers of all three contended they are not ready to start cutting production of copper, steel and oil at present levels until early summer at the earliest.

That-to-date-by cutting oil production—the "stayed" purpose of holding the price of oil up.

Market is flat.

But the copper market has come up. It is being bought by the steel industry. They think the copper supply can't hold at 23 1/2 cents a pound, where it has been since Aug. 3, 1938, after a series of jumps from the 19-20 cent level.

But the steel industry is not so strongly, that the price will hold. They say recent strikes have cut the supply of steel, and that the steel industry and the steel mill itself of industrial activity assume that of an adequate steel for the metal until the first of June, at least.

Test Begins Today.

The test for the two theories has begun today.

It is thought that the copper will take up all the demand for steel.

Fabricators say the price of copper should be higher than steel. They say a pound of copper is worth more than a pound of steel. That's what they want, of course, because fabricators are the men who buy the copper and turn out the copper wire for your telephone and power lines, for the refrigerator, washer, radio, even auto and for the copper, brass and bronze parts in machinery, hardware, furniture and home building.

### Reactor-Plant Site Declared Past "Hitters"

WASHINGTON, April 1.—The Aro area of Idaho where a vast atomic reactor works will be built in a region which once was one of the blindest bits of landscape in the continent.

But a spokesman said today, the atomic energy commission does not great trouble from mother earth when it erects the "big new" where it will build and test atomic reactors.

The commission has conducted exhaustive geological studies of the site. All buildings put to it will be specifically designed to make them proof against any earthquake tremors.

Near Lava Craters

Just south of the Aro area is a pocketmarked, lava-encrusted wasteland called "The Craters of the Moon." It is an extinct volcano region once tortured by violent eruptions of which the earth trembled. Some 80 square miles of the area have been designated a national monument.

According to the National Geographic society "it contains more volcanic features than are found in comparable spots anywhere in the United States."

Geologist conjecture that the fiery force that cracked open the earth and threw up the rolling lava and rocks may have been active for thousands of years, and that the volcanic features have occurred only a few centuries ago, the society said.

As recently as the early 1920s, the society said, few persons other than local Indians had dared to venture into "the variety known as the lava beds of Idaho."

But the region to the north where the atomic reactor works will be established is less desolate. It also is geologically well-behaved, a geologist spokesman said.

### No Jobs at Atom Plant's Site Yet, Bulletin-Reports

There will be immediate openings for workers at the site of the proposed atomic energy plant near Arco for several months, the Idaho state employment service says in its weekly bulletin.

Because of the opening of the new Sears, Roebuck and company store here, there was a slight decrease in job openings. The retail store had 163 employees for its opening, according to the bulletin, and will employ 170 people on a full-time basis to fill positions, it said.

At Hazelton, the Best-Growers warehouse "ended the seasonal run and laid off 30 seed workers." The bulletin notes that fields in the Gooding area are nearly dry enough for spring work.

Construction work is under way at Arco on a minor scale, the bulletin reports.

### Hard-Headed, Tough-Bottomed Bees Could Hike Seed Output

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Did you ever see a bee with a tough bottom?

Did you ever see a bee with an iron jaw like Jack Dempsey?

If you did, you had either kind of bee that is a Hamiltonian bee.

Scientists are making research center, telephone TOW 6450. No other bees are known to have this quality.

Hamilton wants to start a new family of tough-jawed, thick-skulled, iron-bottomed bees to wrestle with the battling alfalfa blossom.

Most bees can't stand up to this blossom punch. The little stamen that is attached to its side, is under tension, like the spring in a mousetrap.

The stamen is the little gadget in the blossom that contains pollen. When the bee takes in his direction to collect nectar or pollen he trips the stamen.

It lets go and whips him on his chin or between the eyes or on his piggy back, depending on whether he is a honey bee or "you" at the moment.

Hamilton, who has eye-witnessed a lot of these alfalfa-bee bouts, says the bee gets a midging good blow. Pollen flies in all directions.

They learn quickly they develop a violent dislike for alfalfa. They learn it alone. Therefore all alfalfa blossoms given to test bees it is the bee that carries pollen from plant to plant.

Loss to farmers is heavy. In Utah alone the alfalfa seed crop has fallen from 25,000,000 pounds a year to about 4,000,000. It's worth about 60 cents a pound. U. S. production last year was about 60,000,000 pounds worth \$36,000,000. It would

have been much more except for that looking stamen.

You can see that many millions of dollars are going to be lost unless scientists figure out a way to make the "bee" make the alfalfa plant "stop their fight."

Scientists can do more with the alfalfa-making-bee than with almost any other creature. They reproduce quickly and traits can be set to families.

If the bee breeders could get just one family of bees started with an irresistible desire for alfalfa they could soon produce many hives of these bees.

Hamilton is attempting to breed such bees now, but it would help if you could find a bee with all the specifications for battling alfalfa blossoms already built into him.

### British Door Widened for U. S. Movies

LONDON, April 1 (AP)—British has opened its doors to additional American movies, but British exhibitors said the check was not wide enough.

Commonwealth approved a government bill to reduce the quota of British films which British exhibitors must show from 45 to 40 per cent. American films will make up nearly 60 per cent of the 40 per cent of foreign movies that must be shown.

**"Adequate Care"**  
 But a spokesman for the Cinemaograph Exhibitors association said this was inadequate care for diminishing audiences and profits. The exhibitors wanted the quota of all-foreign British film shows reduced to 25 per cent because, he said, "the public wants to see more American films."

The exhibitors said the all-British film industry cannot possibly make enough good films this year to fill even the new 40 per cent quota.

**"Doesn't Have Capacity"**  
 The industry that doesn't have the capacity at present to make that many films for general release, the exhibitors' spokesman said. "As a result the British film units will continue to churn out films which the public will not pay to see."

To meet the proper balance, he said, the quota should be set at 25 per cent because, he said, "the exhibitors want to concentrate on a few good films and would let the powerful American film industry move in with films the public wants to see."

### Clague Revises Price Forecast For Next Year

WASHINGTON, April 1 (AP)—Dr. E. S. Clague, commodity labor statistician, estimated today that consumer prices will rise less than 10 per cent on the average in the next few years.

He issued a statement to express what he described as a "very important" forecast from a speech he made in Philadelphia in the Tripartite Association of Public Employment Services.

**Price increases expected here in Philadelphia on the evening of March 30 indicate that I predicted a decline of 10 per cent in the cost of living in 1942.** Dr. Clague said here.

"The improvement which I forecast to come was that consumers retail prices after World War II would not fluctuate as sharply up or down as they did in 1920-21 when there was a drop of 20 per cent."

"I indicated in my speech that 10 per cent during the next few years would be the outside limit of a decline from the 1942 peak."
