British Door Widened for U. S. Movies

LONDON, April 1 (UPI) — Britain has opened its doors to additional American movies, but British exhibitors said the check was not wide.

Commonwealth approved a government bill to reduce the quota of British films which British cinemas must show from 40 per cent to 30 per cent. And film will make up only all of the 40 per cent of foreign movies that may be shown under the new quota.

"Inadequate Quota"

But a spokesman for the Cinematograph Exhibitors Association said the bill would not increase the number of British audiences and profits. The exhibitors wanted the quota of required British film shows reduced to 20 per cent, he said, "the public wants to see more American films."

The exhibitors said the bill would not be effective unless it made enough good films this year to fill even the new 40 per cent quota.

"Doors Have Capacity"

"The industry doesn't have the capacity to produce more than 30 million more films in general release," the exhibition spokesman said. "An increase in quota would not move us to churn out films which the public will not pay to see."

To meet the proper balance, he said, quota would have to drop to 10 per cent. This would permit British producers to concentrate on a few good films and would let independent American studios' industry move in with films the public wants to see."

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Special Hunt Fees Killed; New Licenses Arrive Late

When big game season rolls around, Idaho hunters will not roll out their dollars for special hunts. The fees were abolished by the last session of the legislature.

The change was the only alteration in fish and game license charges made by the thirteenth session. All fees for resident, non-resident and alien licenses remain the same as they were the last two years.

According to the Associated Press, the state Game and Fish Department announced Thursday that 1948 licenses would be good until April 10. The department said it was necessary to extend the date because of the late arrival of license fees. No fees would be received from the printers in time to distribute them at the start of the license year.

R. E. Hoffman, chief clerk, said she 1948 licenses will be sold in the mail within a few days. They are being mailed to 550 vendors throughout the state.

During the extension period, any person holding a valid 1948 license may buy another. The extension of April, Hoffman said. License fees are the same as they were last year. A combination fishing and hunting license costs \$10. Nonresident fishing and hunting licenses are \$3 each.

Fish and game fees are set at this time of season, the department said. The license season does not open until April 4.

The special hunt fees that were eliminated were established by the legislature many years ago. Authority to impose them has always been given to the department, the department pointed out.

The legislative act which relieved the fish and game commission provided that the commission can determine seasons and methods of take but retains the authority to fix fees and fine for violations.

Controlled or so-called special hunts will continue as a part of the game and fish administration policy, the game and fish department said.

Clarke said: "The only difference will be that no extra charge will be made for permits in the past the fees will be paid for permits in the amount of \$3. The fee for a special elk permit is \$3. A few more permits have been issued in the last year than \$30 each, but there is a small limit on the number of hunting permits have been granted."

This year there will be no fee for special antelope permits. A special antelope license and a tag may take part in a special hunt providing his name is drawn as one of the lucky applicants.

More persons will get a chance at special hunts under the new act. The same law also makes a hunt available to the public for the first time in the hunting among the neighbors.

If a person gets a permit this year and shot game on the special hunt, he may not be eligible for a drawing in 1949-1950, or 1950-51.

Language of the law reads: "No person who shall secure a permit to hunt on the hunt may not appear for a special hunt or participate in a drawing for a special hunt permit for the same kind of game for a period of three years."

This means the game department said, that an individual who draws a deer permit in 1948 and kills a deer on the hunt may not appear for a special hunt or participate in a drawing for a special hunt permit for the same kind of game for a period of three years."

It is not made clear if the individual is still not made eligible for a drawing after three years, and may go on drawing every year until he makes a kill. Then he will have to sit out three years before he is eligible again.

He may apply for special elk hunts, however. It works the same way as the deer permit. He must have an elk permit and draw a kill. It is not eligible for a special elk hunt for three years.

"The new special hunt law," said Bladieu, "will require great deal of planning and bookkeeping in the department. We will have to make game crop in areas where controlled hunts are necessary will be continued as before."

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
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
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
