

River Water  
Analyzed for  
**'Salt' Content**

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, April 2.—Water from the Boise River has been analyzed for mineral salts and water used for irrigation in Idaho report Max C. Jensen, irrigation and Glenn G. Lewis, agricultural chemist at the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station.

The water tested second in purity with water from the Spokane River, outside of Lake Coeur d'Alene and used on Rathdrum Prairie, according to the report.

**Eastern Idaho High**  
Water from the Bear river and Portneuf river, Idaho, shows the highest mineral salt content. The range was from about 50 parts per million for the Boise—a minimum of 12 parts per million for the railroads—more than 500 parts per million for the Bear and Portneuf.

Idaho's biggest source of irrigation water is the Snake River which showed a fairly low mineral salt content at the headwaters but this content steadily increased downstream to the stream.

In cooperation with the leading irrigation companies in the state, the university's agricultural experiment station has been studying the mineral salt content of the rivers supporting Idaho's 2,500,000 irrigated acres.

**Sampling Stations**

Eighteen sampling stations were set up in the rivers and streams by the cooperating irrigating companies.

From April to October last year, watermen and ditch riders with the cooperation of irrigation companies made two-week trips around the state.

Every two months Jensen made a 2,000 mile swing around the 18 sampling stations and compared the results with those obtained at the first sampling.

**Analyses Made**

Approximately three complete samples, each a half gallon, were sent to the university for analysis.

Tests were made for calcium, magnesium, sodium, potassium, carbonates, bicarbonate, sulfate and chloride content.

Analyses showed that mineral salt content of Idaho water ranges from almost pure rainwater to slightly over 500 parts per million, even the water with the highest mineral salt content was still classed as "good," according to the best yardstick now available," comments O. O. Baker, soil technologist with the experiment station.

"The regional salinity laboratory of the U.S. department of agriculture made analyses of mineral parts per million of total mineral salt, not more than 60 percent of which can be adsorbed," says Baker. "This means that the irrigation waters tested so far are well within these permissible limits."

Purpose of this water research is to develop Idaho's own irrigation water standards for measuring water quality, Jensen explains.



## Fight Slated As 'Hoppers Give Threats

**By ROBERT E. CHIGER**  
WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—The agriculture department says one of the greatest grasshopper outbreaks since World War II is under way in western and midwestern states this summer.

But already the department's "task force" is getting set with two new planes—and an old O-43 transport plane, smaller planes and some old bi-planes to combat insects in their nursery grounds.

The task force is a group of bug experts headed by H. L. Dethman, chief of entomology and plant quarantine headed by W. L. Ephrussi, chief of insect control. It will attempt to keep the pests from becoming a "serious nursery" in Montana and Wyoming before heavy damage occurs.

Are up pastures.

Last year 60,000 cattle had to be moved from this area because grasshoppers ate all of the pasture.

If task force zero-zero fails to kill the hoppers in the nursery area to the west, they will eat their way eastward several hundred miles then head down for the winter and repeat the damage and start all over again, threatening damage the crops of Iowa and other Midwestern states.

That would mean billions of dollars worth of damage in the U.S. serious plagues have occurred about every 10 years.

First Major Attack

This will be the first time that a mass-scale air attack has been made on grasshopper breeding grounds.

The two new propeller-driven aircrafts can fly at 200 miles per hour, making them twice as fast as the planes mixed with gear.

The old planes were built so they have taken 300 flights and 70 more since 1935. They don't spread the poison "bait." Even then all of the area couldn't have been covered because they fly at 100 miles per hour.

Now department experts believe they can cover the entire nursery area in 10 hours, starting Saturday morning at 6 A.M. and ending at 4 P.M.





You all know Bertha and Mary. Even I never mentioned their last names, you'd know. I mean, Mrs. Bertha Falgren, and Mary Spearman; you know, they live in that old white house on Main Street. They have a porch with the prettiest pink and shades of bright-colored roses and dogwoods. When I walk by I always wonder how they manage to have such shiny windows. You can't tell what the depth in each painting or not, but first you see cool water, then a bridge and more water that seems to go on and on. Finally, a waterfall, a very lovely waterfall.

Who would love to eat food from such a set? Who would?






