### Fishers Hit Planned Boost in Mail Rates

"Some farm organizations are showing interest in water pollution," Post said. "It is perhaps the best solution to the problem. Legislation would be ineffective unless people believed it necessary and demanded it."

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—The growing frozen orange juice industry probably will have a stabilizing influence on orange prices, the agriculture department disclosed today.

Dr. O. E. Hilbert, chief of the department's industrial chemistry bureau, said the frozen orange juice business has mushroomed into a major industry in Florida and is expanding in California.

Florida Got Jump  
It is estimated that 900,000 gallons of Florida orange juice will be converted into frozen concentrate in Florida this year, he said. In California about 600,000 gallons will be converted, he said.

The frozen concentrate industry will help use up the huge surplus of oranges that causes a price slump at the height of the season, he said.

Spreads Distribution


