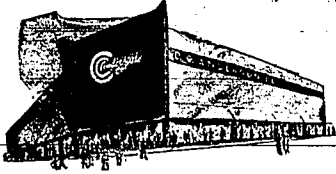

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The persistent but unpublishable program of labor and workmen's delegations from Scandinavian, western European and Mediterranean, through the state department to finally the Marshall plan and the north Atlantic pact attempt to prevent further expansion of Soviet domination.

Numerous groups have visited the United States from Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Finland, Portugal and Italy. In some instances they are privately admitted membership in the Social Democratic parties which have great voice in the labor and political movements of those countries. In others they are merely selected groups of plain, ordinary factory employes.

While it is possible that they may pick up tricks and techniques that will help them to back home, especially the delegation which came from England, the principal purpose of this so-called "imperialistic" nation-around-the-world, and international workers' congress of starvation.

STRIKES—Their guides, who have been drawn from the A.P.C. and the C.I.O., are instructed in advance by semi-official spokesmen on how best to impress the American public with the value of their mission.

The strikers were immediately struck by the widespread ignorance of their history and the home conditions, their dress and by the meat they were served in the homes.

They are told that the foreign groups were given a chance to see these evidences of American workers' progress. These tours were "guided" and "directed". Moreover, the visitors were to see the operations of the great industries—steel, automobile and electrical.

The significant conclusion is that many of these workers, and especially the labor leaders, have also visited Russia.

BOOST—It is the expectation of state department, A.P.C. and C.I.O. officials who have personal reasons for opposing the communist cliques seeking to join their major unions, that these pilgrims will return home to spread the word for the western system of industrial organization.

By the same token, they are counted on to become boosters of the Marshall plan as it is designed to increase their production and boost their wages.

The exchange of workers' techniques is an extension of the system under the Marshall plan, and is a mutual migration of men in overall instead of so-called intellectuals in caps and gowns.

QUESTION—The evidence of prosperity and disturbing question of the labor movement. They could not understand why the vast industrial production of the United States was not organized a labor, or Social Democratic party, or union in their own homes.

Oddly enough, it was Sen. Lewis who gave them the most satisfactory answer. The president of the United States, who they had seen, was the man of whom they were most interested, explaining to the diversity of interests among our working groups prevented them from agreement on economic and political tactics.

EMPLOYERS of mass industries, he pointed out, had little to complain about as it is designed to emphasize that it was more effective for the workers placed within the framework of the two major parties.

WORD—Although President Truman surprised his political friends by his refusal to sign the Hoover committee for reorganization of the government, Hoover was the first prominent Democrat to speak kindly of the C.I.O. chief in the House.

HOUSE has passed word against any attempt to carry out the recommendations for reform.

HOOPER—Hoover disagreed with the Hoover proposal. The fact is that he has been too busy to do more. But he has so many congressional troubles and worries now that he cannot take the time to do so and appreciate them by backing the far-reaching plan of the federal structure suggested by "the great engineer."

BUTMINDING—Almost every proposed shuffling of government departments and agencies is a case of some downland bureaucracy. Every assistant secretary, bureau chief and petty official has a small faction of representatives of his own interests for whose favors he pleads.

As a result, there are so many hostile congressional cliques that the reform program would be torn to shreds. It is never permitted in the House and in the Senate. Mr. Truman does not intend to chance a further loss of his already diminishing store of credit with the other end of PENNSYLVANIA.

An even more practical explanation for inaction is the fact that the Hoover House has assigned the task of analyzing the Hoover report to the Hoover bureau. Under the Roosevelt-Truman system, the underlings enjoy almost absolute power and would be stripped of their far-flung authority under many of the former President's recommendations. So, it is expected that they will turn thumbs down on all except a few innocuous suggestions.

"WASHINGTON CALLING" BY MARQUIS CHILDS

WASHINGTON—When newspeople pre-empted walked out and forced the suspension of all Washington news...

The arbitrary behavior of such labor leaders as John L. Lewis produces arbitrary and irrational anger in congress. No one is more aware of this irrationality than Sen. Irving

Senator Lewis still hopes he is spared what he considers a "reasonable" labor law. He is working closely with Sen. Robert A. Taft in hopes of a compromise that virtually all Republicans and enough Democrats will accept.

Senator Taft tends to favor keeping some sort of right of injunction which would enable the government to halt by court order strikes considered threatening to the national welfare. If Senator Taft finally agrees to the injunction, he will insist that it be linked with a provision governing the government's power to seize and operate industries in which workers are forced by a court order to stay on the job.

Discussion of why and wherefore on the Taft-Hartley act has at this moment a pretty academic sound. The question to be debated four months from now is likely to be whether the blame for the failure of congress to act.

Most Republicans think they have succeeded in pushing the President on a hot spot. But that perpetual maverick, Sen. Wayne Wheeler, Oregon, strongly disagrees. In an off-the-record talk before a group of house Republicans the other night he said:

"Don't think you will ever again get any votes from labor, because you have organized labor groups in strength. You will be picked off one by one. Don't deceive yourself into thinking the injunction has kept men at work. It hasn't stirred a ton of coal and the maritime strike ran 65 days in spite of it."

In a brave, confident way the administration talked at the start of the session about Taft-Hartley action in 30 days. Ninety days have passed and any action seems further away than ever. Actually, this is not so much a changed climate as it is a simple atmosphere that prevailed during the two years of the 89th congress. The dominant theme was frustration compounded with delay.

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OUR BAD MANNERS

Britain's Foreign Minister Bevin was the target of eggs and vegetables when he arrived in this country to sign the North Atlantic treaty. They were thrown by members of Jewish youth organizations who objected to his handling of the Palestine situation.

Britain's former Prime Minister Churchill, another visitor, was accused in the senate of being a "cold-blooded propagandist" for war and was virtually called a liar to boot. The charges were made by Senator Langer, who refused to accept Mr. Churchill's denial that he fought with Spain against the United States in 1938.

These and other similar instances have left us wondering whether a free citizen of this self-governing country to guess his little that he usually carries a guest in his own house.

Mr. Bevin, man of his beliefs, has not always acted justly or honestly toward Israel. But eggs and tomatoes aren't going to make him repent. Senator Langer, who has never been wrong, may not like Mr. Churchill. But he is calling him a New York night club bouncer.

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There is nothing to be done about all this, so it is useless to complain. But we still hope to see the Jewish-American-American-American receive an eminent and friendly foreign guest with courtesy, even though they may disagree with him, rather than with eggs, lemons and pelet-hines.

FAREWELL PARTY

We were reading the other day about a new television store in Englewood, N. J., which presented gifts to every purchaser of a new set on its opening day.

It was like the good old days of the story began. In a way it was. And the cash customers probably enjoyed the experience of being wowed again by a storekeeper after years of shortages and seller's markets.

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From now on these suburbanites will be getting most such entertainment in the living room. The high lights of Broadway will be summoned up by the film of the screen, and without the attendant bother of traffic, parking, crowds and cover charges.

TROUBLE IN PARADISE

There's trouble in the proletarian paradise. Earl Browder, ousted leader of the American communists, has been taking some pokes at the party's present leadership in a series of pamphlets. The Daily Worker, official CP organ, has been purchasing the pamphlets, purged by the party for "infantile" criticisms and similar crimes, have joined the handbill war of words.

The squabble in itself is important only to the squabblers, and we mention it simply because it may be a symptom of the general disagreement that seems to be upsetting the sternly disciplined household of world communism.

Mr. Browder incurred the wrath of the party last year by a pamphlet on "Chinese Lessons for American Marxists." In it he pointed out the material difficulties that Chinese communists face in trying to bring about socialist economic reforms in that backward, war-torn country. He told how Mao Tse-tung and Chen En-shan's two top reds, had met those difficulties by repudiating Marxist dogmatism.

In Russia everything is under the thumb of the ruling clique. Outside the Soviet Union independent action by communists might lead to independence of thought. That is why the Kremlin is worried.

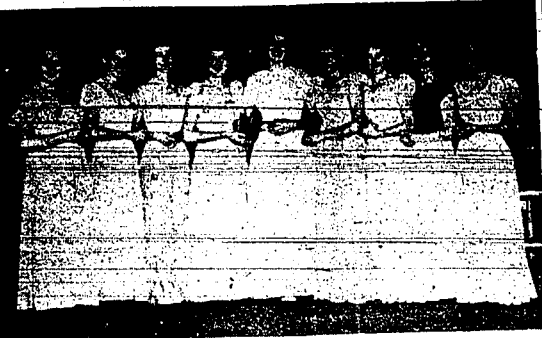

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

In stressing the instruction and development of the individual pupil, the teacher is aware of the value of class unity, especially in the classes where younger children are present.

Little children need to feel the presence of companions of their own age, and to have their first human being but it can be frighteningly lonely for a child freshly launched on the unknown sea of school life. The teacher, who comes from unity at the beginning, at the end, occasionally between lines, the class should act as a unit. They can sing together, and give their own little lift and wipes out many a personal worry. Rhythm and action in rhythm is a joy to little children. The best sets their whole bodies in motion and the march, the tread measured to the beat, brings relief from pressure and a relaxation of body and mind.

The games that call for group play, taking hold of hands and singing the while, have a kindly influence on the bodies and minds of little children who have been held to a line of duty for an hour or so. They have been feeling alone in cold world where they were called on to stand stiff and deliver a long individual and have their first human sympathy and good will.

In the classroom it is well, occasionally to sit together; the class that has been studying together and allied matters as individuals and as a group, to a concerted singing. 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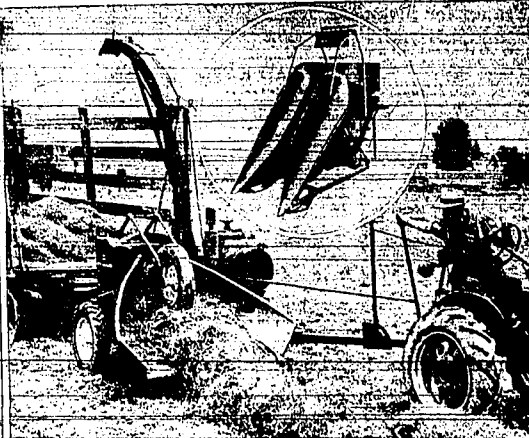

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Uranium Ore Contract Awarded On Flood Control Project for Idaho Aboard Planes

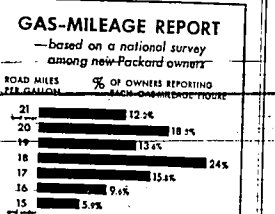
