

House Handed To Form Regional Authority for Area

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—The administration's bill to create a Columbia valley administration in the Pacific northwest was introduced today by Representative Mitchell of Washington.

The bill, comprising 19 sections, would establish the administration as a federal corporation, with headquarters in the northwest. It would be headed by three directors drawing salaries of \$17,600 a year, two of whom would have to be bona-fide residents of the Pacific northwest.

The directors appointed by the President would serve six-year terms, except those first named, on staggered bases.

Reclamation Leader Surprised by Action

Compromise Aid Bill Sent to White House

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—Congress gave quick approval today to a compromise \$4,580,000 European recovery program. A few minutes after the authorization bill passed the house it was approved by the senate.

Both houses acted by voice vote. Now the measure goes to the White House for President Truman's approval.

This swift action by the senate was in sharp contrast to the long and bitter debate which held up for 18 days approval of the senate's own Marshall plan bill.

The measure simply approves another 18 months of Marshall plan aid to Europe and sets a ceiling on the amount to be spent. The cash must be provided later by appropriation.

Injury and Jerry Wintham was hit by several of the falling bricks. I don't know how I got out or why I wasn't hurt. I don't think I've taken a step if I hadn't been literally carried along. I was too frightened to move when the building began rocking.

Begin Remooring Bricks
A lot of people began removing the bricks from Jack's body and I guess he was still alive because they rushed him to the hospital.

I heard one of the men helping free Jack say "My God! I was only three feet from him when it happened." It took some of the injuries to the hospital.

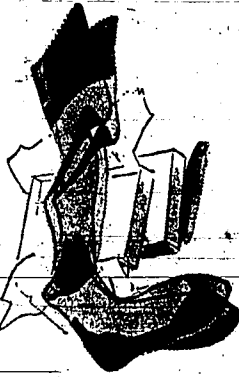

Loans to U. S. Business Skid At Fast Pace

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—Business loans fell off \$177,000,000 during the week ended April 6, the biggest drop in history for a single week. The federal reserve board, reporting this today, said it was the third straight week of declines for commercial, industrial and agricultural loans by federal reserve member banks in the nation's banking system. The decline is considered due to seasonal factors, the total drop-off in the volume of business loans since Christmas has gone deeper and faster than ever before. The chief surprise in official quarters appeared to be that merchants, looking for further falls in prices, were going slow on getting loans. To build up new inventories and using money from current sales to pay off past debts as fast as possible. Despite the big decline in the week ended April 6, however, the total business loan volume then, \$14,627,000,000, stood \$197,000,000 above the level, at this time last year.

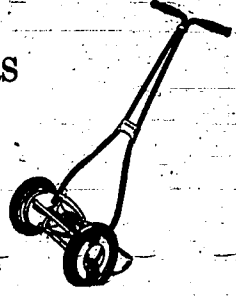

Soviets Take Pounding at Borah Parley

MOSCOW, Idaho, April 14 (AP)—A California college president told the Borah peace conference that lasting peace will be found only when the world is made safe for difference.

Dr. Lynn White, Jr., president of Mills college, spoke at the peace conference at the University of Idaho sponsored by the William E. Borah foundation for the cessation of war.

The major address of the conference was being heard by some 2,000 persons. Discussions around and panels of educators from every part of the northwest met following the general sessions to go over the major points of each proposal for peace.

Dr. White declared that the nation's problem is not to defeat the American "passion for uniformity" on other people, but to recognize and accept their ways in a peaceful manner.

Obstacles to Peace

The speaker charged "citizens" of the United States with those of Russia as "obstacles to the achievement of a peaceful world." He said that the people of both nations tend to believe peace is not possible until everyone knows as they do.

"Other peoples are as proud of their peculiar ways as we are of ours," Dr. White said. "A uniform and peaceful world can be built only on mutual respect." He added that America must "reverse our passion for uniformity and accept the fact of difference between peoples."

"Only so can we win the confidence and cooperation of other nations," he said.

Dr. White Advocates 'Greatly Strengthened United Nations'

Dr. White urged that the United States be strong for any avenger. He asserted that such an organization, to be successful, would require the support of millions of men and women who are "in every sense citizens of the world."

Home Saboteurs Unit.

Another Californian, Dr. Graham H. Stuart of Stanford university told the conference that Russia has sabotaged the United Nations.

Dr. Stuart's view that regional peace pacts now represent the best hope of world security, contrasted sharply with the ideas submitted by Dr. Clyde Easton of New York. Dr. Easton gave the opinion that the United Nations is weak because the people of America have failed to support it.

"The democracies want peace and will strive for it," Stuart said. "But they are determined that if a group of 15 somewhat leaders in the force of freedom will be so adequately and modestly prepared that liberty and democracy will survive."

Peace Logical Answer

Stuart termed regional defense pacts, such as the north Atlantic agreement, "the logical and necessary result of Soviet intransigence."

"The United Nations," he said, was meant to be an effective armistice for mutual defense, but the Soviets have deliberately nullified its efforts.

Applications should be submitted to the superintendent of the Shoshone project by 3 p. m. July 17, instead of March 17 if will get preference. Awards will be made by public drawing.

The farms average 118 acres of irrigated land plus 15 acres of non-irrigated land. For pasture-homesteaders must pay \$100 per acre for irrigation water for the first six years. After that they must pay the government for the cost of irrigation facilities "within a reasonable length of time."

Idaho State Bank Call Is Issued

BOISE, April 14 (AP)—E. F. Hawthorn, state commissioner of finance, today announced a bank call for Idaho state banks as of April 11.

The 30 state banks will be required to publish a statement of their financial standing as of that date. Federal banks also are being required to furnish a financial statement as of April 11.

The financial records of state banks are not required to publish separate financial statements, but do file financial reports with the commissioner's office.

Coastal Gasoline Firms Hike Price

SEATTLE, April 14 (AP)—Several major oil companies have increased the wholesale price of premium grade gasoline a half-cent a gallon. A spokesman for independent dealers said this increase probably would have to be passed on to motorists.

Companies increasing the tank-wagon rates for premium gasoline included Standard of California, Shell, Richfield and Texaco.

War Brides Now Form Own Club

POCAHELLO, April 13 (AP)—Pocatello war brides have organized a club under the auspices of the Stan-nock chapter of the American Red Cross.

The organization will meet twice monthly, and members are hoping to "learn to live today."

The membership now includes representatives of Germany, Australia, Italy, Ireland, Scotland and England.

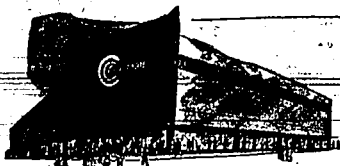

Easter Sales Hold at 1943 Level in U. S.

By United Press

Shopping for spring outfits is keeping pre-Easter sales in women's wear at or near last year's levels, leading department stores in several major cities reported today.

Varying reports came from stores in major cities on overall pre-Easter clothing buying. Some stores reported it was "well above" that of 1943. Others said it was "slightly below," and still others said sales were "outstanding."

Few could offer any comparison to dollar or sales unit volume until the books were closed on this week, the last before Easter.

Competition stiffens

All stores pointed out comparisons with last year's pre-Easter sales were four weeks later this year than last, and weather is a large factor in spring clothes buying. Many argued that buying of high-priced outfits was "off" from last year's figures. Others noted that buyers were more careful.

By cities, a survey by the United Press indicates:

Chicago—Of three big "Loop" stores, one reported general pre-Easter sales about five per cent above anticipations for this year; a second said "very close" to those of last year, with possibilities of surpassing them; a third said pre-Easter buying "much better" than last year, with sales of ready-to-wear items "practically 20 per cent better" the second week before Easter.

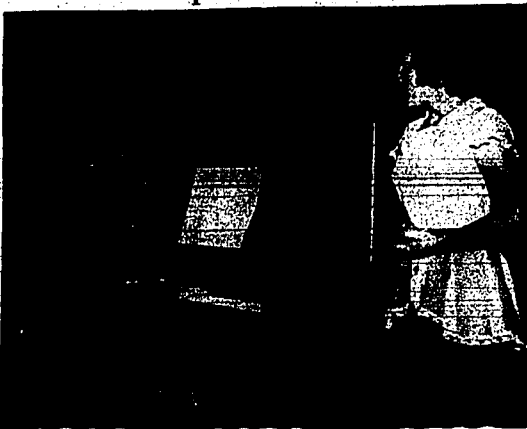
Los Angeles—Easter rush expected this week, resuming prewar pattern. Two of the city's largest stores estimated sales would be about the same as last year's. One said this was disappointing, as had occurred more. Shoppers seemed to be hunting for good values and for advertised items.

New York—Most department stores and retailers say business about even or slightly up over last year. One specializing in women's clothing said sales "way ahead" and "broken all records," but most not so optimistic.

Salt Lake City—Department stores generally noted about a 10.3 per cent increase in 1943 over 1942, because of the later date for Easter and better weather this year.

San Francisco—Consensus of department store opinion is that pre-Easter sales are running ahead of a similar period last year, with high priced lines holding their own, low and medium price lines moving best.

U. S. Foreign Policies Given Savant Praise

MOSCOW, April 14 (AP)—The often criticized foreign policy of the United States was praised by a University of Idaho political scientist last night.

Professor Robert Hoosac, chairman of the university's political science department, said, "our diplomatic history reveals a coherent and stable American foreign policy."

Hoosac was the principal speaker at a banquet for guests attending the Borah peace conference. The peace conference is sponsored by the Borah Foundation for the Outlawry of War.

Founded by Chicagoan

The foundation was established by Salmon O. Levinson, a Chicago attorney, in honor of the late Idaho senator, William Edgar Borah.

Hoosac credited Cordell Hull, former U. S. secretary of state, with stating the nation's foreign policy in 1937. He quoted Hull as saying that no serious hostilities anywhere can occur without involving American rights.

President Truman added to that policy, Hoosac said, when he proclaimed the Truman doctrine in March, 1947. He cited the nation's aid to foreign countries as consistency in the prescribed policy.

Praise Is Tempered

Hoosac tempered his praise of the foreign policy by warning that it must be actively responsive to the control of the people.

"In turn, the American people must be full aware of their responsibility to the world at large," the speaker said.

Yesterday afternoon, a California college student told the conference a lasting peace will be found only when "the world is made safe for differences."

The speaker was Dr. Lynn White, Jr., president of Alhambra college, Oakland.

Prisoners Ask Damages for Imprisonment

CHICAGO, April 14 (AP)—The federal court has been asked to order five contracting firms to pay \$50,000,000 damages to 700 workmen imprisoned on Pacific islands during the war, or their relatives.

Most of the 700 plaintiffs are workmen who were captured by Japanese forces and imprisoned during the war; about 100 are survivors of the workmen killed during the invasion. Defendant companies are the Hawaiian Dredging company, Ltd., Honolulu; Raymond Concrete Pipe company, Chicago; Turner Construction company, New York City; Morse, Sherrin Engineering company, Inc., Boise; and J. H. Pomroy and company, Inc., of the state of Washington.

Facts Not Disputed

The motion in behalf of the workmen and their heirs was made by order of Judge J. H. Sigal. He contended the facts involved are not in dispute and that the question of law remains to be settled.

Sigal declared each plaintiff is entitled to compensation for injuries suffered by imprisonment. In addition, he said, the workmen were entitled to compensation for four or five years' pay because their contracts stated they pay until their return to the United States. They were not returned until after the war ended.

Judge Walter J. Ladd directed Sigal to file briefs in support of his request for a summary judgment by April 25. He ordered defense counsel Harold M. Keele to file briefs in reply by May 25.

Classed Omitted

Sigal said outside court that the contacts between the men and their employes omitted the customary clause which would free the government of responsibility for damages suffered because of "acts of God or the common enemy."

Both attorneys agreed that any verdict against the companies eventually would have to be paid by the government because the contractors were paid on a cost-plus basis.

The workmen, employed on Wake Island, Guam and at Manila alleged their employers failed to provide them with a safe place to work although they were aware of the imminence of war.
