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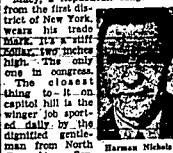

Record Crop for Winter Wheat Is Sighted for State
BOISE, April 15 (AP)—A record winter wheat crop of 24,888,000 bushels is to be forecast today by the U. S. department of agriculture.

The report said a crop of that size would be about 12 per cent greater than the previous record crop in 1937 and about 30 per cent more than last year's production. Such a crop also would be 40 per cent more than the 15-year (1923-37) average.

Little moisture was recorded during March and range grasses need rain, the report said. It added that in some localities irrigation may be necessary to promote seed germination.

Egg production at 30,000,000 in March was about six per cent less than March, 1937.

Henry Dvorshak, introduced H. L. Williams, railway president, who spoke briefly and thanked the shippers and others for the "good business received by his railway from this territory."

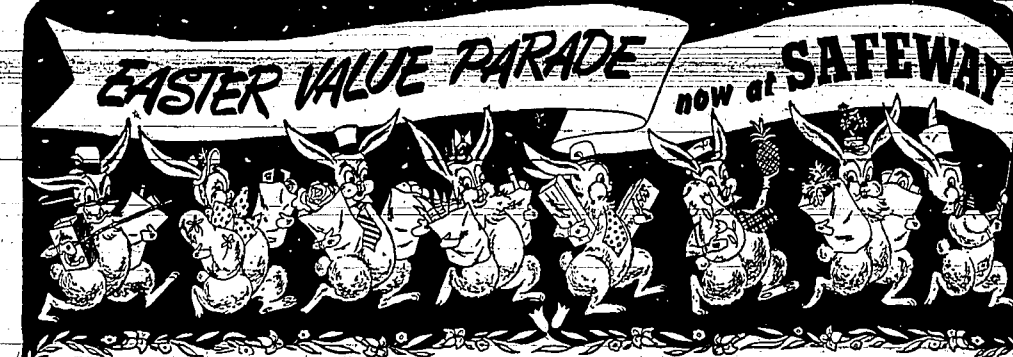
Several railroad officials accompanied Williams on his trip, which included several stops in southern Idaho.
