The committee has reported that the exact deficit is known, residents of the county will be asked to contribute the difference, he said.

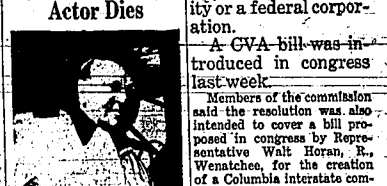

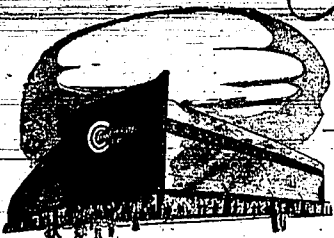

Coastal Blaze Hazard Drops In Northwest

By The Associated Press
Forest fires which dotted western Oregon and Washington in the past season's first outbreak were under control today.

The Washington state district fire office at Vancouver reported the Bell mountain fire on the Mt. Rainier was controlled. It was the largest fire, covering more than 4000 acres. At the peak 38 men fought it.

Dozens of northwest Oregon fires, most of them covering 100 to 500 acres, also were in hand. A crew was held at Hillsboro, ready to move to any fire which might start there.

The district warden's office at Forest Grove reported that all fires in that area have been trailed, and that one was considered in hand.

Humidity which had fallen into the low 20s, began to rise. This morning it was 71 at Troutdale, east of Portland.

Second of the largest fires in the northwest was reported by T. S. Goodyear, Washington forest supervisor at Olympia, to have covered some 1000 acres in the mountains near Chehalis. It was fought by 35 men.

Humidity in other fires had burned in southwest Washington before being controlled.

North Idaho Dry Spell Hits Crops

Lewiston, April 15—An unprecedented April drought is developing in north central Idaho's rich grain area and no relief is in sight, soil conservationist Doug Hole said today.

This spring has seen the lowest soil moisture in years, Hole said, but the dry weather continues too long. He said the valley ground was frozen too deep during this year's only heavy rain period in mid-February. The small amount of rainfall and snow ran off fast because the ground could not absorb the moisture.

Dry weather is more threatening crops than the wet itself in the immediate future.

Meanwhile, the weather bureau's extended forecast for the next five days predicts a partial relief in the next five days.

Thorough Exam Is Essence of Cancer Prevention, Expert Advises Doctors

The essence of cancer prevention is the thoroughness of examination, Dr. Morris E. Dalley, instructor in medicine at the University of California, told more than 50 Magic Valley doctors at the South Central Idaho Medical society clinical session Friday.

Dr. Dalley, speaking at the evening session at the Legion hall, told the doctors that a good history from the patient and a thorough examination are the best means of detecting cancer. Changing symptoms are more important than chronic ones, he said.

The need for prevention is great, Dr. Dalley said. Early indications of possible cancer are in areas which do not heal and in pernicious anemia, he added.

"Cancer in children is by no means rare," he told the group, "and we may expect an increase in cancer problems as the average age of the population rises." Cancer prevails in children in those of the brain, nerves, bones, thyroid and lungs, he said.

Dr. Dalley warned of cancer masquerading as other diseases. Those which may conceal cancer seem to be asthma, tuberculosis, colitis, arthritis of the spine and secondary anemia.

Three other guest speakers of the society, Dr. Horace J. McCorkle, associate professor of surgery; Dr. Earl B. King, assistant professor of obstetrics; and Dr. Frederick B. Howard, chief instructor in urology, all at the University of California, spoke at the evening session on more clinical aspects of the cancer problem.

Prison Cracks Down on U.S. Tax Kickback

FLORENCE, Ariz., April 16 (AP)—Spend money for Arizona state prison convicts won't come from the federal government anymore.

It found out about their income tax racket.

In past years convicts have filed fraudulent returns. Refund checks would go into the prison, says the Phoenix Gazette has disclosed.

Part of the case were substantiated by Warden Lon E. Walters who said the racket has been stopped.

Long termers with no income would tell the government they'd made up to \$5,000. Lists of dependents would mean refunds of from \$200 to \$300.

Warden Walters estimated that only between \$200 and \$400 had been actually cashed by the convicts, but said checks totaling from \$700 to \$1,000 had been stopped. He said about eight men were involved.

Just what the federal government plans to do wasn't known. The convicts don't care. They're serving long terms anyway, the warden said.

Walters explained that a few prisoners did have outside incomes and did have the right to file returns and receive refunds. But, he said, there are only two or three in that category.

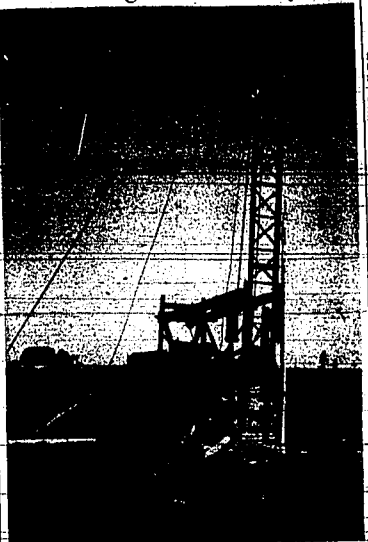

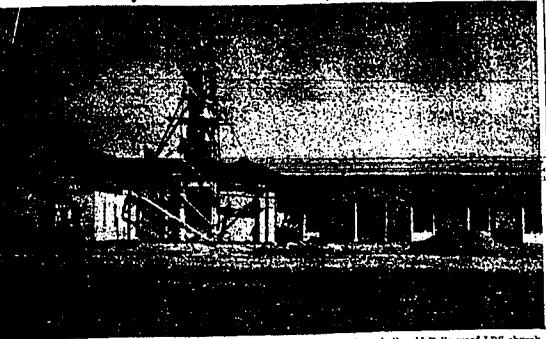

Largest Party Ends Voyage Down Salmon

SUN VALLEY, April 16 (AP)—Fifteen persons, the largest group ever to make the trip, today ended a nine-day journey down the middle fork of the Salmon river. They entered the river at Tappan Cabin near the mouth of Camas creek and entered the main Salmon

about 18 miles from Shoup at about 10 p. m. Friday. The party was headed by Joe Burgy, director of outdoor activities at Sun Valley resort. It was mainly composed of newswire and magazine photographers. Purpose of the journey was to make a picture story centered around Mr. and Mrs. Peter Brooks of Boise as they descended the river. Five rubber boats were used for the 60-mile trip down the river of No Return. Only one mishap was reported when Loomis Dean, Life magazine photographer, fell overboard near the mouth of the middle

fork on the main Salmon river. He was quickly rescued. The party's only contact with civilization was on the second day out when they stopped at Bennett's ranch along the river. Sun Valley officials say only about 30 persons have made the trip to date. Most hazardous section of the journey lies in the canyon of the river which is flanked by mile-high mountains. There is no return upstream after the canyon is entered. Prehistoric kangaroos were 18 to 30 feet tall, but the biggest living specimens are seven to eight feet tall.

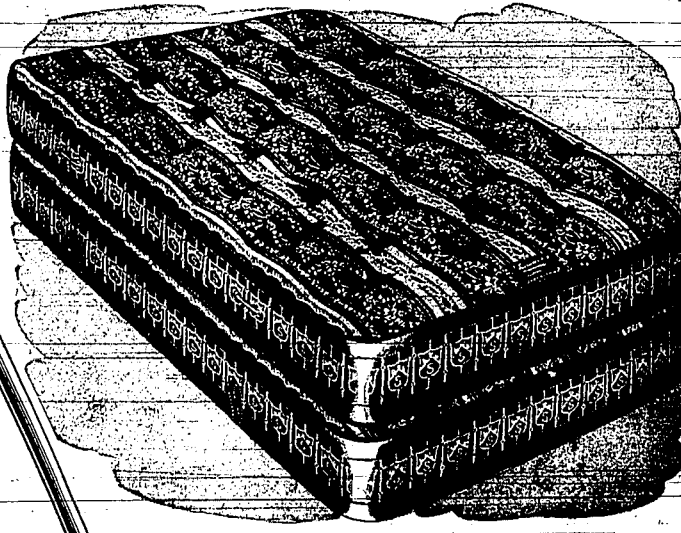
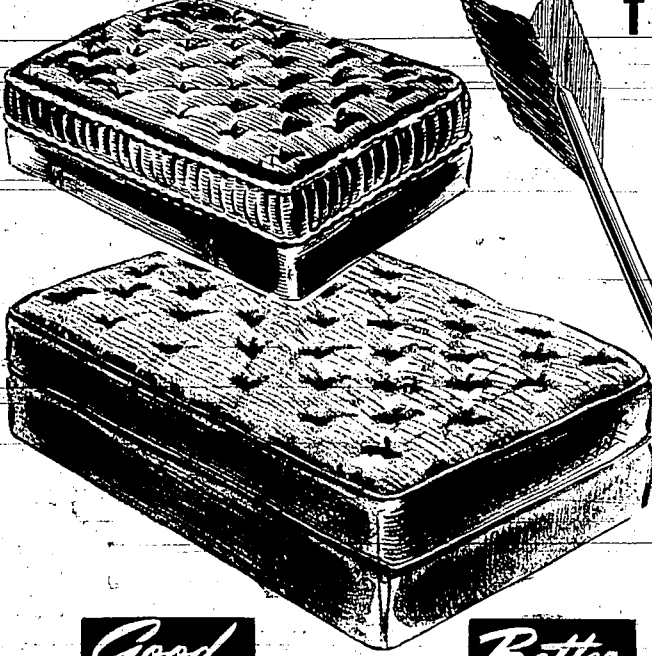

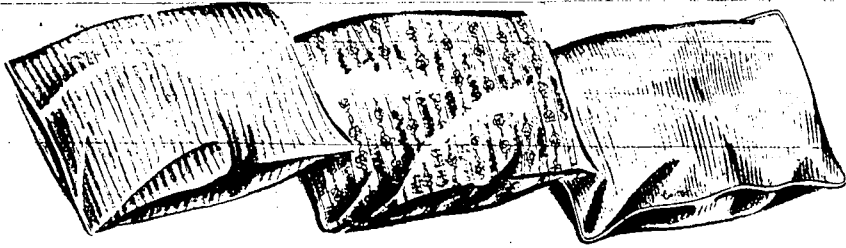
