RECALL OF CERTAIN

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Had to Be Suspect

Graduation day for a son of a gun, Capt. **SLICK** Morgan said, one technical sergeant had to be suspected of enlisting men as they flew his wings because sergeant was the only rating promised to the men. They were wearing and weren't non-coms around to eno through the red tape.

"Because a lot of army brass didn't know what the flying sergeants were doing," the captain said, "we had a lot of trouble."

For instance, at Meador air force base in Sacramento, Calif., sergeant was minding his own business as he taxied down the runway one day. The boy was wearing his MP base. An airframe officer who didn't know the sergeant was ready to take off, "I thought he was going to crash," the captain said.

"Sergeants," he told Sgt. Lloyd C. Atterbury, the pilot, "aren't supposed to tax planes."

Has Sense of Humor

The sergeant said it was a boy he was on the ground and have to sail a plane, anyhow, and why didn't the officer get somebody to tow the ship down the runway, the officer ordered that done, the sergeant gunned 'er and waved good-bye as he took off.

Another time in New Orleans three of the sergeants were placed into the guard house by MP for wearing wings. They were in there a couple of hours before somebody saw them and took them out. The MP bowed his head a little as he escorted them.

"The flying sergeants—after about a year of being kicked around came home, their own in September, 1942. They became second lieutenants. The group was broken up. Half of them stayed in California as the instructors and the rest were assigned to overseas duty.

"We were right proud of our base," Captain Morgan said, "but we had a whole of a lot more fun as sergeants."

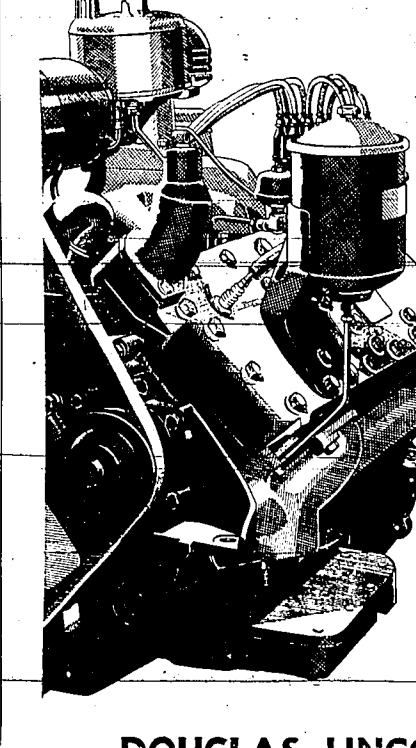

Bevin Asserts Trend to Left In U. S. Sure

LONDON, April 18 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin had been quoted today as predicting that the United States will follow Britain's example and turn toward socialism. Don Iddon, the Daily Mail's New York correspondent, said Bevin granted him an exclusive interview aboard the liner Mauritania just before it docked at Southampton. "Mr. Bevin told me Iddon today that the serious political developments which have taken place in Britain—the trend to the left—will come about in the United States." Iddon said most of Bevin's discussion of foreign affairs was off the record, but disclosed that the foreign secretary had given him this advice on writing a weekly column from the United States: "You must not be too cynical, if I may advise you. Don't ruffle the American eagle's feathers. Be frank and blunt, of course, there is nothing wrong with that, and stick up for the British empire."

"Civilization" Drives Group Into Solitude

SALT LAKE CITY, April 18 (AP)—A band of modern Utah pioneers is carving homes in the desolate wilderness of western Utah because "we've had a little too much of civilization." The new community of "Partridge" is rising as a cooperative project in western Utah county. The 100-acre public domain homestead claim is being developed by the Utah Pioneers, Inc., which was organized in the Nevada. Men and their families from all walks of life banded together to launch the pioneering project. The cooperative venture is now taking shape in the north end of a valley much like the region surrounding Salt Lake City. "We're not afraid of anything else," says Dr. M. L. Glendinning, Salt Lake City, Partridge's spokesman. "It's good land, will make it bloom. All we want is to enjoy 100 per cent of what our labor brings instead of 10 per cent. We've had a little too much of civilization." Dr. Glendinning said 25 families are building cabins on the site. It's

a cooperative project of the type which was tried in "early" day America. Ex-carpenters, farmers, school teachers and others pooled their funds and their labor to build the community. Water lies 10 feet under the lush earth, timber abounds in adjacent mountains and trout are abundant in a creek. "In three years we'll be owning our own farms" and "raising 50 quanta of wheat to the acre, 80 of oats and 100 of corn," members of the group say.

Solons to Get 7-Point Plan of Health Aid

WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—The health program which President Truman is scheduled to announce this week will outline a seven-point plan for expanding the nation's medical services, according to informed sources.

These information indicate that in addition to a compulsory health insurance feature, the program will include aid for medical schools and expanded hospital construction.

It will also call for increased assistance for medical research, more help for state and local health services, and federal assistance for child care, maternity and crippled children programs, it was said.

Supporters of the administration plan on the revenue from the President is expected to explain the entire program. This revenue would be raised by payroll taxes of up to 1 percent on both employers and employees.

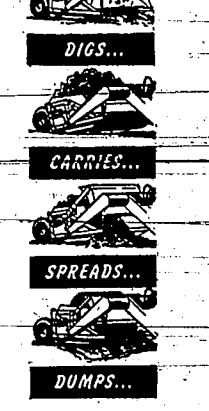

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U. S. Experts Identify Vital Milk Material

By OVID A. MARITIN
 WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—Government scientists have announced they have discovered another important reason why milk and milk products are good for you. They have found that milk contains a substance which the body must have to live. It is called vitamin B12. It is a serious disease, including pernicious anemia. Pernicious anemia is a highly infectious, sometimes deadly disease of the blood.

Called Vitamin B12, the helpful material was said to be vitamin B12—a name commercial chemists have given to a crystalline substance extracted from liver for the treatment of pernicious anemia. Recent investigations have shown agriculture department—scientists said, that many protein foods—particularly vegetable proteins—are lacking in vitamin B12.

A high-protein diet—particularly of the vegetable character—can be harmful to the body, the studies show, unless accompanied by a sufficient quantity of vitamin B12. Such a diet, the department said, can prevent growth and development and reproduction.

Major animal proteins—meats and the yolks of eggs—contain vitamin B12.

Reported in 1932

The department reported in 1932 that it had found that milk contained an unidentified food material essential for growth, development, reproduction and lactation. Scientists called it "nutrient X" because of its unknown chemical character.

Research showed that this mystery material was present in the non-fat portion of milk, in cheese, commercial casing, leafy foods and cereals, and in liver extracts but not in cereal grains and oilseed meals.

Only in the past six weeks, however, were department scientists able to show that nutrient X was undoubtedly vitamin B12.

Construction Started on Acid Tanks for New Wendell Plant

WENDELL, April 18—Construction of phosphoric and sulphuric acid storage tanks at the new Gates Bros. line, phosphate fertilizer plant started last week with one of the phosphoric tanks virtually complete by Thursday, President Charles T. Gates said.

Gates also announced that the Union Pacific railroad had begun construction work on the second of two spur lines leading to the plant southeast of Wendell. The spur line—this one will adjoin the south side of the plant—will be finished within a week, Gates said.

With one phosphoric acid tank about complete, work also was started on the sulphuric acid plant. Three other phosphoric tanks will be erected beside the first one. Each has a storage capacity of 25,000 gallons.

Gates has returned from a trip to San Francisco, where he completed arrangements for the immediate shipment of further machinery and equipment for the triple superphosphate plant.

With such rapid progress on the acid tanks, Gates estimates the start of production on phosphoric acid within 90 days. Manufacture of the fertilizer will commence by late summer, he said.

The phosphoric acid will be produced in an auxiliary building next to the main grinding and pulverizing plant. The six interior tanks in which the acid will be made are installed, and technicians are inserting pipes, gauges and other equipment.

New Mansion Proposed for White House

WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—A new steel frame and marble White House that "would last as long as the pyramids" has been proposed by Chairman Cannon, D. Mo., of the house appropriations committee.

Strongly opposing spending money to renovate the executive mansion, Cannon said: "We could build a brand new building to last for centuries, to look exactly like the present, historic White House. . . but this crumbling sandstone shell, no matter how much renovation was done on it, would probably go to pieces in less than 50 years."

A proposal to spend \$5,400,000 to renovate the present structure has been blocked so far by a deadlock of house and senate conferees on the first deficiency appropriations bill. Cannon said that matter of spending money to tear out the interior and put new foundations under the old White House walls, his committee favors providing \$100,000 for a study to see what it would cost to reproduce the White House out of steel, bronze and marble.

To preserve historic features, Cannon proposed that ornate fixtures, such as fireplaces, mantels, doors and some stairs, be saved for replacement in the new building.

Stuck

BODA-SPRING, April 18 (AP)—City officials at Boda, Springs apparently are stuck for another year in office. Two attempts were made to elect a new city clerk. The first attempt failed because the voters, neither brought out a sufficient number of citizens to make it official, the city clerk said.

Meridian Youth Is First Ada Fatality

BOISE, April 18 (AP)—A 19-year-old Meridian youth was killed instantly early this morning to become the first traffic fatality of the year in Ada county.

Carl E. Hartley, was killed when the car in which he was riding overturned and crushed him on the Idaho City-Boise highway early yesterday morning, sheriff's officers reported here.

The Ada county sheriff's office identified the driver of the car as Gerald Bailey, 18, Boise. Officers quoted him as saying the car hit a soft shoulder going around a sharp curve on the highway, tipped over and then rolled. The Hartley youth was pinned beneath the vehicle and crushed to death.

Kentucky County Police Chief Shot

SHILOH, Ky., April 18—Kentucky county gunplay in this frontier town ended the stormy career of Capt. Ambrose Metcalfe, chief of the county's police force.

Metcalfe, 29, died en route to a hospital after being shot five times when he stepped out of his automobile in front of the Shiloh cafe. His wife, Kathleen, witnessed the shooting.

Two men were arrested by state police several hours after the shooting and were charged with murder. Metcalfe was shot by County Judge W. J. R. Howard, named Arthur Jackson, the cafe operator, and Ford Sizemore.
