WASHINGTON—Although the senate has not yet passed the Marshall plan, the first course threatens to develop into a legislative filibuster that will necessitate a summer sitting of the congress.

The Soviet propagandists get all their news from the lips of irresponsible ravings that Rep. Clarence Cannon, Missouri, gave forth with in his floor speech last week. Cannon talked about plans for raising down atom bombs on every Russian city.

All that Moscow had to do was to broadcast what he said without any additions at all. During the coming weeks when the pact and the administration request for arms and munitions is being debated, we will hear a lot of that kind of talk. The emphasis will be on arms and security and how much the U. S. can afford to spend.

If this is coupled with what appears to be a 6 to 8 percent of Russian countries to end the blockade, this overture will be outmaneuvered in the cold war. It will seem to the world as though U. S. policy makers have no alternative for a divided Germany and a divided world.

The profound fear in western Europe is of another war, another invasion, and another occupation. The influence of the U. S. thus far has rested on the belief that American policy is aimed at preventing a war and securing the peace, as in its broad aspect it is.

If that belief is undermined by the Russian offer, it will be a disaster.

When Department of Agriculture inspectors and a state law enforcement officer, a truck and trailer load of Twin Falls county potatoes Monday night, the stage seemed to be set perfectly for a test of what this potato racketeering is all about.

Included in the truck and trailer load of potatoes were what officials described as hundreds of pounds of culls and off-grade spuds, packed in branded U. S. No. 1 sacks.

The cargo, on all appearances, was bound for the coast, points where most likely it would have appeared on some of the major consumer markets, grossly misrepresented as Idaho's premium product Russets.

This is what consumers from New Jersey to California have been complaining about - this trash which is being sold as Idaho No. 1's, and for which consumers pay a premium.

According to the federal inspectors who had a part in confiscating this particular truck-load of potatoes, there were thousands of 10-pound sacks of spuds which contained under-size, off-grade and rotten potatoes. They were branded U. S. No. 1's. It was estimated that approximately 50 per cent of these potatoes were under-size and that another 15 to 20 per cent were off-grade.

In addition to the 10-pound sacks, there were many 100-pound, unbranded bags of inferior potatoes. Many of the seized potatoes were already rotting when examined by the inspectors.

Now it remains to be seen just what will result from the seizure of this cargo which gives every indication of some of the outstanding examples of what's wrong with our potato marketing system.

It will serve as a test case in many respects. Will charges be brought against those who are responsible for the seizure? Will the department of agriculture and the federal inspectors force a showdown, now that this truck-load of potatoes has been confiscated and its contents brought to light?

This is the first step in the right direction. Now we're getting somewhere!

New Ruling on Quickie State Divorces Creates Confusion

WASHINGTON, April 20 (UP)—A "quickie" divorce won in a state with short-term residence laws may not be as good as another state says it is.

The supreme court's latest decision holds that a divorce can be attacked if the divorced partner is not served with notice of the action within the divorce state or is not represented in the divorce proceedings.

The spouse being divorced can stay out of the state, ignore the proceedings, and then at some later date sue to nullify the decree on the grounds that residence in the divorce state was not bona fide.

At issue is the legal status of the husband or wife who leaves his or her home state and breaks off the marriage in the divorce state such as Florida or Nevada.

This confusion stems from a series of supreme court decisions during the past eight years. Some of the decisions appear conflicting. Many have been overturned since last fall, the tribunal in 1942 ruled that courts can grant "quickie" divorces even if the stay-at-home spouse is notified merely by advertisement or by out-of-state service of the divorce papers. The court held that that was true, even if the spouse being divorced was not further represented in the divorce proceedings.

Then in 1945, the Justices said such divorces can be challenged in the home state of the parties. If the courts there find the divorce residence was "fraudulent," the decree can be voided.

—Not-Real Resident

That ruling came in a case where the spouse won a divorce and returned almost immediately to the state where he originally lived.

Now the court has argued the divorce can be set aside even if the husband did not return home and apparently had no intention of doing so.

The ruling involved the divorce of Herbert N. Rice who died in California six months after getting a divorce decree. Community law here originally held, said he never really became a Nevada resident although he fulfilled that state's divorce residence requirement. Rice had remarried a few days after the divorce.

Justice Jackson said the decision permitted Rice "to have a wife who cannot become his widow and 'to leave a widow who was no longer his wife."

Another confusing aspect of the various decisions concerns the property rights of the divorced persons. In this case, the first wife, as the legal widow, has inheritance rights. In other cases, the high court has ruled that the date of original

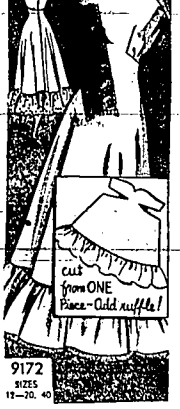

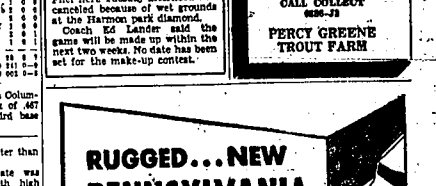
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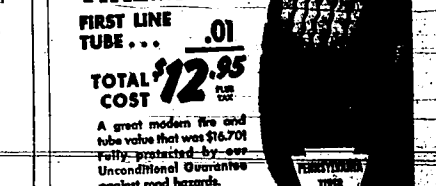

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Dip Shown in U-S Farms' Market Value

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)—The market value of the nation's farms has dropped for the first time in 10 years, the bureau of agricultural economics reported today.

On a national average, a acre of farm land was worth 25 percent less than on Nov. 1, the bureau said.

During those four months land values dropped six per cent on the Pacific coast, six per cent in the mountain states. There were declines in scattered states elsewhere. This was the first time since 1928 that rising land values in some eastern and midwestern states.

The first significant dip the bureau said this represented "the first significant decline in land values since the late 1920's." Lower prices for most farm products, including livestock, were cited as probably the major cause of the drop.

The downward trend in farm prices is believed to have been the cause of many prospective buyers "waiting around," the bureau said. And values on March 31 still were three per cent higher than in 1932-30, and 75 per cent higher than in 1917.

Since 1910, land prices have increased about 40 per cent, but net farm income, the bureau said, means "the decline in land values probably will be behind the drop in farm prices."

New low values dropped in the west during the last four months: Montana, 10 per cent; Oregon, nine per cent; Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, and Washington, eight per cent; Texas and Colorado, six per cent; and Utah, five per cent.

Test Proving Too Good in Probe of Fog

DONORA, Pa., April 20 (AP)—Hoarse complaints of sore throats and lack of breath followed the start of a four-day test of smoke conditions similar to those of last October's fatal smog.

Opinion was almost unanimous in Webster—about the Monongahela river from Donora—that the current effort to duplicate industrial conditions of last October's tragedy was succeeding "too well."

Abe Czapino, restaurant owner and president of the Webster Society for Better Living which arranged the four-day test with the U. S. health service, said:

"I've had at least 50 calls from persons complaining of sore throats and short-windedness. These were the characteristics of the fatal smog last year. Twenty-two persons died then and hundreds were sickened."

At least one person was under a doctor's care today, William Roberts, 37, a steel mill crane operator, complained:

"I almost collapsed. I couldn't get my breath. I just about passed out." Authorities in this sprawling mill community said they had received no reports of illness caused by the smoke conditions.

room in the next five years.
Idaho Power applied last year to Interior's bureau of land management for a right-of-way across public lands on the 220 kv line route. After several discussions, weeks before the November elections, Interior made this proposition:

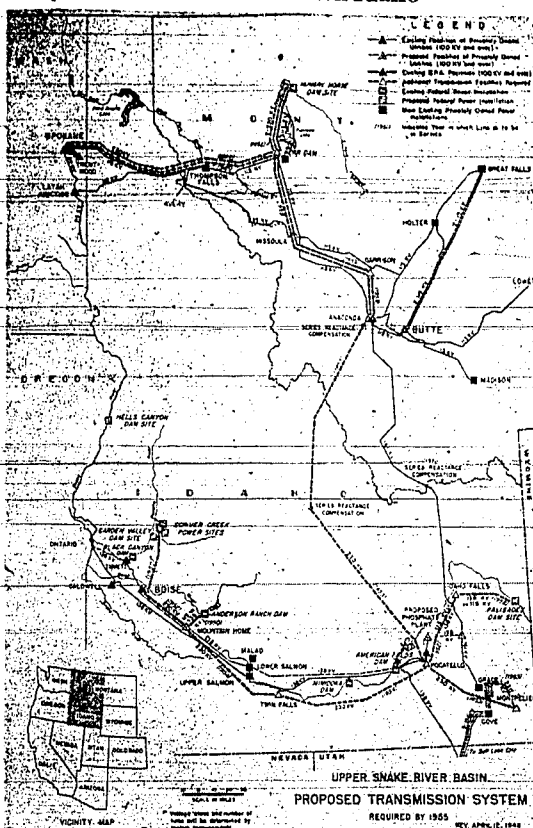
"You can have the right of way. But you must show you have customers for only one-third of the capacity. Therefore, we want to use the surplus capacity, selling power to cooperatives or municipalities or to other federal agencies."

"We'll agree but only on condition you limit your sales to other federal agencies or private irrigation districts."
Interior officials rejected the counter-proposal and, according to Idaho, were not to be budged.

"All right, we'll wait until after the elections."
As matters now stand, Idaho Power is hoping for more favorable terms by appealing directly to Interior Secretary Krus. Estimated cost of the new line runs \$4,000,000 to \$5,000,000.

Construction of the line would be of great assistance in maintaining a maximum load on the smaller 135 kv circuit. This would be accomplished by "feathering back" on the line from American Falls, say power division aides.
Measurings, as will be explained in detail in subsequent articles, these developments are being followed.
1. AEG may intervene to insure that the 220 kv line is started soon.
2. Bureau of reclamation may volunteer for the job of building the line if the present impasse continues indefinitely.
3. Bure has an extensive plan for speeding construction on its present projects at Pallasco, near Boise, and getting congressional approval for 20 other structures.
4. Idaho Power has been seeking additional capital to meet its greatly increased demands and is proceeding systematically on a construction program of its own.

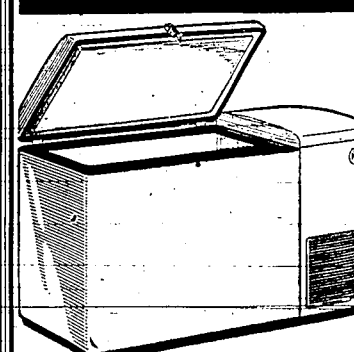

RICHLAND, Wash., April 20 (AP)—A Columbia valley administration is in line with Hoover commission proposals to curb duplication in government work, Representative Jackson, D. Wash., declares.

Ancient Drug Found to Aid 'Bad' Asthma

NEW YORK, April 2 (AP)—A medicine discovered in ancient times is being used to treat bronchial asthma.

The medicine is a drug known as khellin. The active principle is extracted from the seeds of a plant that grows wild in the Mediterranean area and in Arabia. Human beings in ancient days used dried seeds of the plants as medicine.

An example of the modern use of khellin, which has now been produced synthetically, is reported by Dr. Ralph H. May, Kansas City, Kan., in the journal of the Kansas Medical Society. He administered the drug to 12 patients, suffering asthma.

Potentially Dangerous—Major of the department of terminal medicine, University of Kansas school of medicine, said all of the patients were "very asthmatic" who obtained relief only through administration of large doses of drugs which, Major said, a conservative physician would regard as potentially dangerous.

The routine anti-asthmatic drugs also were unsuccessful, he said.

Major said he put them on khellin. "All of these patients, with one exception," he reported, "experienced marked relief while in the hospital and taking khellin under our supervision. In most instances the relief was rapid and lasted as long as they continued taking the tablets."

Afflicted for Years—One patient has been afflicted for 25 years, another for 20 years. The average was about 17 years.

The patients, as of course, had been treated with expensive and scarce, Major said. He admitted that the study of 12 patients was not conclusive.

"Now, one swallow, as Aristotle said, doesn't make a spring, and 12 cases don't prove the superiority or even the great value of khellin in bronchial asthma. We are convinced, however, from our admittedly limited experience, that khellin is of value in the treatment of asthma."

Court Alters Rum Conviction Term

BOISE, April 2 (AP)—The state supreme court has affirmed a Canyon county court conviction on charges of illegal sale of liquor but directed that punishment should be for a misdemeanor and not a felony.

Arthur D. Garde appealed the district court sentence to not more than five years in the state prison.

He contended the sale was made before the law passed by the 1947 legislature became effective making such a sale a felony instead of a misdemeanor.

The court found that the sale occurred June 18, 1947, and that the new law became effective July 1, 1947.

Greek Army Man Captured by Reds

ATHENS, Greece, April 2 (AP)—Greek army Brig. Marcopoulos has been wounded and taken prisoner by communist guerrillas about 40 miles southwest of Delphi.

Marcopoulos, a garrison commander, was the first senior Greek army officer to fall into guerrilla hands.

He was captured at Lidoriki.

Marcopoulos captured came as a general staff spokesman announced the guerrillas had suffered a crushing defeat in the Ploster area near the Yugoslav border.

Tricky Problems Face Science In Field of Guided Missiles

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—The trickiest problem facing guided missile scientists today is that of making the robot "intelligent" enough to know where they are and where they are supposed to go.

Guidance and control is "the most difficult, and important problem of all," says Dr. R. E. Gibson, director of the Johns Hopkins applied physics laboratory. But there is no reason to believe that fundamental obstacles exist in the way of controlling missiles in a supersonic flight.

What is wanted—what all countries are feverishly working on—is a missile that will carry a warhead unerringly from the point of launching to a target, regardless of distance. If the missile gets off course, it must know it and get itself back on line.

Such missiles, to travel faster than sound, will be powered by jet or rocket motors, which can operate outside the atmosphere because they carry their own oxygen, or by ramjet engines.

Test vehicles of all shapes with weird names like Gordon, Natix, 774, Lark and Aerobee, now are gathering information about the upper atmosphere, flight control systems, the war heads and the like. From these projects will come weapons of the future.

They must be more accurate and much longer ranged than the German V-1 slow-moving pilotless plane and V-2 supersonic rocket. These followed flight paths that had to be determined before they were launched. If they went wrong, as they frequently did, nothing could be done about it.

Guidance systems are four ways of guiding missiles by means of electromagnetic radiation:

1. "Command guidance"—A ground radar station tracks missile and target and gives out signals to guide the missile. The station superimposes the missile's course. This missile has a "set order" of intelligence.

2. "Beam riding"—The missile follows a radar beam focusing on the target. It senses its position and can correct its course.

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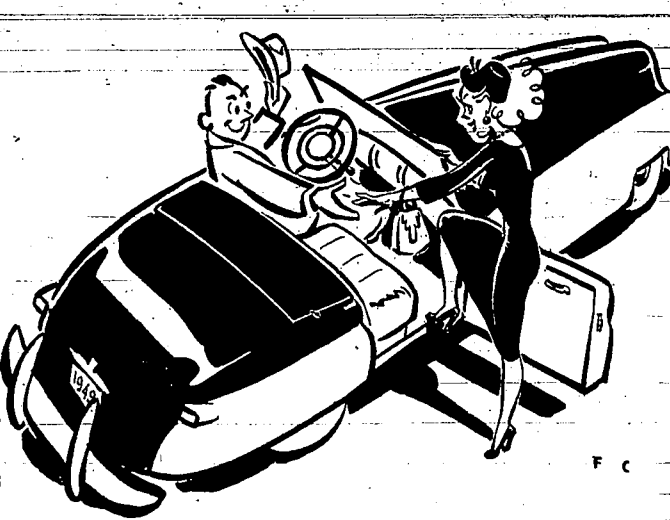
