JEROME, April 21—The north side conservation district superintendents held their regular meeting at 10 a. m. today. Meetings are normally held every second week of the month but because of the rush of spring work the April meeting was postponed.

Business of the evening included the review of conservation farm plans for the coming year. Following discussion of progress on conservation jobs being done by district superintendents, an announcement of the Idaho conservation farm contest being sponsored by the Idaho Junior Chamber of Commerce and of the conservation essay contest being sponsored by the national Grange.

Farmers receiving their completed conservation plans were C. D. Grove and C. M. Stone, Hazelton. To date the district has approved applications for 238 farm totaling 23,720 acres.

Applications Received

Applications for two conservation plans were received for the farm of Ed Hill, Bob Myler, Byron Harris and C. O. Clapsaddle, Jennie Haun, J. J. Coulton, W. A. Boyd, John Grant, Hohnhorst and Pharis, A. L. Kuykendall, Jessie O. McGee, B. H. Gage, Gerhard Maguire and Bill Kott.

Conservation work done by the district during the past month included assisting more than 100 farmers with land leveling, installing terraces, building stone retaining walls, siphon tubes and gated pipe, installing division boxes, check and drop structures, setting alfalfa stands, clover grass and pastures, plating windbreaks, fertilization practices and planning of crop rotations, according to Harold Harris of the Jerome office.

Plans Available

The district now has a set of forms available to district cooperators which have approved standard and drop structures in their fastidious Harris stated that these district office at Jerome or Hazelton.

The board felt quite confident that numerous farmers within the district might have an excellent chance of winning the Idaho conservation farm award and thought that farmers who have completed their applications should get their applications in immediately. As yet no applications have been received but it was thought this was because the contest had not been advertised within the county.

Iron Curtain No Deterrent To War Fears

SOUTHERN IDAHO COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Albion, April 21—The war crisis just as much on the other side of the iron curtain as it does on this side, Dr. Arthur L. Bealey, head of the department of sociology at the University of Utah, said in an address to the students of SICE Thursday.

"Fear is no road toward peace," he said. "People like Hitler and Stalin who bring these fears to the people of the world are like a lot of other people the world is full of, suffering from emotional immaturity."

"We must live in a world where the other fellow has the right to live also," he said. "Our intolerance fosters the seeds of fear and social disturbance the world over."

On another topic Dr. Bealey said Idaho's society for mental hygiene is dead. "It is appalling that five of the international states do not have child guidance clinics," he said. "One reason the world is in the mess that it is today is due to the fact that technology has gone so far ahead of the instruments of social control," he stated. "The widening gap between technology, social conditions and laws brings about social disorganization."

Dr. Bealey is dean of the school of social work and chairman of the institute of world affairs at the University of Utah. He was in charge of the report of the Utah preparatory commission submitted to the international congress of mental health in London in August, 1948.

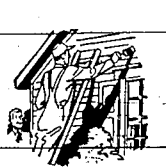

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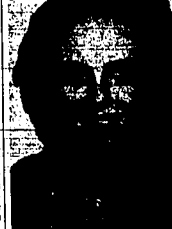

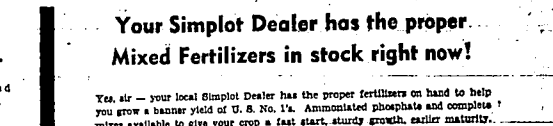

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Soviet Greed Is Blamed in Colony Battle

LAKE SUCCESS, April 21 (AP)—U.S. delegates say Russian greed is to blame for the power struggle over Italy's former colonies.

The statement was made in the United Nations assembly by the committee by American Delegate John Foster Dulles in reply to an attack on the U.S. position by Britain by Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet deputy foreign minister.

West in Eastern Gromyko charged the U.S. and Britain want to take over the former Italian colonies, care them up for their own use, and give some crumbs to Italy and Ethiopia. He said the U.S. and Britain "tooth and nail" against any attempt to solve the problem.

The colonial problem could have been settled four years ago in London talks had it not been for Soviet ambition to get a base in Tripolitania, the western half of Libya.

Russia blocks it. He told the committee the USSR took the view that nothing could be accomplished in a satisfactory agreement under communism. He said Russia's purpose is to use the failure of this as a precedent.

The American delegate told the committee the U.S. originally had an intention of administration but now it thought such a scheme impracticable. He said the U.S. was right to hand those territories to an international regime in which, as he put it, powerful elements would be set to Europe. Dulles said he hoped these efforts could be extended to north Africa.

Gives Reason Dulles said it would be better to entrust the territories to those who wanted such efforts to succeed.

The question of what to do about the former Italian possessions came to the U.N. when France, Britain, United States and Russia failed to agree on a Russian plan to give U.N. trusteeship. The U.S. and Britain favor dividing the old Italian empire, with Britain holding a strategic role. France wants Italy to regulate Libya, Britain and Italian Somalia under trusteeship.

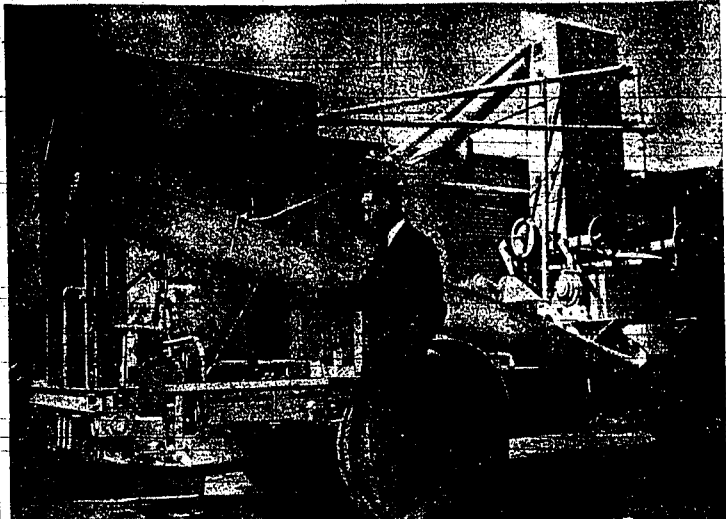

Portable Grain Mill Will Roll to Farmyards

**Oakley Inventor Perfects Machine to
Bring Steam-Rolling Mill to Farmers**

Another step in the farm machinery advancement which has marked progress in this country has resulted from Magic Valley inventive genius and enterprise. Going into service this week is the second of two custom-built portable steam-rolling mills operating in Magic Valley.

The value of steam-rolled grain long has been known to livestock feeders and dairymen but for the farmer who grew his own grain there was the problem of loss of time and money in taking it to a mill for processing.

It took an old hand at the grain elevator business to bring about this change. W. J. Southworth, pioneer Oakley resident, spent five years of careful thought, much planning and hard work in perfecting a portable steam-rolling mill.

A revolution in step in this field, the mill carries its own boiler to supply steam and its own specially built six-cylinder engine, two augurs, three large steel rollers, two augurs, and other equipment. Custom-built, it has no counterpart either in this country or abroad.

Propane is the fuel for both the boiler and the 50-horsepower engine. The boiler can be set for an desired pressure. Each roller weighs about 200 pounds, is about 30 inches long and about 24 inches in diameter.

Thomas said it is believed the mill can process 200 bushels of grain an hour. For the time being, it is operated at the rate of 120 bushels per hour.

Boiler, and operate this machine throughout Magic Valley. The boiler and a special six-cylinder engine burn propane. The steam chamber and the rolling mill are near the cab of the truck. Two augurs carry grain in and from the steam-rolling equipment.

Through the machine, Thomas said it enters a side bin near the boiler, at the rear of the truck. From the bottom of the bin it is carried by an augur to the top of the steam chamber, near the cab of the truck.

The grain drops into a steam chamber where three jets automatically maintain a pressure of 70 pounds per square inch. After holding the first grain in the chamber five minutes to build up pressure, the rest of the grain goes through the chamber continuously.

From the steam chamber it drops between the rollers. When rolled it drops into a side hopper from which it is augured out for feeding or bin storage.

Commenting on the storage of the grain, Thomas said the mill's product will take up no more than 20 per cent moisture. He quoted the U. S. department of agriculture as stating steam-rolled grain will take moisture up to six per cent before there is danger of spoilage.

Even corn, which ordinarily is hammered instead of milled, was used in a factory test of the machine, Thomas said. A variety of uncleaned grain was used in the test.

"The corn came out like corn flakes," he mentioned. From a standpoint of appearance, a human eye might mistake steam-rolled feed for rolled oats.

As known by feeders, the advantages of steam-rolled grain include a breakdown of the starches, making for better assimilation by stock, and elimination of waste otherwise carried off in dust. The grain germ is spread throughout the feed but the grain remains intact.

Meat and dairy animals thrive on rolled grain diet, Thomas said. Feeders generally are familiar with mixtures they wish to feed, but diets are established from university extension services.

Arthritis Help Promise Seen In New Drug

ROCHESTER, Minn., April 22 (AP)—Development of a new compound which "appears to have significant promise" in treatment of rheumatoid arthritis was reported today by **Jose Mayo**, clinic physician.

A crippling disease, rheumatoid arthritis has no known cure.

A report on use of the compound was made at a clinic staff meeting by **Dr. Philip**, head of the clinic's arthritis department.

30-Year Search

A 30-year search for the substance, known as "compound E" was described by **Hench** and three associates, **Dr. Edward C. Kendall**, **Charles H. Scoville** and **Howard W. Polley**.

The physicians emphasized that manufacturers will not be able to provide supplies of compound E until January, 1950, and that even after that date the quantity of the drug will be exceedingly small.

The report said Kendall and his associates, with the aid of chemists of **Merek** and company, Rahway, N. J., first achieved partial synthesis of compound E in 1916.

Still Investigated

"The use of compound E," it said, "was and still is considered to be in the nature of investigation of its properties."

"The four doctors" warned that "now is the time to be cautious before we shall know how effective or safe the prolonged administration of compound E will be."

The report said the compound is known in the laboratories as "17-hydroxy-11-dehydrocorticosterone, an adrenal cortical hormone."

**Tapping of Wire
Charge Is Given
Hearing by U. S.**

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—The federal communications commission is considering a complaint that telephone wire-tapping may have figured in a threatened strike of employees of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company earlier this month.

The commission made public a letter from **E. J. Polla**, chairman of the investigating committee for the Washington-Idaho region of the Communication Workers of America, outlining the complaint.

The letter, dated April 8, said the union represented 4,000 telephone employees in the area, and that it had been attempting unsuccessfully to negotiate an agreement with the city telephone and telegraph company for "a satisfactory wage increase."

Polla asserted that "as a result of 'unreasonable delay' in arriving at an agreement, a strike vote was taken among the area workers. The union has area headquarters at Seattle, Wash."

"We have reason to believe that there is a definite possibility that our three main telephone lines in the Seattle office as well as the telephone car office and members are being monitored by the company."

Silo Cow Makes Debut in Public

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 22 (AP)—Grady the silo cow has made her first public appearance.

The white-faced Hereford, immaculately groomed and riding in an aluminum trailer, was the feature of the 98th day parade, which wound through Oklahoma City.

Grady was the cow which jumped through an incredibly narrow opening into a silo in February after she dropped her calf.
