Lewis' new committee will be made up of representatives from the many other industries, including iron, steel, rubber, glass, and other unions.

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—Judith Coplon today asked the U. S. district court to throw out one of five indictments against her which grew out of an alleged rendezvous with a Russian agent.

Peck, Mont.

Health Plan Entered For Debate

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—Legislation to carry out President Truman's far-reaching health program was introduced in congress today.

The bill calls for payroll-tax insurance to provide medical, hospital and dental care for about 120,000,000 Americans at a sponsor-estimated cost of around \$600,000,000 a year.

The administration measure also would put into effect all the other phases of Mr. Truman's program.

These include federal grants for medical education, hospital construction, public health services and research. The bill also authorizes an experimental program of federal aid to persons' health cooperatives.

3 Unions Fail To Get Ruling For Injunction

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—Three railroad unions failed today to get a court ruling on the legality of their strike over wage law suits.

The U. S. court of appeals today on the 10-month-old case, saying the whole issue was moot because the contract is ended.

The three unions—Locomotive Engineers, Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America—had asked the court to issue an injunction to prevent the strike from continuing.

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—A meeting of the National Science Foundation today announced that it will schedule a week of scientific conferences in Washington, D. C., from May 1 to May 7, 1949.

The week is being called "Brain Week" and will feature a series of conferences on the subject of the brain and its functions.

Naval Chief's Term Rests With Truman

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—John L. Sullivan's decision whether to resign as chief of the navy appears today to rest with President Truman.

Sullivan's intimates indicated he was a heart-to-heart talk with the chief executive on the navy's future role in defense strategy as the aftermath of the 60,000-ton super aircraft carrier, "Tullahoma," was built.

Accord Ends Tieup Threat For Packard

DETROIT, April 25 (AP)—A surprise strike at the Packard Motor company, which threatened to lead up production of the "gold model" for the company's golden jubilee, was settled early today.

The strike lasted only three and one-half hours. The 60 pickets who were on duty at the plant at 11 p. m. were removed at 2:30 a. m. when the company agreed to two main union grievances.

2 Men Bound Over to Court In Spud Case

Russ Ease Ban For Food Train

FRANKFURT, April 25 (AP)—The Russians ease the Berlin blockade today by giving permission for a train of food and supplies to enter the Soviet zone.

The train, which is the first to enter since the blockade was imposed, will carry a large amount of food and supplies to the Western zone.

Teachers Ask Special Term From Solons

April 25 (AP)—A proposed special session next year of the Idaho legislature has been asked by the Idaho Education association to take up both current and delinquent aspects of the state teaching system.

The delegate assembly of the association in final session today recommended by the school officials and teacher welfare committee of the association request that the legislature take up the following:

1. That the legislature be asked to provide both uniformity of laws relating to improvement of schools and to the establishment of rehabilitation schools for handicapped children who cannot be taken care of in the home. Cooperation was asked in prevention of public schools in the home of juveniles offenders.

2. That the teachers approved continued effort for obtaining the passage of a new contract law and the payment of a joint committee of the Idaho Education association to develop a code of fair practice which would prevent the unjust action of teachers and administrators.

3. The development of uniform personnel records for use throughout the state was recommended by the committee on improvement of instruction and approved by the delegates. The group recommended continued development of in-service training and teacher courses for teachers. The application of uniform teaching methods in the interest of improving the science services in the schools was recommended.

4. The association reaffirmed its support of federal aid to public schools without federal control.

5. Mrs. B. J. Bates, principal of Boise's Jefferson school, was nominated for the vice presidency of the IEA. The vice president succeeds to the presidency the following year.

6. Green New President

The delegate assembly elected Joseph N. Green, Pocatello school superintendent, as president for the 1949-1950 term.

7. Tom Corson, Lewiston, and Elmer Hoffman, Pocatello, were both nominated as the IEA's number one and two on the board of trustees of the teaching system. Miss Hoffman's term expired this year and was re-nominated.

8. The department of classroom teachers nominated Martin Bryant Blackshaw, and Myra Thomas, Idaho, for the presidency of the IEA.

9. The association and the classroom teachers elections are held by referendum of the membership.

10. Dr. John Booth, IEA executive secretary, said 328 teachers and visitors attended the two-day annual convention. There were 218 elected delegates attending the assembly.

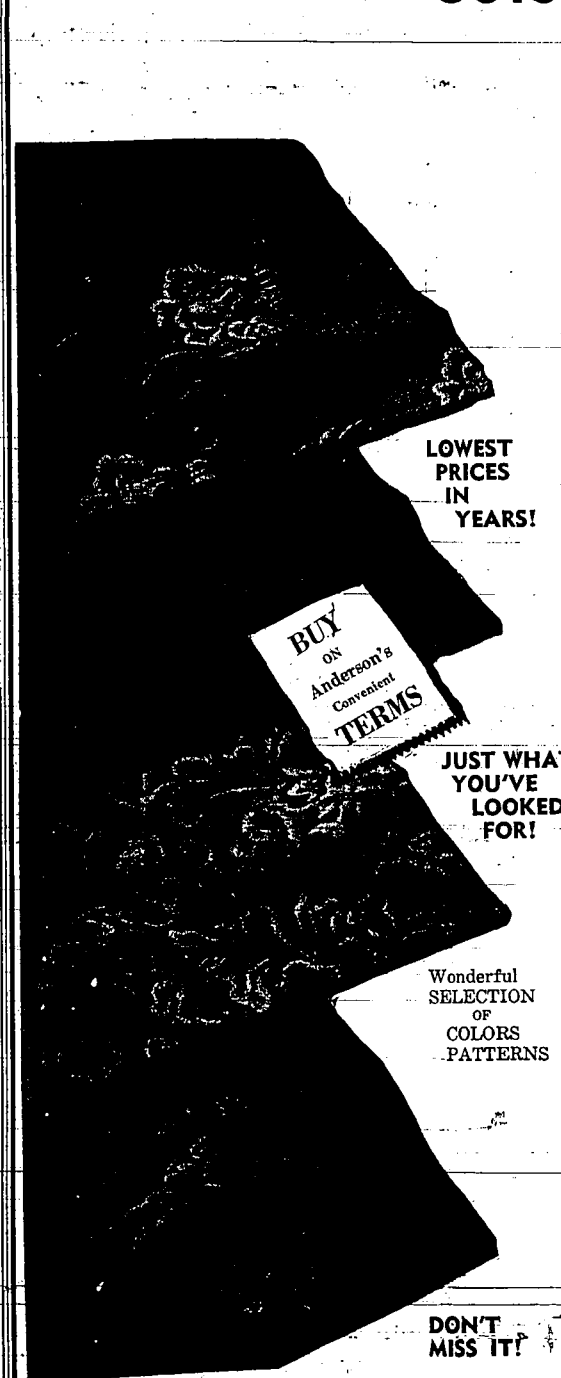
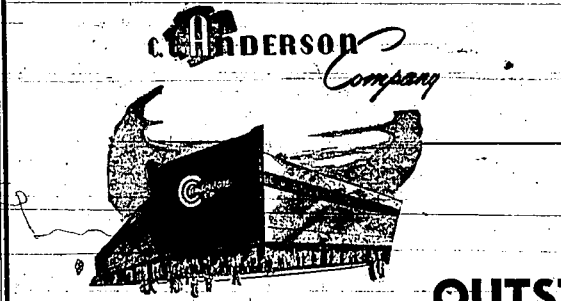

Anticent Newspaper Chronicles Strange Events Back in 1909

Poking around behind old picture frames often turns up some of the most amazing things. A. W. Hayes has discovered this in recent years. But the latest item he located really was a stunner, even for him.

The local historian's discovery was a yellowed front page of the "Weekly Inter Ocean and Farmer," a Chicago newspaper which later became the daily Inter Ocean and subsequently was merged with another Chicago daily.

Dated Friday, July 30, 1909, the front page gives an interesting glimpse of the times as they were in the "good old days" before atomic warfare, the upset of two World Wars and cosmic peonies, and the high-living brought by the automobile, radio and other modern devices.

Most interesting to the average reader of 1946 is a short story headlined "Wright breaks all speed records." The story relates that Orville Wright carried a Lieut. Frank P. Lahm of the army for a flight of 50 miles at Fort Myer, Va.

It was described as a "beautiful flight of one hour, 12 minutes and 40 seconds, traversing upwards of 60 miles at a speed averaging about 60 miles an hour."

It broke the record held by Wilbur Wright, co-inventor with Orville of the airplane. Wilbur's record was one hour, nine minutes and 31 seconds.

Another sign of the times was the treatment accorded President Taft's approval of tariff rates in a bill being compromised by senate and house conferees.

The story carried the lead spot under a two-column headline on the right side of the page. Sub-heads under the main headline blared that the "tariff bill is practically complete and will go to the house at an early date with compromises forced on both ends of the capital," "all and bitter" and "free list" and "number rate fixed at from \$1 to \$4 and wool pulp set at \$3.50 per ton—round schedule

U.S. Puts Out Wide Variety Of Publicity

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Your government can advise you on almost everything—from how to increase rabbit production or control food production to how to drive a nail.

All you have to do to get educated in these things is to go to the old brick building at North Capitol and "H" streets and dig through the stacks of the "book store" of the government printing office.

You'll find piles of pamphlets on just about any subject. There is a little pastel leaflet there called "American History Handout." It tells you why history is probably the best wood to use for a handle for a saw or hatchet. The booklet is put out by the department of commerce, price 10 cents. On page three, it speaks of handles in "modern-day life"—and asks the interesting question "Is there a man, woman, or even a child who has not used a 'hickory handle'?" Not being a wood chopper, I do not recall ever using a hickory handle but the booklet tells me I must be one of the very few.

There are books on how to raise your young when he's age one to six, and ditto from six to 12. One on how to raise a goose. Another on how to select a hen smart enough to sit right down and start laying eggs. Or how to establish and operate a shoe repair business—from the first nail on up.

And speaking of nails, there is a 33-page piece on how to drive one. It's put out by the housing and home finance agency, price 10 cents. It's called "Technique of House Nailing" and is pretty technical. It doesn't tell a man where to put his thumb so it won't get in the way of the hammer.

This was interesting to me because I am probably the only man in America who never learned how to drive a nail. I can remember, however, one sent me down to the fruit counter to rig up a shelf for some tomatoes like wags can do, and so on so the project and hammered in it through nails to hold up the Washington monument.

Daughter of Minidoka Pioneer Recalls Events, Personages of Pre-Atom Era

RUPERT, April 23 — With the feeling of spring permeating the air, the urge for picnics seems to pervade young and old alike. The government park at Minidoka dam becomes the picnic for the evening meal, as families, organizations or groups seek relaxation or respite from the heat.

This park, located 14 miles north-west of Rupert and covered with grass and shade trees, is seldom without at least a few picnickers until the leaves many falling in the autumn.

As I stand looking over Lake Walcott above the dam, where boating and bathing are the order of the day, or look down the river where fishermen are knee deep in the water, my memory starts playing back.

The dam suddenly disappears and Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Smith and I are there just before the dam, which furnished a foundation for the dam. My short schooling broke from the struggles of a fighting trout.

I am compelled to pull the pole and the hand over hand until the four-pounder is landed on the bank, only to have the hook tear loose from the mouth of the fish. In my desperation I jump on the wildly hopping fish to prevent its escape into the water.

Smithy was the telegraph operator at Minidoka a few years after the first dam was built. He died the last New Year's eve in Rupert, a petted railroad man. Dell still lives near the leaves many friends, old and new.

In fancy I can see four spirited horses, hitched to a stagnorated slow boat, chugging across the river, then dashing across the 30 miles of desert to Allalon, with Charlie of Willis Sears at the reins. The only Willis Sears at the Normal was by way of train, to Minidoka, thence by stage.

Charlie was one of the legislators for Cassia county for a number of years, and Willis has been postmaster at Allalon for many years. I don't know how a businessman of Twin Falls was the stage driver from Oakley to Minidoka. It wonder if that is where he developed his love for horses.

Speaking of horses, then the cowboys came driving scores of horses to be used in the round-up. There was always sure to be some thrilling ride on some of the well-trained cow ponies by the young fry of Minidoka as well as some older. Where the wild broncs from the desert, or unbroken horses were brought in to be broken for the saddle, feats of horsemanship were displayed by these cowboys that make the present-day rodeo seem tame, or is it memory playing tricks again, distorting a letting, enchantment.

Some of the main companies running cattle in that area were the Burke company of American Falls.

and, of course, the Schoedens, who just still living in the Emerson district. Late fall arrived, and looking northward toward "Bully Butte" white-covered sheep wagons could be seen "kloof" winding their way toward Minidoka. Thousands of sheep were being driven into winter quarters. When the winter was too severe, hay was shipped by train to be fed to the sheep.

Some of the familiar figures around town during the winter were Jim Laidlaw, "Sheep King," George Coates, long deceased; Jim Lindsay, the Tellers, Jim and Charles; Bob Brookie, fresh from Scotland, and William Dennis, now of Rupert. It was as if I am rudely shaken from my dreams and find we are living in an atomic age and realize that the road over which in fancy I can see a sheep wagon is a possible route to a half billion dollar atomic plant, the Snake river quickly twisting and winding its way in the early 1900's is now harnessed by powerhouses across the river, and steel bridges, the old ferries are obsolete.

When the cattle grazed and the cowboys rode at will, the desert has been transformed into a garden spot covered with prosperous farms and busy towns.

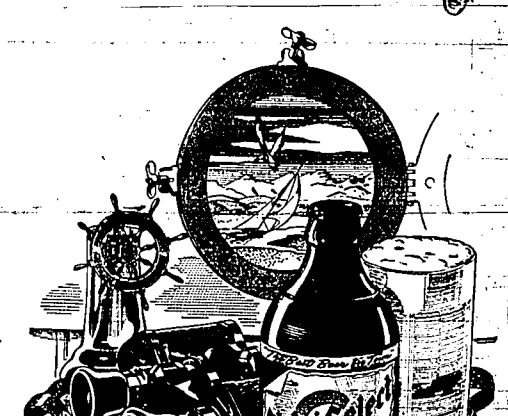

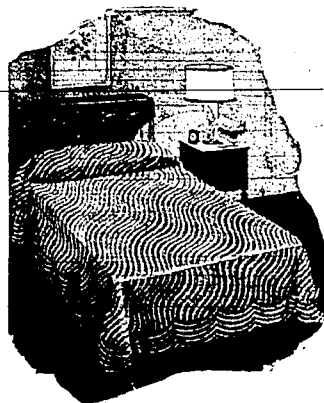
