# Capital Seeks To Solve Big Ship Mystery

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—The army's military intelligence department is authorized to use its special carrier in the first place to find out what happened to the Defense Secretary's lone transport ship which disappeared in the ocean on the 40th anniversary of its sinking.

The idea of the supercarrier was conceived by the late Adm. Marc A. Mitscher during his brilliant task force days in the Pacific. It was developed by the late Adm. Chester W. Nimitz in the Vellecity last year.

Nimitz saw such carriers as the only means of sending atomic bombs against a distant enemy in the event of a surprise attack. The air force evidently has got that notion, as far as Johnson is concerned, and is working on the capabilities of land-based B-36 super bombers.

The navy's super ship had gone ahead with plans to build the ship which would have been the first in history, yet no word has been discovered exactly on when that ship was to start to float the 1,000-foot carrier for B-36-also-A bombers.

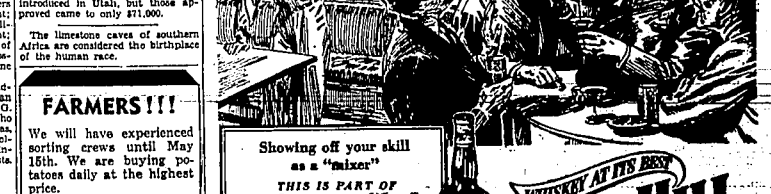

Players for the most part are new, but many teams looking more than a nucleus back from previous seasons.

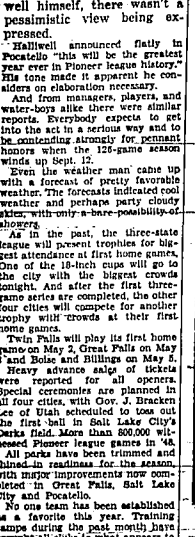

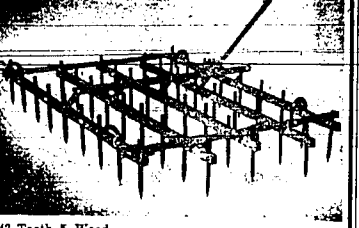

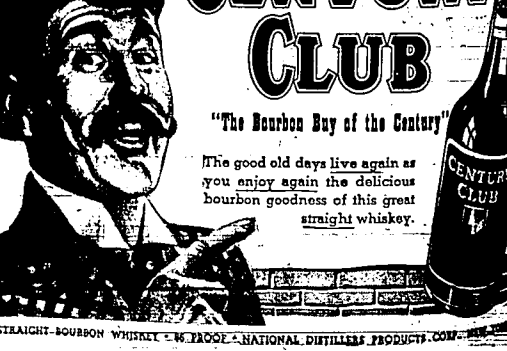

### Food Source Termed Best Germ Target

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—Scientists are coming to believe that the germ source of a nation's livestock and crops would be better targets for germ warfare weapons than human beings.

Accordingly, the military seems to be placing new emphasis on studies of biological warfare directed against animals and plants.

This is indicated in the military acceptance of a new bacteriological program. The bill contains two small but significant items for "plant sector buildings" and additional greenhouses at Camp Detrick, Md. This is the major laboratory studies for defensive and offensive use of bacterial weapons are conducted. These also include construction for a "munitions-loading building, explosion-proof permanent construction" at Camp Detrick. In the absence of further explanation, it is assumed this is in connection with experiments for distribution of bacteria by releasing them from bombs or projectiles. This presumably would be in addition to the implanting of bacteria by less conspicuous methods.

Strategically, the value of warfare against food sources is that its result would be much the same as warfare against the human population of a country. The difference would be maintenance and eventual starvation instead of the less spectacular and ghastly procedure of death by plague.
