### Successor to Army's Chief Is Appointed

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—John L. Calder, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, has been named as the successor to Gen. Omar Bradley as chief of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Calder, 57, is a retired major general in the Army and has served in various capacities in the War Department and the Joint Chiefs of Staff since 1945.

He is the first to be appointed to the post since the office was created in 1942.

Calder will be elevated to the rank of lieutenant general and will be acting secretary until Calder takes office.

**Recall Leaves Today**  
Calder, resigned, leaves his post today. He was defense secretary under Truman.

Calder conferred with President Truman today. They are still considering a replacement for John L. Calder, who resigned as navy secretary yesterday with an angry blast against scrapping the navy's aircraft carrier project.

**Not for Daniels**  
It was learned that the Navy post will not go to John B. Daniels, a publisher, who had been mentioned speculatively as a possible successor to Sec. of the Navy. Daniels is the late Josephus Daniels, secretary of navy in World War I.

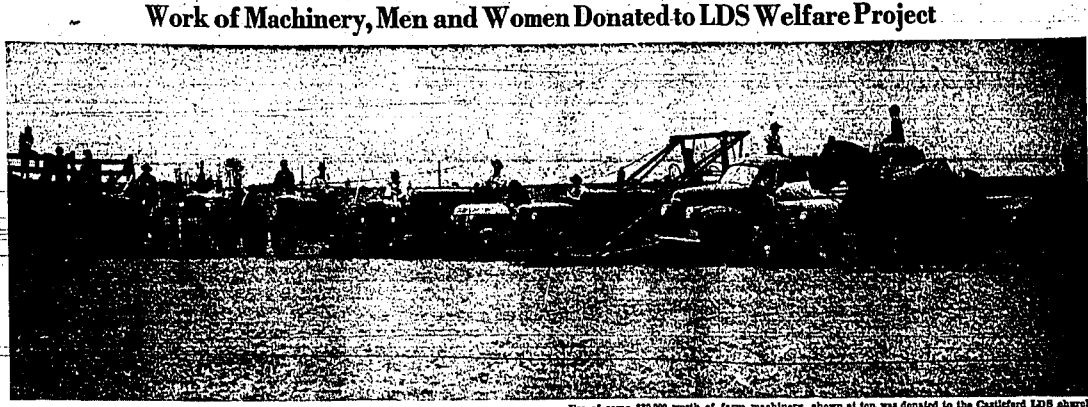
### Castleford LDS Church Buys Farm, Aids in Welfare Project

CASTLEFORD, April 27 (AP)—A 40-acre farm here is being purchased by the LDS church here to aid in providing food for its needy members and to take care of unforeseen emergencies that might arise in the vicinity.

The LDS relief project frequently has aided members over a rough spot.

The farm being purchased is located two miles east and one-fourth mile north of Castleford.

All labor is donated with each donor bringing his own working equipment. The majority of the labor comes from the Castleford Branch of the LDS church, but a number of non-members have also volunteered their machinery and labor. The combined pieces of machinery being donated for the work are valued at more than \$20,000.

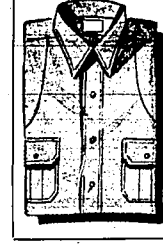

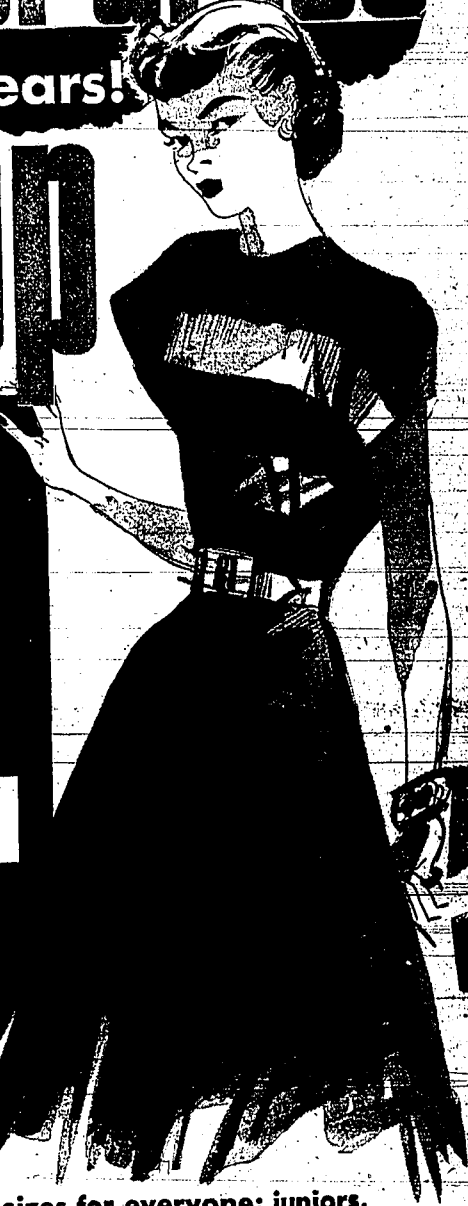

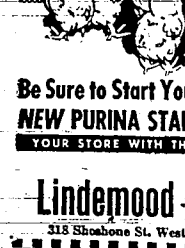

**Earth Builds Up to Quake; Expert Says**

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—A new release caused by the earthquake in San Francisco may be ready for another major seismic study, according to a geologist here.

Dr. Hugo Benoit, professor of geology at California Institute of Technology, made a report to the National Academy of Sciences.

The paper was prepared by Benoit and Dr. Eugene Benoit, who is unable to attend.

Several localities in the blow-off might come in the next few days, according to Benoit in the San Francisco area.

Benoit's conclusions were based on measurements of land uplift on both sides of the fault that runs through the Pacific coast area.

Benoit's measurements along each side of the fault, Benoit explained, indicate the shift has taken place about the same rate as the San Francisco quake.

Energy Release Dips

Benoit's measurements indicate that since 1906 show a steady decline in the release of underground energies through each side.

Benoit concluded, means the strain is growing heavier with time and when the break it may be a big one.

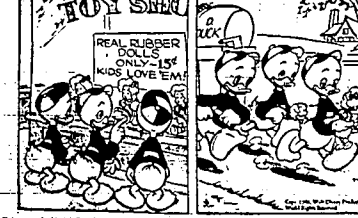

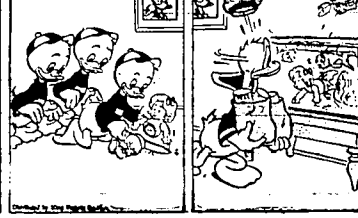
