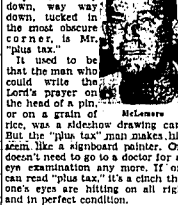

# Man Is Injured, Car 'Demolished' South of Ketchum

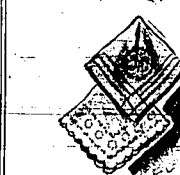

# Tribunal OK Given Decree On Briberies

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—The supreme court today upheld by a 4-4 vote the conviction of two men charged with offering bribes to New York Giants pro football players.

The pair, Harvey "Stemmer" and David Krakower, contended New York state illegally used evidence against them obtained by wiretapping.

Justice Jackson took no part in the case. By long precedent, an equally divided decision upholds the lower court.

Game Important in 1948  
Stemmer and Krakower were accused of offering Frankie Pihock and Merle Hapes \$2,500 each, plus the return on a \$1,000 bet, if they would throw a game to the Chicago Bears. The game was an important one in the 1948 National Football league race.

Stemmer and Krakower were sentenced to 5 to 10 years in prison each. Pihock and Hapes were barred from the league. Stemmer and Krakower appealed to the high tribunal after the New York court of appeals upheld their conviction.

Tapping Permitted  
New York police said they discovered the attempted bribery after tapping telephone conversations. New York law permits law enforcement officers to tap wires under certain circumstances.

Lawyers for Stemmer and Krakower argued that several of the tapped calls were made across the state line to Elizabeth, N. J., and therefore in violation of federal law.

In other actions today the court: 1. Refused to reconsider its two-

month-old decision that states may ban union slowdowns in wage dispute cases.

2. Refused to consider a new test case involving properties bought by Negroes in white residential developments covered by restrictive covenants. The court last year held lower courts cannot enforce such covenants.

3. Unanimously upheld the government's right to use in an anti-trust suit documents barred from a lower court trial on the grounds that they were the fruit of an illegal search and seizure. The charge of illegality was based on the lower

court's contention that the grand jury which ordered the search produced was improperly set up because women were excluded.

WASHINGTON WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Cancellation of contracts for construction of the super-carrier, the United States, has been reported as the result of the violent attack around the capital since the late "Billy" Mitchell declared the "brass" in the middle 20's. There are even charges and counter-charges.

Applying the same White House attitude toward battleships and cruisers, the admirals maintain that the "Trumans" will be virtually across the fleet save for submarines and destroyers.

In their opinion, if a 65,000-ton carrier providing its own umbrella of protection is considered obsolete, it is not surprising that the only exception, fast, heavily armed cruiser types, become out-of-date.

BLOCKED—Truman-Johnson supporters insist that the ban simply did not prevent an agreement on strategic topics reached at the Key West conference of our national defense experts several months ago.

Regardless of the merits of the dispute, navy spokesmen charge it supports their suspicion that Johnson blocked the act for purely political reasons.

BOMB—The development of a more deadly, post-war atom bomb was really responsible for this latest block. It is of such importance which both arms attack to this weapon and its development intention of employing it to the full in any future conflict.

WASTE—Under a 1938 authorization act, which was passed in preparation for World War II, they found that the money was not being used as intended.

DEMONSTRATION—It was then that the air force staged its dramatic publicity demonstration, which included the world non-stop flight, the Berlin airlift and other spectacular events.

NECESSITY—"I'll concede that battleships may be used in the event of a crisis, but I don't think it is putting all our eggs in one basket. There is no assurance that we will have land bases for our bombers in the next war."

WASHINGTON—The decision of Sen. Raymond Baldwin, Connecticut, to leave the senate for a place in the private life of his country has been reported as though it were a clever political trick "put on" by the politician.

It is much more than that. As the case history of a senator who came to Washington with a conscientious resolve to be a good public servant it deserves a serious consideration.

On the day he left for Hartford to confer with Gov. Chester Bowles about the appointment to the court, Baldwin got a letter from a wealthy Connecticut Republican on vacation in Florida. The letter berated him for not paying more attention to his constituents and for certain stands that have classified him as at least a moderate liberal.

To Baldwin, weary of the incessant demands of the public fatigue that with the bickering and quarreling, driven to a sense of futility by the conflicting pulls from so many different directions, the letter was a last straw. It seemed to sum up the man and carrying attitude of those who contribute nothing to the common welfare and their berate over-worked officeholders for failing to achieve the millennium.

The Baldwin case history is important because it is a good example of a few business men of congress feel the same way. This is true in both parties, but it applies particularly to the Republicans who have spent so many years in opposition.

It does not apply, of course, to such stalwarts as Sen. Homer Capehart, Indiana. They know very well that the National Association Manufacturers wants out of congress, and what the NAM wants, the Capeharts also want. They are living under the comfortable protection of a big game that is good for a few businessmen must inevitably be good for everyone.

Not does it apply to such history of oppositionists, as Sen. Styles Bridges, who seem to find ample reward in merely shouting, "No-Bridges has a wonderful range of 'No' extending from the angry and self-righting 'No' to the scornful and contemptuous 'No' that neither me with such damnable effect."

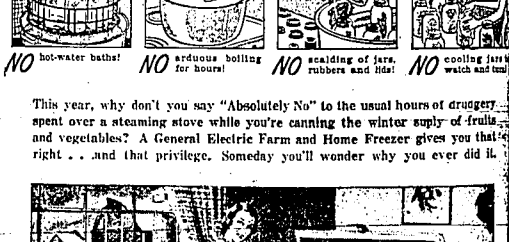

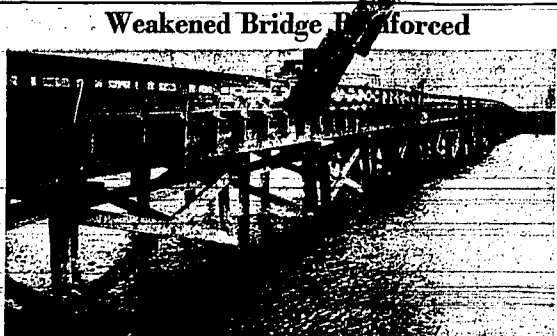

Experts Warn On Motives of Soviet Moves

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—Government foreign affairs experts expressed the belief today that Russia wants to call off the Berlin blockade merely because it is a failure and not because of any desire to promote peace.

They said the success of the airlift and the west's counter-blockade has convinced the Soviets their own blockade is costing them more than it is worth.

These experts, whose job is to analyze Moscow's confusing diplomatic strategy, warned that the lifting of the blockade would not mean that the Kremlin wants peace.

Reds Are Realists... "The Russians are realists," said one official. "They will discard any plan that is not successful. But in the act of discarding it, they will attempt to gain political advantage."

He pointed out that Russian propaganda, beamed to Germany, now is stressing that the Soviet Union is willing to end the blockade to prevent a war which "aggressive western circles" are plotting.
