\$25,000 Case Here Charges "Alienation"

A \$25,000 alienation of affection suit and the cross-complaint to another suit were filed Tuesday in district court by Daniel Huff, Twin Falls.

In a cross-complaint, filed in a suit in which Mrs. Huff seeks a divorce, Huff asks dismissal of the original complaint, a divorce and real estate and a truck owned by the couple.

Mrs. Huff filed a divorce suit Saturday charging extreme cruelty. She asked for furniture, bedding, cooking utensils, an equal division of community property and costs of the suit. The couple was married Jan. 3, 1944, in Boston, Mass.

Woman's Hunt Leads to Find Of Atomic Ore

WILLIAMS, Ariz., May 4 (AP)—A woman's search for petrified wood in a remote canyon of northern Arizona has resulted in the discovery of a rich uranium deposit.

Starting out to collect the specimens in the vermilion cliffs area, eight miles west of Lee's Ferry and 10 miles south of the Utah border, Mrs. Kingsie Baker, Williams, was puzzled by a canary-yellow mineral that saturated the logs in the area.

Obtains Samples

To satisfy her curiosity, she took samples to the Arizona department of mineral resources for identification.

Charles H. Dunning, department director, classified the mineral as curium—a combination of uranium and vanadium.

"It probably returned the logs some 50,000,000 years ago," he said.

"Richest Deposit"

He termed Mrs. Baker's discovery of the mineral made famous by the atomic bomb as "among the richest deposits uncovered in the nation."

It is estimated that 500 tons of the petrified logs lie on the surface in the canyon and other logs are believed to be beneath the surface. They are expected to yield about three per cent uranium.

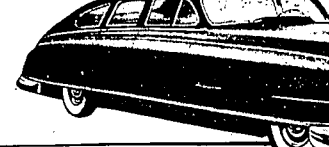

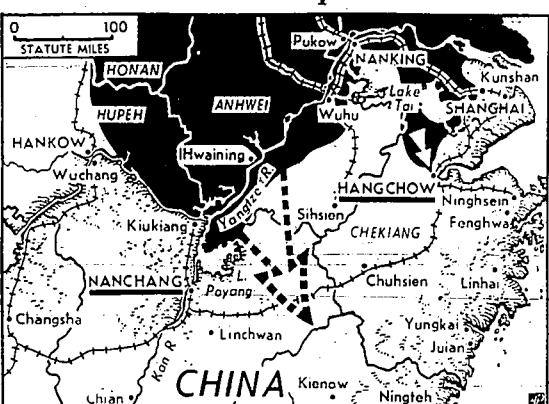

Mrs. Hoes urged residents of Idaho to learn the "danger signals" of the disease as follows:
1. A sore that does not heal—particularly about the tongue, lip or lips.
2. A lump or thickening, especially in the breast, lip or neck.
3. Unusual bleeding or discharge from the nipple or any natural opening.
4. A change in the color of a wart, mole or birthmark.
5. Persistent hoarseness, unexplained cough, or difficulty in swallowing.
6. A change in the normal bowel or bladder habits.
7. A change in the color of the stool.
8. A change in the voice.
9. A change in the shape of the breast.
10. A change in the shape of the testicles.
11. A change in the shape of the neck.
12. A change in the shape of the face.
13. A change in the shape of the hands.
14. A change in the shape of the feet.
15. A change in the shape of the fingers.
16. A change in the shape of the toes.
17. A change in the shape of the nails.
18. A change in the shape of the hair.
19. A change in the shape of the skin.

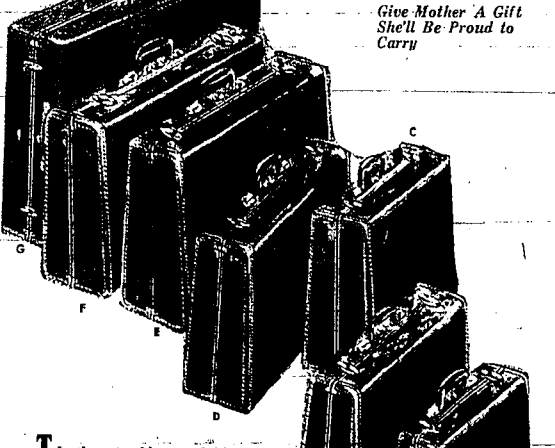

Pay for Mail Loses Value; Airman Says

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—The president of Northwest Airlines, Inc., said mail pay is becoming a less important part of the company's revenues.

Orrin Hunter, St. Paul, Minn., told the senate commerce committee the decreasing importance is developing in spite of the temporary period of re-equipment and readjustment through which the airlines are going.

The committee is studying the airline situation to determine whether costs to the government can be lessened through increased efficiency.

No Criticism

"I have no criticism of mail pay or subsidy pay airlines before the war was when about 40 per cent of the revenues of airlines was mail pay," Hunter said.

He said Northwest's domestic mail pay once was 38 per cent of total revenues, but had steadily decreased to 14.7 per cent in 1948 and is expected to drop to 12 per cent this year.

Winter's Blizzards on Plains Sell Residents on Tree Need

WASHINGTON (AP)—Last winter's big blizzards were good salesmen for shelterbelts. Where roads were protected by rows of trees there was far less drifting of snow.

Since 1935 more than 300,000 trees have been planted on more than 30,000 farms.

McClintock says the shelterbelts really demonstrated their winter worth to the people of the great plains this winter. Snowfall topped all previous records, and the army was called in for help. One of the big jobs was to clear roads drifted as high as 20 feet with snow.

"But we discovered that where tree plants along the roads were at least seven rows wide, with the trees flanked by low-growing shrubs, and their lower branches were not destroyed by grazing, the snow was piled up either in the trees or close to them," McClintock says.

"In places where the lower part of the planting was open because of the lack of a shrub row and grazing, snow drifted through. But even then, the situation was better than where there were no trees."

Long Neglected History

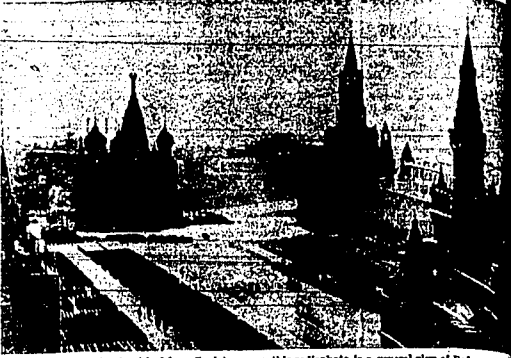
He added there has been a long history of neglect in providing for secondary escape routes from mines and he indicated he intended to hammer away at such deficiencies until they are corrected.

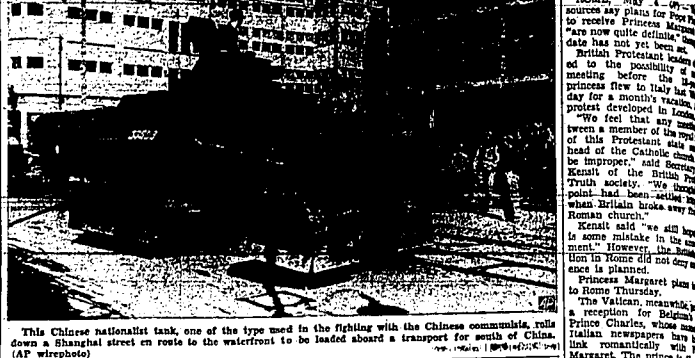

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—"Waivering" government policy toward the wool industry has been described as the greatest single cause for a 10 per cent decline in sheep production in the last 10 years.

Testifies at Hearing
"Waivering" at house-agriculture committee hearings on the creation of a new farm program, Vaughn asserted:

"We do now to present ourselves here today to you that unless a change in economic prospect and government attitude is accomplished soon, this country will presently find itself with no wool-producing industry worth practical consideration."

Assails War Lids
"Imposition of wartime ceilings on meat and wool, with subsidies for growers which did not entirely compensate for rising production costs."

Advocates by federal officials of "the fantastic idea" of exclusive grain diet, and refusal to list wool as a basic commodity.

Million a Day Needed to Aid Stricken Asia

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—The United States still can save China and Asia from communist control, Gen. Claire Chennault said, estimating the cost at about \$1,000,000 a day to help halt the red advance.

Warning that Russia now is "on the brink of unlimited successes in their east," Chennault has told the senate armed services committee that only a policy of "positive action" by this country can "avert the ultimate catastrophe."

The wartime leaders of the "Flying Tigers" asserted that all China will be lost.

Chennault went on to say that if that happens the communist tide will engulf Indo-China, Malaya, Siam, Burma and Indonesia.

The retired air force officer also declared "it is optimistic nonsense to suppose that with all Asia in communist hands, Japan and the Philippines will remain peacefully on our side."

But Chennault said the United States still has time to "decide on and execute a policy of positive action which may yet avert the ultimate catastrophe." He urged at least a minimum program of aid to the anti-communists can maintain a "backlash for the resurgence of Chinese nationalism."

Atlantic Pact Debate Shows U. S. Attitude

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.

Discussion of the Atlantic pact in the Senate Foreign Affairs committee represents a typical American approach to great international problems.

Diplomats and senators alike feel the obligation to let the public know that its affairs are being handled with searching care and deliberation. Sometimes this seems to deteriorate into an effort to convince ourselves that we aren't doing what we are doing.

When it was decided that Britain needed a big victory loan, everything was agreed upon among the top leaders. Then it went to Congress, where Britain was so berated that much of the good will of the action was lost.

Scared to Death

Congress approved the Marshall plan and then carried Europe to death with a just minute flight over the actual appropriation.

Now the United States has taken the lead in forming a historical alliance, Norway, for instance, joined under considerable pressure and in defiance of threats from neighboring Russia. But, instead of standing as a firm, shining example of western unity, every nation that the pact will be delivered all furnished with legalistic quibbles. It would be unnatural Europe and not wonder, if interpretation of the pact varies so much now, what loopholes will be sought in case of an emergency.

The alliance is designed as a firm wartime pact that no nation can again gamble on conquering Europe without having to fight the United States. That is its major objective, and its hope for peace lies in the fact that no nation is going to deliberately attack the United States in all its power.

Economic Objective

The pact also has its economic objective. It is to assure western Europe that its industrial and business life can be rebuilt without fear of loss by war.

A political objective is to convince western Europeans that the United States is not trying to use them as buffers, as they have widely feared; that the U. S. no longer tries to ignore the fact that trouble in Europe is trouble in Kansas.

The U. S. army and air force are deployed in Britain, Germany, Austria, Trieste and the middle east. A war of any size could hardly start without involving them immediately, pact or no pact.

For the diplomat to say then, that the pact does not mean automatic war in case of aggression is merely to disguise the taste of the medicine. It is true, as the state department points out, that there is room for measure short of war in some possible cases; that there is no obligation to go to war until we have consulted and decided that war is necessary. Then, in this legalistic approach, we will be obligated to fight.

Did anyone ever decide how many angels could dance on the point of a needle?

Heretic Action

The Atlantic pact represents heretic action for a nation which has sought traditionally to keep clear of the entanglements of others. It represents one of the most momentous policy shifts in American history.

One of the keenest American observers of the international scene asked me yesterday: "Why is it, when we are going to do something here, we don't recognize the value of doing it heretically?"

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)—B-h-h-h-h. Quiet, please quiet! Traffic is no bird call. Don't make a sound. This is national noise abatement week.

Now is the time for all good men to creep about on their haunches on little cat feet. Anybody who makes an unnecessary sound in the next seven days is certainly no 100 per cent American. Americans cooperate.

The signal for anti-noise week was given by a Wal Duple strong, silent man.

Secretary of State Tom E. Dewey. He didn't make a speech about it. That wouldn't have been right.

No. The government issued a surly statement instead. He said excessive noises were "one of the hidden drawbacks of our civilization." And he urged the citizenry to organize abatement groups.

Presumably, just to set an example, the discussion meetings of such groups are conducted by whisper.

Anti-noise week started off with a bang. Both congress and the United Nations were in session, chinning out loud as usual.

There is some uncertainty in the public mind as to how to celebrate noise abatement week. This arises naturally from the wide spread confusion over just what noise is—and what it isn't.

Noise basically can be defined as a sound made by someone else that annoys you. The trouble is that if you try to shut the other fellow up you are likely to get into an argument. Then you both make strange sounds that become noise to a third party.

The only person who can avoid noise is a hermit who lives in the woods and can read without moving his lips. But sometimes even a hermit can't escape from his own noise. He finds he is talking to himself just when he wants to sit still and think. He gets in the bad habit of being quiet out loud.

One of the difficulties of noise abatement week this year is that it is running into some pretty stiff competition. This also happens to be national boys and girls week, national family week, American camp week, and national baby week.

Yes, and if your favorite cafeteria feels free to serve any old noisy soup it wants because it is national restaurant week. And anybody who wants to grind a knife sharp has a right to. For it is national cutlery week.

It is even impossible to have quiet around the house. Sure enough, it's spring cleaning week, too.

You can't even beat your dog for howling at night. This is kind to animals week.

Of course, there is some precedent for having anti-noise week now. It was in this period four years ago that the biggest noise in history abated—the second World War in Europe.

If you're disillusioned about anti-noise week, there is small comfort ahead. You might just as well put out your earmuffs, stuff your mouth with raisins, and crawl into the refrigerator. That's the only way to be in the noise week.

For it's national hearing week, anti-national tweek—and they merge into national frozen food week.

Oh, yes, it's national golf week. And it is also national packaging week.

Do you ever feel like you're in a package?

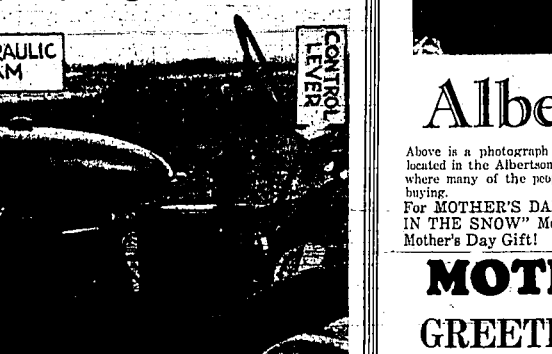

Storke Likely To Head Big Copper Firm

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)—Arthur D. Storke, now president of Climax Molybdenum corporation, appears slated to become president of the nation's largest copper producer, American Copper corporation.

The company's veteran president, E. T. Stannard, told the annual stockholders meeting he has reached the retirement age and will step down at the end of this year from the post he has held for 18 years.

Stannard expects to remain as a director and consultant, but that "it is the present expectation" he will be succeeded by Storke.

Storke is 54 years old and has been connected with mining interests since the age of 16 when he went west from his birthplace, Auburn, N. Y., to work at a gold mine at Cripple Creek, Colo.

Stannard said the company's first-quarter earnings were "affected appreciably" by the long winter strike at the Bingham canyon property.

Earnings for the quarter were equal to about \$1.50 a share.

Kennecott does not issue quarterly reports, so no comparative figure for the 1948 quarter is available. However, in the first half of last year, earnings were equal to \$1.49 a share.

Stannard blamed the recent decline in copper prices chiefly on three factors: "A very considerable falling off in building and general business," an apparently universal desire "by consumers to reduce their inventories in a declining business cycle, and a general belief that all commodities have been too high-priced."
