Soil Conservation Project Is Completed by Burley Students

BURLEY, May 6—Burley high school Future Farmers, under the supervision of Bill Keller, vocational agriculture instructor, have completed a project of setting out a windbreak on-fourth mile long at the Matthew Fertle ranch south of Burley.

This project, in keeping with a soil erosion study made by the students, was planned with the help of their instructor, Rocky Mountain Juniper trees were selected for the windbreak.

The field used for the test windbreak has been subject to extreme wind erosion the past several years, Keller said. He urged farmers interested in obtaining trees for windbreaks to check with County Agent Glenn Bodilly, and also to watch the development of the project at the Fertle farm.

In making the study Keller reported, the boys found the University of Idaho college of agriculture has conducted many experimental plots developing trees for windbreaks, which use a minimum of water and which will not cut the crop yields of the plants close to the trees.

Mrs. Fertle has a row of Russian olive trees planted west the farm house unit which have proven a satisfactory windbreak and which prevented snow drifting around the house this winter. The sugar beets harvested within 10 feet of the trees have the same yield as those harvested from the rest of the open field.

Senate Passes \$300,000,000 In School Aid

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—The senate late tonight passed a bill authorizing federal grants of \$300,000,000 a year to help the state pay teachers' salaries and other school operating expenses. It goes to the house.

The vote on passage was 58 to 15. Passage came after the senate slumped down a series of major amendments. Two of them brought in the question of church and state relations in dealing with schools.

Restrainer Defeated One of the last amendments rejected was one by Senator Donnell R. Mo., to limit the bill's funds to public schools. It was amended under House 2, with Donnell, Calif., Wash., and McClellan, D. Ark., voting for it. The bill lets the states decide who gets the money.

Barler, senators rejected by voice vote an amendment of Senator McClellan, D. Ark., which would require all of the federal funds used by a state for school bus service must be available to all children whether they attend parochial or public school. The bill leaves this question for the states to decide.

To Reduce Inequities The declared purpose of the bill is to aid in financing a minimum educational program in primary and secondary schools, and to reduce inequalities of educational opportunities. It would provide that each state would be \$5 to \$20 a pupil figured on a formula taking into account the payments in each state. The poorer states would get a larger share.

The senate acted at a night session after five days of debate. The measure was introduced by a bipartisan group of senators and strongly urged by President Truman.

Loss Huge as Fire Destroys Track's Plant

TOLEWOOD, Calif., May 6 (AP)—A multi-million dollar fire destroyed the grandstand, clubhouse and turf club at Hollywood park race track early today. The firemen were hurt fighting the blaze.

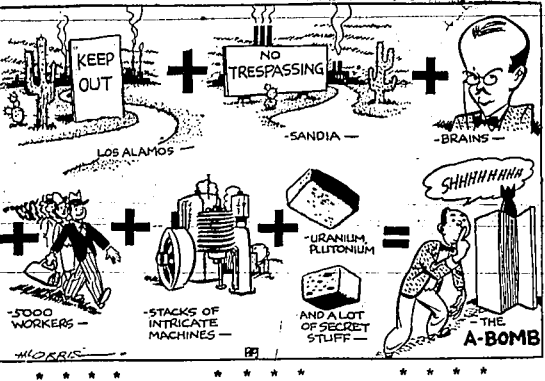

"Tired," Says Researcher in Weed Project

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 6—If any more goateed seed counting is necessary in Idaho's special weed research program, Dr. E. S. Seely, special weed research worker at the University of Idaho, definitely doesn't want any part of it. He's endured enough eye strain already counting the dust-like seeds.

With research concentrating on ways to eradicate the weed, Seely was analogous to a line on the neural reinfector machine, where many plants are removed from the land.

Seeds of the serious rank weed are slightly smaller than petunia seeds. Each plant produces thousands of them. Worse of all, the seeds have a germination rate of 95 per cent and survive five to six years.

Seely wanted to know how many of the tiny goateeds were in a bush to make a sound. Despite eye strain he counted enough individual seeds to secure a minute but reliable quality. Turning to arithmetic, he came up with this answer:

"Somewhere way, way up in the millions."

Seely estimates that more than 1,000,000 acres of Idaho range lands have goateed infestations of various sizes. He has traveled considerably in southern and central Idaho and his guess is that if all the goateed patches were lumped together they would cover more than 100,000 acres.
