Over the years, various CVA bills have been introduced. West said the main purpose is to control the resource of water. If a flood control project has only regional value rather than national value, it is given an unfavorable report.

Not Appreciative  
"All CVA bills do not have safeguards in them," he added. "I am not appreciative that the United States will go down the road of socialism where England has gone."

A preview from congress on the question of appropriations is expected, he said. Ninety-five per cent of the funds sought for this purpose are eventually repaid either to congress or the U.S. treasury.

West quoted statistics on TVA. "The TVA was for a sick and dejected group of people," he said.

Cases Differ  
"TVA was good for sick people, but why try to force the same treatment on a well patient?" he asked.

"The bill hasn't been written yet which is on a non-political basis," he concluded. "We are at the opening chapter of endless possibilities for development of our resources."

M. V. Sharp, filer, president of the Idaho Reclamation association, spoke briefly, emphasizing points made by West.

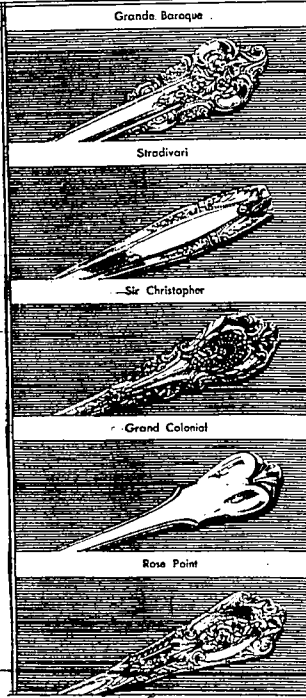

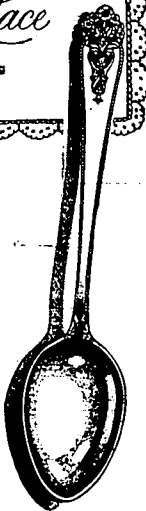

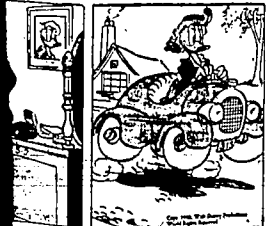

### Russians Must Change Stand Before Parley

It Russia adheres to a German paper the one asserted by the red army newspaper in Berlin, there will be no four-power settlement in the near future. The paper says the Soviets will demand a peace treaty which would:

- 1—Exclude Germany from the new council of Europe and the Atlantic pact. So far as the pact is concerned, nobody intends to include her as an armed participant although her defense is essential. But that Germany must eventually become a member of the European family of nations is accepted as fundamental to European peace. It is a prime allied objective, not subject to change.

Discard Statute

- 2—Discard the allied control statute for the Ruhr and admit that it is a bare possibility, but only under air tight safeguards against Russian destructionism.
- 3—Discard allied policies (including plans for a federal government) which have been adopted since Russia withdrew from the four-power control of Germany. The allies have said flatly that they will do no such thing.
- 4—Establish a government of all Germany which will follow the lines of the Soviet zone for "people's democracy." This is a cry for communism and Soviet control following the pattern of eastern Europe, and is utterly impossible of acceptance.
- 5—End the military occupation of Germany one year. Which, of course, would permit highly organized communist cadres, the Russian-picked German police of the east and perhaps even a Von Paulus army (which has been reported but not verified as organizing under Russian auspices) to begin using the tactics which conquered eastern Europe.

The Russian army paper, of course, may not be correctly presenting the Kremlin's views, knowing that it will not get into trouble by advancing suggestions which would permit Soviet diplomats to appear milder when they get to Paris. Or there could be extreme demands, put forward for the purpose of horse trading.

Whatever the purpose of this publication, few students of Russian tactics are expecting the lifting of the Berlin blockade, or anything more than a Russian withdrawal in one sector in order to press her fight for control of Germany on other fronts.
