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Power Restored to Parts of Berlin as Tieup's End Begun

BERLIN, May 10 (AP)—Russian authorities began lifting the Berlin blockade 40 hours before the deadline today when they restored electric power to parts of the western sectors.

The Soviet action gave American sector households unrationed electricity in the middle of the morning for the first time since power rationing during the first western Berlin by the Soviet blockade last July 9.

Restoration of electric power to parts of the western sectors would be a major step toward ending the Berlin blockade.

A cab driver who took him to a downtown hotel was the last to see him. Weaver left his clothing, keys and personal belongings at the hotel.

Gillette sent a full length picture of Weaver to Denver to aid identification. Further information concerning Weaver's disappearance will be known here until Denver police send a report to the police department here.



Arco Route Jaunt Finds No One Home; Information Told

Red Struggle Seen Starting Anew Abroad

"The hard-boiled anti-communist mayor of western Berlin, Ernst Reuter, says the New York agreement among the big four to lift the blockade of the German capital marks the 'real beginning of a tug-of-war between the east and west.'"

Reuter means, I take it, that we are about to see the start of a great struggle between Russia and the western allies for control of all Germany. It's the old story—pre-war Germany was the keystone of much of continental Europe's economy.

Wes Gallagher, AP chief of bureau in Germany, reports that many international observers there believe victory for the west would shatter the red iron curtain. The reason is that eastern Europe traditionally has depended heavily on the Reich for necessities which it is doubtful Russia alone can provide.

We are harking back to the vast economic empire which Hitler gambled away because of his inordinate ambition to annex and enslave all Europe—and after that only Heaven knows what. When Hitler launched World War II he was virtually car of the whole of eastern Europe up to the Russian border, because of his economic stranglehold.


Hitler was master of the rolling fields of grain and herds of his satellites. They had no alternative but to what he said. Reichsmark would have meant that Germany would stop importing from the unruly country, thereby bankrupting it, since it had no alternative markets.

The real chief constantly drew the net tighter until just before the war he actually was telling the small states what they had to buy from the Reich.

Most of these satellites now are under Russia's control. Thus the question arises as to how far she can go in supplying the industrial necessities.

If Moscow could gain control of Germany through communication, the problem presumably would be solved for the Soviets.

Sanitarian Outlines Defects In Paul Sewage, Water Setup

Lack of sewage facilities and defects in the village water supply system in Paul have been studied following a report by Paul officials, according to H. E. Post, sanitarian, south central Idaho health unit.

Review of the last report of Paul water system indicated two public health defects, Post said. They were the location of the city pump in a pit and inadequate bacteriological record.

Keith Harvey, sanitarian, investigated conditions in Paul and found health hazards created by the lack of sewage system and adequate water supply.

There are several overflowing cesspools, with two behind the school he reported. Some properties have so many cesspools, old and in use, that they present unfavorable conditions.

Harvey also reported dangerous conditions existing in that one or more communicable disease outbreaks may be spread at any time by flies.

The bacteriological record of the city water supply has been unsatisfactory and three months out of eight in 1944 samples were contaminated, Harvey said.

Mainline of the water supply system needs repair, he added. The mains are faulty and there are several unnecessary dead ends.

To correct the conditions, the city is now picking up garbage and rubbish in accordance with a new ordinance, Post said. The village board plans to repair the water supply and correct public health hazards as soon as possible, he added.

Oregon's Capital Votes to Change To Daylight Time

SALEM, Ore., May 10 (AP)—City Council of Oregon state capital has voted to go on daylight saving time Monday, May 16, at 2 a. m. It would be in effect until Sept. 11.

This will put the mid-Willamette valley city among the growing number of Oregon areas which shifted to fast time with metropolitan Portland April 24.

The daylight saving time question may get snarled in state courts after mid-July. The legislature passed a law requiring state clocks to remain on the standard time units both Washington and California are on daylight time. Under the law, the clock shift can only be made by proclamation of the governor.

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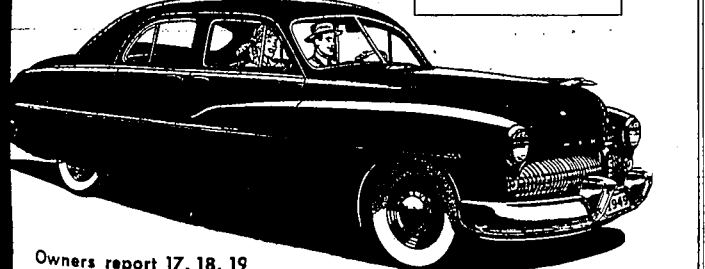

Capitol Plans On Repairing 'Dead' Clocks

BOISE, May 10 (AP)—There was a good chance today for revival of an 80-year-old indoor sport at the statehouse—clock-watching. (Girls, we're kidding.)

That pastime went out of fashion about 10 years ago when the master electric-clock system in the massive gray structure went out of whack. Electric clocks in every office stopped.

Since then, statehouse officials and employees have had to rely on their own personal timepieces, or wristwatches, alarm clocks, elegant boudoir clocks and in a few instances on a radio clock.

Repair Bid Asked

Now, after a tickless decade, a new bid has been started to run the time system back into commission. James Reid, acting director of public works, has asked for estimates for the repair job. He hasn't received any yet, but he's hopeful.

Most of the electric clocks have been set at 12. But others show different times, largely the result of some personal whim.

In the attorney general's office, the lifeline clock shows 12:00 and bears the sign: "It's later than you think."

Covered by Picture

Someone has been made aware of the state reclamation department has covered the face of the clock with the picture of a streamlined locomotive coming hell-bent around a curve.

To still another office, some work has crayed over the face of the clock the letters: "P.M.S."

Two ornate electric clocks in the supreme court room are ornamental but uninformative. However, just below each is a small electric clock, not dependent on the master system, to remind lawyers that they are talking on and on and on.

Stopped at 2 p. m.

The Clock in the Highway Bureau

Burley Property Owners Find Irrigation Water Is Liability

BURLEY, May 10—A meeting was held in the court room of Cassia county courthouse by property owners in the Southeast addition to Burley to discuss the matter of water charges by the Burley Irrigation district against this property.

Affected by the water charges are approximately 340 lots, many of which are improved with new homes. Irrigation water was allocated originally to this land as farm land, and the Burley Irrigation district is still obligated to make charges for construction, operation and maintenance against the 40 acres included in the Southeast addition.

This water is not now being used for irrigation because of the difficulties and inconveniences of raising the water in ditches to flood arched lawns and around residences.

In previous years, larger property owners in the addition have paid the entire charges, but now the ownership is broken down into small parcels of one or more lots. The practice of one or more of the larger owners of paying for all the water will be discontinued this year.

The Irrigation district is not permitted, by law, to receive money for proportional payment according to area or individual property but must receive payment for the entire 40 acres at one time.

The first payment for the 1948 construction charges and the 1949 operation and maintenance charges are now delinquent, and Frank Redfield, secretary-treasurer of Burley Irrigation district, stated that the district will be obliged to file a lien

WASHINGTON, May 10 (AP)—Major Gen. Raymond W. Bliss, army surgeon general, has announced plans to ask reserve medical officers to volunteer for one to 30 days duty each month to help relieve a staff shortage in the army.

Bliss said questionnaires will be sent out within the next few days asking the reserve officers if they will be available for short periods of service. The quotas will go to 1,000 doctors, 2,248 dentists, and 1,272 veterinarians.

The surgeon general said if 5,000 or the number volunteer for only three days of service each month the man hours contributed in the year's time would equal the full-time services of 600 doctors, dentists and veterinarians.

"The army medical department is faced with an unparalleled peacetime emergency in carrying out our medical requirements satisfactorily," Bliss said.
