Canopy Kills Plane's Test Flight Pilot

SEATTLE, May 10 (AP)—A hoisted canopy on a 100-mile-per-hour Boeing XP-47 test jet fighter killed the pilot on a test flight over the Cascade Lakes Wash. air force base late Wednesday.

Boeing officials identified the dead pilot as Edward Scott Oster, 30, of Bellevue, Wash.

They said his co-pilot, James A. Fraser of Seattle, brought the plane in for a landing. Oster was dead by the time the plane landed.

The canopy above the pilot's head, somehow became loosened and injured Oster fatally while he was checking the automatic pilot in making a descent.

The plane is one of two built for the company under contract for the military. The other one of the planes built the all-type west-coast transcontinental speed record flight from Los Angeles to Seattle, Wash. on May 1, 1947, in 4 hours, 56 minutes, 54 seconds.

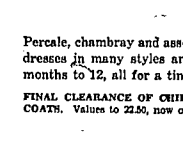

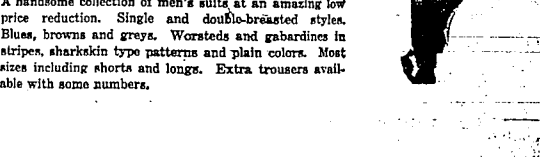

Osborne did come here and, meanwhile Compton died, and Aylmore found \$23,000 in Compton's name in bank accounts. She had two no-widowhoods since 1937. The two old friends, Osborne and Compton, were both dead. Health knew Compton had been wealthy so Aylmore directed a search of the estate.

First they found \$10 in a glass jar, apparently used for day to day needs. Then they found two more glass jars, each containing more than \$10,000 in currency. All had been buried in the dirt floor of the garage.
