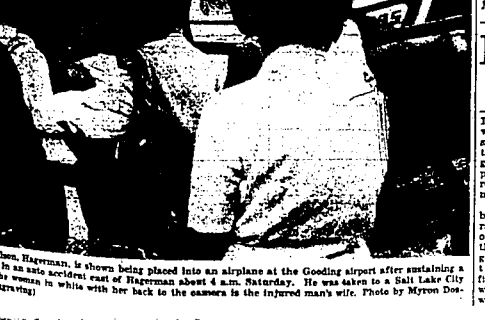

Hagerman State Fish Hatchery Opens For First Year of Full Production

Friday may prove to be one of the luckiest days in many years for Idaho fishermen.

The first trout eggs of the season were planted on that day in the state fish and game department's Hagerman fish hatchery, the largest in the state. The Friday planting marks the start of the first season that will see the plant reach full production.

More than 400,000 rainbow trout eggs, refrigerated and flown from California, arrived at the hatchery Friday.

Warm water fish also are being reared at Hagerman. Twelve ponds, covering 10 acres of land contain bass, bluegills and bullheads.

Streams all over the state will be stocked with fish from this plant. Canned refrigerated tank fish will also be sold for 200,000 more rainbow trout eggs from Williams lake near Salmon City and 1,000,000 cutthroat trout eggs from Henry's lake.

Combined with the estimated half-million fish already in streams and ponds, the development means a lot of fishing for Idaho anglers.

Elwood Grimes, superintendent of the large hatchery, is rapidly putting things in order for full production. Only electrical wiring remains to be completed in the main hatchery building.

Pish of all sizes can be found in the raceways outside the hatchery buildings. Included are rainbow cutthroat, where the flow has been measured at more than 60 second feet.

If additional water is needed, it can be diverted from a nearby creek.

The fish are fed a combination of growth hormone and liver and dry meals, Grimes explained.

A large early-summer supply of fish is expected to be kept at the hatchery for early spring planting next year. The fish, mainly cutthroat, will be transferred to larger raceways located near the main hatchery building. Four of these raceways cover one-third of an acre each.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

When Mr. and Mrs. Harold Harris bought their new home a couple of years ago, they had visions of growing all their winter supplies of fruits and vegetables in their own back yard. The first year they planted three fruit trees and put in rows after rows of vegetables. All went well; they ate and ate and froze beans and froze peas and Mrs. Harris, Wini, canned and canned.

But things weren't just right for "Hans," who is a soil conservationist. You see, he had an apple tree, a plum tree and an apricot tree. He also wanted a big cherry tree, a peach tree and a semi-wild cherry tree, but on 50-foot lots that's next to impossible.

So after Hans brooded over it all summer, he took matters into his own hands and last fall he went west where we might call a conservationist hunt. For the "chickens" being cherry trees he could find in Jerome, he picked a bud and carried it home. He carefully home to his plum tree, with a sharp knife he made a horizontal slot and then a vertical one. He stuck the bud in the slot and held the bark tight.

Another time he did the same thing with a bud from the most choice peach tree.

His next trip was to find a bud from a semi-wild cherry tree. With visions of a piece of juicy cherry pie in his mind, he took plenty of time to find this bud. And if that wasn't enough for one tree to bear, he again set out to find a bud from an apricot tree. His work done, Hans then had a bud from a big cherry tree, a peach tree, a semi-wild cherry tree and an apricot tree—all in one plum tree. Fruit cocktail! This spring I have seen all the buds growing and the apricots have blossomed. In fact, Mr. and Mrs. Harris expect to eat apricots from this tree this year—if the neighborhood kids don't get there first.
