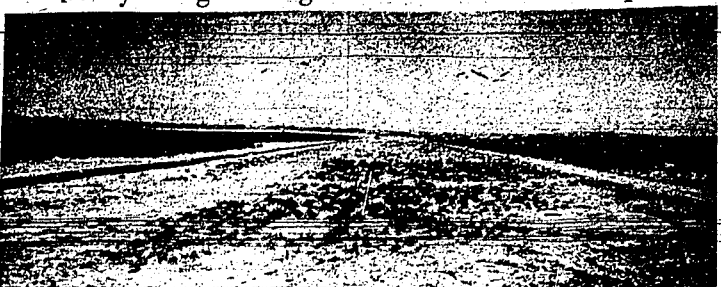
Navy Places Eliers' Claim On Hot Seat

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—The navy has the air force on a hot seat. It has challenged the air force in several instances, but the navy's bombers and prove that they are almost impossible to knock down when flying above 40,000 feet. The navy proposal is about a month old but it has just come to light. As far as can be learned, the office of Defense Secretary Louis Johnson said the matter has been under discussion.

Followed USAP Claim
By coincidence or not, the navy proposition followed disclosure that the air force believed Russia could effectively intercept B-35's attacks in the event of war. This belief was founded on generally true facts and estimates by four interceptors. Officially, the navy asked the air force to make available one or more B-35's so it could test carrier-based fighters against high-altitude bombers. The navy believes its P-3H Banshee jet and P-40 Corsair piston-engine fighters can intercept B-35's which lack from above 40,000 feet. But it has no bombers of its own with which to test.

Capabilities Over-Emphasized
Many top navy officers also believe that air force inter-continental bombing capabilities have been over-emphasized in the department of naval activities. They cite the building of the \$1,000,000 super aircraft carrier project as a big case in point. In response to United States inquiry, Johnson's office said that there has been "some discussion" recently between the navy and the air force and among the joint chiefs of staff for a test of navy radar intercept capability against the B-35 bombers but that no formal consideration has been given to the subject yet.

Deep Wells Mean Reclaiming Of 6,500 Acres of Arid Land

MURTAUGH, May 10—Another chapter is being written in the development of Magic Valley, an area where the addition of water to fertile soil brings crops as if by magic. Most of the area's development comes through the building of dams, reservoirs, canals, laterals and water-edge pumping stations which bring thousands of acres of land under irrigation. In some areas, wells are placed at regular intervals in anticipation of land development through use of natural-flowing wells for irrigation. One of these is Arsten City, south of Murtaugh. It is now some 2,000 acres of that area, through pumping water from deep wells. Some 5,000 acres are being prepared for crops this spring. With the feeding it is an experiment but instead of establishing a permanent project. This land is located in Twin Falls and Cassia counties and lies south of U. S. Highway 20. A portion of the new development was included in the Murtaugh irrigation district. The areas first wells were drilled as recently as four years ago and as they continued to produce water for after years, others were drilled. Their depth range from 100 to 600 feet, their diameters vary from 10 to 18 inches. With the drilling of more wells, there has been active reclamation through the use of electric pumps on a modern scale. The first improvement is electric water-pumped pumps that pump the water from 10 to 25 horsepower and produce a flow of 40 to 150 inches from levels of 80 to 200 feet. Other phases of the development are equally modern, heavy duty equipment to spare the back-breaking labor of clearing brush, and modern equipment for farm operations. New roads have been built, old ones have been improved and watered. Homes on the project vary from modest structures to \$18,000 homes with every convenience. That is the result of the foresight and ambition of such men as John Savage, Everett Hager, Max Boley and Frank Thompson who took the full chance there might be water sufficient to make large scale irrigation practicable. Against that chance there was the advantage of better crops at higher prices. Depending on the size and type of the well, its cost can run from \$3,000 to more than \$10,000, including pump and pipe. There is the cost of digging the water where it is to be used. Savage said the well water is more expensive than canal water, but is cheaper than water pumped from reservoirs. He said he considers the well water will cost about the same as the others over a long term, figuring in the land's lower taxes and high productivity.

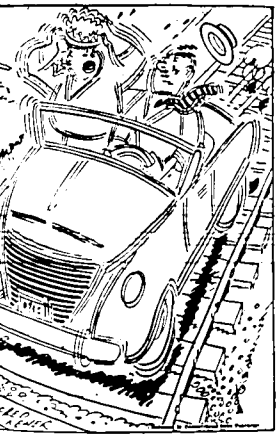

Varied Views Expressed in Health Battle

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—Here are some of the main arguments, pro and con, regarding the controversial national compulsory health insurance program.

1. Proponents say millions of our people lack adequate medical care—and the only way to assure it is through compulsory pre-paid sickness insurance based on payroll deductions. Says the opposite: "There's no evidence for such a figure in the healthiest country in the world. Moreover no one who has ever sought or desired medical care has been denied it."

2. Proponents: Assurance of steady job and steady health, with pay to the nation's health. Opponents: Better nutrition, housing, clothing and recreation programs are just as important to the nation's health as medical care.

3. Make Nation Stronger

2. Proponents: The proposed program, by safeguarding health, will make us a stronger nation. Opponents: "Socialized medicine" will undermine our democracy. It is the first step towards regimentation.

3. Proponents: The present system of medical care is too expensive—only the rich can really afford adequate care. Opponents: There are no people from the vast majority of middle class people, or rural groups for the government's plan.

4. Proponents: The quality of medical care would be improved. Opponents: Medical services will drop from first-rate to third-rate.

5. Proponents: "There would be better doctors of health. Opponents: No system of compulsory health insurance will affect the distribution of doctors, dentists or nurses."

6. Can Choose Patients

7. Proponents: Doctors will be just as free as they ever were. They can choose the patients they want, and patients will choose their doctors. Opponents: It will be better medicine with better doctor and patient responses to the government. The doctor will only be "free" as far as the advice by government regulations.

8. Proponents: There will be no political interference with health care. Administration of the plan will be handled by local groups in the doctor's own communities. Opponents: The government still will be boss.

9. Proponents: The plan will cost no more than is now spent by the American people on medical care. Opponents: The plan will cost "billions annually, moreover, hereafter after bureau will be added."

10. Problems Not Solved

11. Proponents: "Quicker plans of health insurance have not solved the problem of medical care. Opponents: Voluntary health care is the trick under the need exist."

12. Opponents: Under the traditional system of paying for medical care, people are often saddled with big bills at a time when they have no funds. Opponents: This people are already saddled with all kinds of payroll deductions.

13. Proponents: There will be no abuses of the system. People won't demand excessive services. Opponents: On the job, they will become a nation of hypochondriacs.

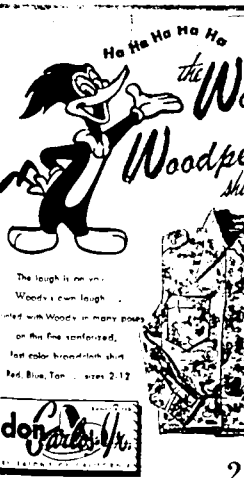
