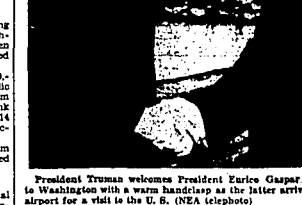

Uncle Sam Kind, but Firm, if GIs Slip Mortgage Payments

By DOUGLAS LARSEN

WASHINGTON (UPI)—It's not get tough for a veteran who has bought a home with a GI loan. Uncle Sam is liable to be an understanding but firm landlord.

This is apparent from the instruction that the veterans administration is now setting up for handling a veteran's debt to the government resulting from defaulted GI loans. And it can be seen in the great number of "cures" which the VA has already effected in loans which have threatened to go bad.

All a veteran has to do is prove to the VA that he's doing his best but can't quite meet a high monthly payment of that he was forced to give up his house due to circumstances beyond his control.

The VA can then make arrangements in most cases, to reduce the size of the payments by extending the loans over a longer period of time. In the case of foreclosure, it can cancel or reduce on any debt, which results from the government paying up its guarantee.

Approximately 1200,000 home loans have been made under the GI bill in the program more than \$1,000,000,000. So far, less than one-tenth of one percent of that amount has been needed to pay claims against loans and of the \$1,969 loans which have threatened to go bad, the VA has cured 42,887.

By extending the length of payments of other means either the veteran or the lender can appeal to VA for help in making different arrangements when payments become too burdensome or

When summer came and I applied for a visa to cover the sports in Berlin the application was held up for a long time.

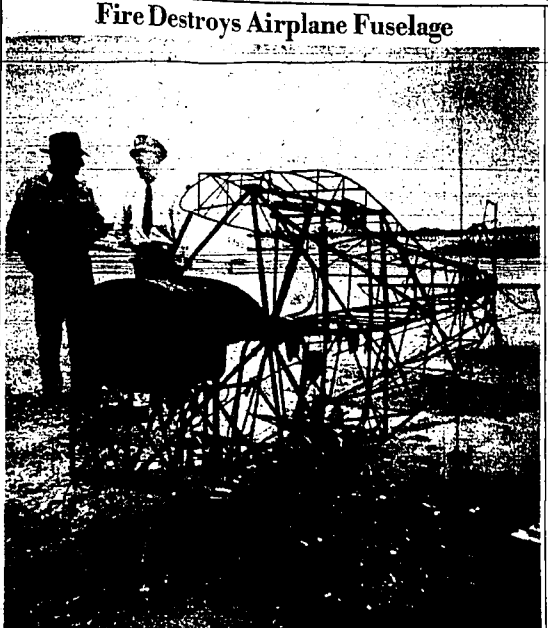

House Okays Insurance of Farm Crops

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—The House has given unanimous approval to passage of the federal crop insurance program.

It passed by voice vote and sent to the senate a bill expanding the present limited insurance program, and providing for broader experiments with multiple crop insurance.

Covers All Crops

This feature permits all the major crops on a farm to be insured under one policy, instead of following the old practice of requiring separate contracts for each major crop.

While the crop on a farm are considered separately for purposes of determining the premium rate, if the production from all of them combined falls short of the amount of insurance, the farmer collects. Large yields from one crop may be used to offset losses from another.

Extend Test Areas

The multiple insurance plan was tested experimentally in two counties during the 1948 crop year and was extended to five others this year. The new legislation would let it be tried in 50 counties.

Otherwise, the legislation follows generally the lines of the present experimental insurance program limited to selected crops in 30 counties.

At present, insurance is limited to 50 counties in the case of cotton, 20 for wheat, 40 for corn, 40 for flax and 30 for tobacco.

New Plan for Basin to Help Poor Projects

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—The reclamation bureau's new Columbia river program is designed to give "poorer" projects financial help when they need it from their richer neighbor projects.

Reclamation Commissioner Michael Stratus said most of the 14 projects in the Pacific northwest program are "primarily situate ones. But some are richer than others—the government is certain to get from them more money than they cost."

By establishing a "basin account"—instead of 14 project accounts—all the revenue from power will be available for all the projects.

This method of reclamation financing has been advocated earlier by Interior department and reclamation bureau spokesmen. They have maintained that reclamation projects should be kept on a basin-wide or regional basis to make more projects feasible.

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—A Polish protest regarding Germany was seen in some diplomatic quarters today as a possible Soviet strategy move in preparation for the big four meeting.

Poland's complaint yesterday about a reference in an official state department publication to the desperate conditions reportedly prevailing among an estimated 10,000,000 Germans uprooted from their homeland by the Soviet satellite government.

May be "feeler"

Informed diplomatic sources said the protest may have been a Moscow-dictated "feeler" to test whether the United States intends to bring up the issue at next week's big four meeting in Paris.

However, if Polish Ambassador Josef Wisliewski sought a prompt expression of U. S. views, he was disappointed. Reliable quarters said he was told his protest would be tacitly

Authoritative informants predicted the U. S. would reject the protest and tell Poland that this country is gravely concerned over the population shift.

The uprooted Germans were transferred from three eastern provinces of Hitler's Germany after the big four agreed at Potsdam in 1945 to place the provinces under Polish administration. Russia and Poland took the position that the shift was final.

The west contended that it could not be final until the German peace treaty was signed, and that mass transfers of population were designed to force the west to recognize Poland's claim to the area.

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—The navy's best jet fighter, the F4U Corsair, has intercepted and shot down a plane much faster than the air force's B-36 bomber in mock combat at 40,000 feet, it was learned today.

This unpublished performance was a major factor in the navy's decision to order the air force to test the B-36 against the Corsair.

U. S. Drafts Public Works Plans for Aid

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—A group of government officials are laying the groundwork for a public works program along the lines of the old PWA, it was learned today.

The program is designed for use if unemployment should reach a "danger point."

The leading proponent of the program is Maj.-Gen. Philip B. Fleming, assistant federal works administrator who recently was appointed head of the maritime commission. Despite opposition from other quarters, Fleming is reported to have won over President Truman's council of economic advisers on the proposed first step of his plan.

This would be to ask congress to re-act a provision of the 1944 war mobilization act, granting money to local governments to map out public works programs. The plans then would be laid out for use if unemployment should become critical.

Blueprint Projects

Nothing would be spent on actual construction at this time. The \$40,000,000 believed necessary to draw up plans would provide the blueprint for \$400,000,000 to \$500,000,000 worth of projects.

Fleming declined to speak for other government officials on what they consider "dangerous" unemployment. As far as he is concerned, he said, it would be about 3,000,000 jobs. April unemployment was 3,018,000, according to a census bureau estimate.

Planning thus far has been so elementary, it was said, that the budget bureau has not been consulted on how the program might be worked into government finances.

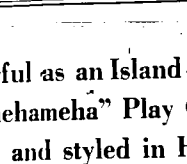

"Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr. is a Democrat and a great Democrat," House Majority Leader John W. McCormack said today in the United Press. "To say that we will welcome him is to use a mild word."

Chairman Francis E. Walter, Pa., of the Democratic caucus, said: "If he chooses to serve as a Democrat, then we certainly will welcome him."

Democratic Whip Percy Priest, Tenn., said: "It would be a great mistake if he had sealed up anything but a Democrat. Members of his family have always been Democrats."

Tots Disrupt Idaho Police Study Period

BOISE, May 19 (AP)—There is usually a quiet instead of an apple on the teacher's desk, but otherwise Boise's latest short-term school study, which opened a five-day class institution of learning.

It is the Idaho state police training school, which opened here Monday and winds up Saturday.

With the arrival of the first Monday school special duty in the northern Idaho flood area, 38 officers and patrolmen are attending the school.

The women attend classes eight hours a day, with highly-organized fields being taught by members of the federal bureau of investigation, the state police and other law enforcement agencies.

One of the school's classes nearly broke up a grade school picnic in a field course in handling hit-and-run driving cases was set up by Police Agent George P. Rhoades along one of the roads in the park. To lend reality to the course, a realistic female dummy in a cotton dress was placed alongside the road. Bits of headlight glass, a skid mark, and other clues were carefully planted by the officers prior to the class.

Children Not Needed

But the instructors did not count on the park being full of youngsters, at least and full of merriment as being let out of school.

When the first load of patrolmen rode up to the scene of the hit-and-run case, a group of youngsters dashed for the spot whooping and hollering that someone had been "run over."

The final load of law officers could get to the park, dozens of children were gaily romping about the carefully arranged area. A neatly-erected rope barrier finally kept them out.

Give "Punishment"

Leut. W. E. Dursteler, state highway patrol officer from Idaho Falls, was in charge of the group which made the investigation of the "crime." He was placed in charge because of "punishment" for being late to class.

Photographs of the scene were taken by the investigators. Evidence was carefully preserved in cellophane envelopes or pill boxes. The scene was thoroughly searched for clues. Then the "victim" was carried to a waiting patrol car and the class was dismissed.

The school's pupils will follow up the "crime" today by "recovering" the hit-and-run car and arresting the driver.

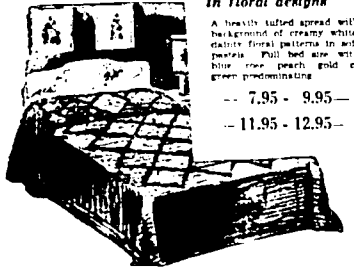

County Agent 'Weed Killer' Display Given

BURLEY, May 13—Ranchers and businessmen of Cassia and Blaine counties gathered at the County Fairgrounds last week to see a display and demonstration of weed-spraying and dusting equipment, under the sponsorship of local county agents.

Fourteen different types of spray machines were displayed by dealers and manufacturers in southern Blaine and northern Blaine. Spray machines of both high and low pressure types were displayed showing their adaptability to weed control work.

Experts speak. Owen K. Brown, agricultural engineer and county extension agent, University of Idaho, explained the mechanics of the machines in detail. He stressed the importance of proper spraying technique to consider in buying weed-spraying machines, stressing the point that the farmer should first determine his needs and then select the most satisfactory machine to fit those needs.

Whitman took up the problem of weed control work from the point of view of the grower, giving a thorough discussion of 2,4-D and some of the new developments in the use of 2,4-D for weed eradication. He also discussed important points to consider in buying spray machines.

After the meeting each individual equipment dealer demonstrated his machine for the benefit of the crowd, stressing the important features of each type of machine versus.

"Weed control work is a very important item to farmers in this area," Glenn L. Boddy, Cassia county extension agent, said. "More and more we are becoming aware that in order to successfully control these weeds we must turn towards owners of individual equipment for the removal of weeds on the farm."

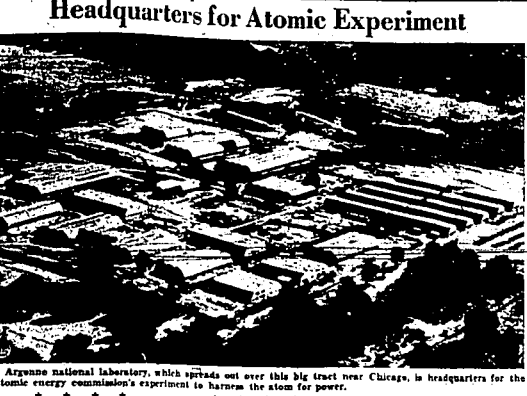

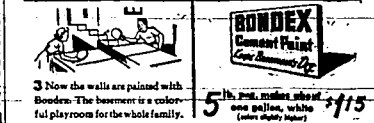

'Weed Spray' Tour Taken; Kill Checked

WENDELL, May 19—A demonstration of weed control measures was held recently by D. L. Huey, county weed supervisor. A tour was made of fields treated last year and equipment was shown at Wendell. Use of chlorate and carbon bisulfide was demonstrated on the Owen farm just south of here.

Chlorate was applied at the rate of eight pounds per square rod. Carbon disulfide was applied at the rate of two and one-half pounds every 18 inches. Huey cautioned farmers "weed" materials are soil sterilants and should be used with care.

On the same farm, 2,4-D was sprayed on a grain field to control morning glory and annual weeds. This was applied at the rate of 10 gallons of solution per acre which gave one and one-half pounds of actual 2,4-D per acre.

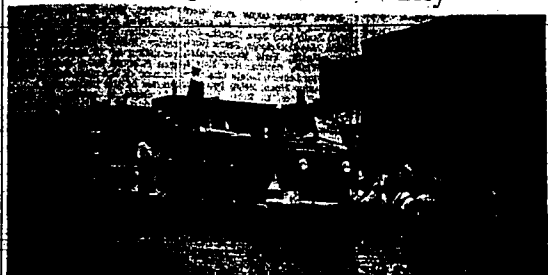

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Fertility Seen For Protection Of Spud Crop

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, May 19—Keeping their potato ground at a high state of fertility seems to be the best defense against the disease growers now have against the growers they know as "early blight" or reductions of 10 to 30 cents. It cannot have been reported from this disease.

"Early blight" disease, which has been identified as a "vertical wilt," are contained in the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station. It is recommended that reports on investigations on this disease the past three years at the Aberdeen branch station.

Partial Control
While keeping soil at a highly fertile level will reduce yield losses from early dying it will not completely control the disease," reports Dr. J. H. Kraus, head of the department of horticulture and coordinator of potato research, "but high fertility can be secured by rotations using alfalfa or clover, heavy applications of barnyard manure or commercial nitrogen fertilizers."

Other points on the disease brought out by L. W. Nelson, associate horticulturist who conducted the studies, are:

- Time of appearance and severity of the disease, are dependent upon early summer temperature.
- Persistent disease
- Under Idaho conditions the infection has survived several years in soils cropped with barley and alfalfa.
- Resistant or tolerant selections of the Russett Burbank variety of potato appear to be too late for growing conditions in Idaho.
- Eastern Idaho and have proven unsatisfactory in yield test when grown on infested or even on salinely clean soils.
- "Ultimate control of this disease is in the development of a resistant Russett variety," Dr. Kraus explains. "The university's new potato breeders and Mr. Don Bradley, county superintendent, will present the diploma."
