Tests on New Well Disclose High Measure

By CARLITA STEVENS
TWIN FALLS, May 21.—A 72-hour test was run this week on a well drilled on the Minidoka northside extension project north of Rupert by the bureau of reclamation, with the water measuring through the well at 500 inches, an unusually high measurement for the test wells in the area.

The new well is one of three in the area, according to A. J. Schooner, Boise, whose team contracted to dig the wells. Another well is about five miles east of the heavy-flowing well or just about north of Minidoka. The second well is located five miles to the west. Tests have not been run on the other two wells.

Double-Diesel Pump
Water is pumped from the well by a 200-horsepower double-diesel motor and pump which uses about 18 gallons of fuel per hour during the test period. The pump has been pumping 3,000 gallons per minute into a 12-inch pipe. The water then flows into a 16-inch culvert which cuts down the pressure before the water passes into the lateral and over the measuring well.

It took the well-drillers two weeks to bring in the water, drilling 360 feet deep. The water is pulled up 150 feet, the remainder of the distance coming through gravity flow. The water hasn't lowered any during the test, Schooner said. The drilling hit rock at 30 feet down, and part of the well has a 20-inch steel casing.

300 Acres Prepared
Around the well area, 300 acres have been roughed out to come under this plan for irrigation. At present the water being pumped flows into lateral and collector lines which run down in preparation for watering the area brushed and being prepared for cultivation.

The first test run on the initial experimental well on the northside project was made in April, 1943. The well underwent the usual 72-hour test, pumping 2,000 gallons a minute, or more than 400 second feet of water. The delivery of three second feet of water per well is said sufficient for irrigation purposes by reclamation officials.

May Drill More
The plan of the bureau is, if the first three wells drilled last year proved satisfactory, called for the drilling of six more wells this year in preparation for partial reclamation of 30,000 acres on the Minidoka project.

The new land brought under the wells for irrigation last year, produced 100 tons of potatoes. The other two wells will undergo 72-hour tests before being lined up for irrigation.

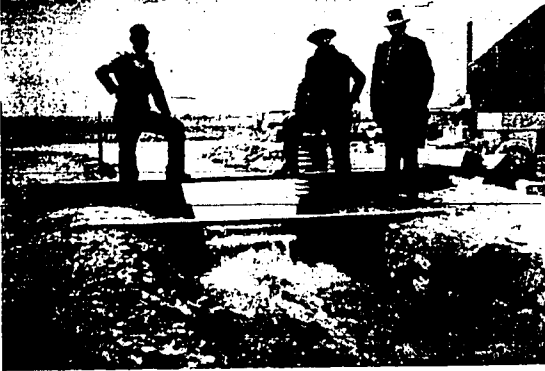
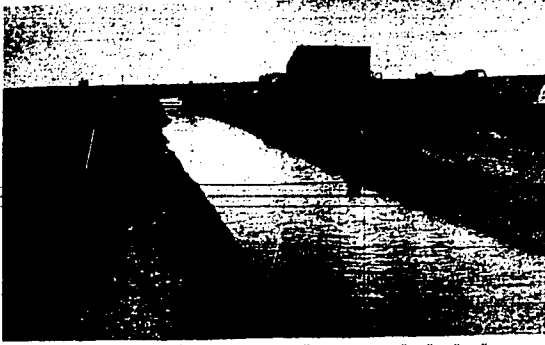

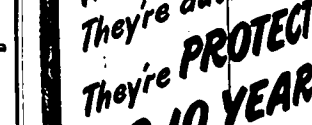

Mack concluded "This program of supplying dollars to help these countries, I think should develop a feeling of reciprocity under which the countries could do all things possible to see that their states and industry benefited from their purchases."

"This question becomes of increasing importance as we approach the time when we will be asked to furnish the money to build the defenses for western European countries."

"If doubt if American industry should be asked to continue to bear its portion of taxes for these programs. If participating countries pursue policies detrimental to the best interests of our industries."

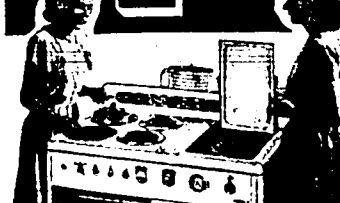

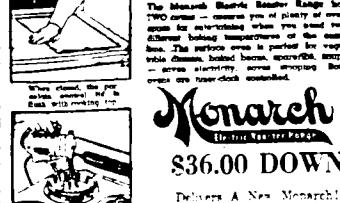

Farmers Told To Seek Help With Derrick

The careless moving of hay derricks beneath or near electric lines resulted in three needless accidents in the Snake river valley last year, Ralph W. Carpenter, division manager of Idaho Power company, reports. Two of these occurred because the boom was not leveled preparatory to moving the derrick.

"Fortunately, last year's hay derrick accidents resulted in no fatalities, injuries and the number of hay derricks coming into contact with high-voltage wires decreased over the previous year, when there were five," Carpenter said.

Each growing season, the company stresses the safe moving of hay derricks near or beneath electric lines, and it is believed this type of accident will be eliminated entirely, he said.

"The farmer moving a derrick should take the time to make sure the derrick is level enough to go under power lines with plenty of room for clearance.

"A poor guess is apt to cause an accident," he stressed. "As the derrick is being moved beneath or near the lines, chains, cables or other metal parts should not be touched. The boom should be level and lowered on both ends. It should not be permitted to swing.

Don't Touch Wires

"No one should attempt to raise or move electric wires other than employees of Idaho Power who are trained to handle electric wires safely.

"If there is any doubt in the farmer's mind about the safe moving of the hay derrick near or beneath electric lines, he should call on the nearest Idaho Power company office for assistance. Help will be given as promptly as possible and without cost," he said. The company, however, will appreciate a hours notice of the proposed move.

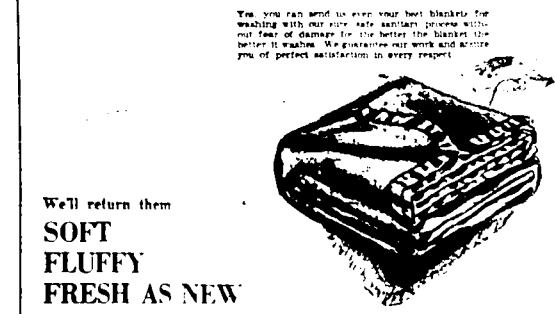

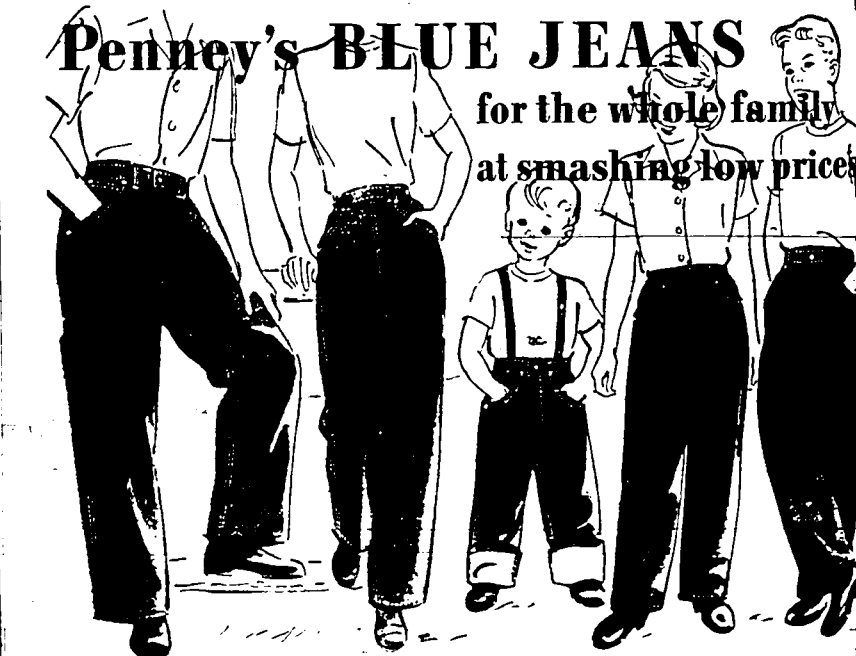

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

By HUGHETTE WINGGAR

It is a rare individual who does not feel a tinge of nostalgia as graduation time rolls around again. Perhaps it's just that spring is always full of memories. The years seem to pass so rapidly after that great day and we always feel the things "have changed too much. They really haven't when it comes to graduation. The same customs prevail. There is still the exchange of pictures and the same grunting and grinning of the big friends and teachers. It is a complete and prized history of the big events of one's high school career. Even the graduate feels a touch of sadness at the parting from the old familiar scene.

Perhaps it would not be amiss to recall some of the "good old days" of Buhl's school history. According to an old newspaper article written by Mrs. B. W. Allred, the first school opened in the fall of 1866 in a small shack and in one room of the E. A. Miller residence. Wm. Fred Erasm taught the primary grades. There was no organized district at that time the teachers were paid by weekly subscription. Early in 1867 Buhl district No. 1 was organized with H. H. Babson, K. W. Miller and T. H. Marshall as directors.

The school was then moved to a two-room building on Broadway. During the summer the board of directors added one new room to this building and school opened the last week of September with three teachers and 120 pupils. Wyatt was superintendent and taught the seventh, eighth and ninth grades. Samuel Farver taught the lowest grades.

It was at this time the ground was being cleared for what is now the great farming area, and there was a constant odor of burning sagebrush permeating the classrooms. Because of the crowded conditions, Wyatt moved his classes to a building on Main street.

A fierce animosity existed between the people of Wyatt's school and those in the other building. "Deadlines" was established and the children were not allowed to cross Broadway except to go home. Hitting white presented to the teachers by the directors were supposed to enforce this rule.

To quote Mrs. Allred, "a word here about the playground. It was surely not a thing of beauty nor yet a joy forever. There were no slides, horizontal or parallel bars, trapeze or basketball.

The grade children's chief amusements were playing on the hay racks and other farm implements belonging to the Meigs and Hays company and listening to the music of the phonographs in the Idle Hour and Horse Show saloons, while the high school boys and girls were the most exciting backing contest.
