



BURLY, May 23—Numerous "thank you" letters have been received this spring by the Inter-city branch of the American Association of University Women for five boxes of clothing, shoes, food, soap, and other articles they sent last winter to university students and other needy persons in Salzburg, Austria.

The packages were received and distributed by Mrs. John Rasmussen, the former Hazel Ormsby of Twin Falls, whose husband is a colonel in the army. Mrs. Rasmussen is engaged in welfare work, especially among stateless people, or displaced persons, and much of her help has gone to students attending universities in Austria.

Living conditions have improved a great deal in the past year through United States aid to local industries, which is giving employment to many people and putting many more things on the market. Mrs. Rasmussen wrote: "Since Austrians give employment first to people of their own nationality, the displaced persons still find it very difficult to earn enough to live on, and their problem will continue for some time until they can gradually be absorbed into the population of numerous countries throughout the world," she continued.

Mrs. Rasmussen enclosed a "thank you" letter from Hubert Steppan, a student of piano and organ at Mozarteum Academy of Music, Out of the clothing box, she received a suit, bedroom slipper, and shoes to replace a pair of worn-out high shoes which belonged to his grandfather. An overcoat given him was in turn given to a friend who had only a rain coat.

Walter Kroiss, 17, is attending technical school in Salzburg and hoping to support his mother and younger sisters. His gift from the clothing box is a coat. His father died three years ago, and his home, after completing school, is to come to America.

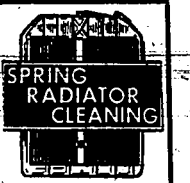

She told in detail of the horrors experienced by herself and others at the end of the war, and at one time she was hidden along with other girls in an old chimney for 14 days and nights to keep from falling into the hands of the Polish troops. Only when they reached the American zone were they considered safe, although their only possessions were the clothing they wore.

In closing she wrote that she had become wonderfully strengthened by the help you gave me knowing there are still people who want to help in an unselfish way. How I wish all mankind would take such examples and find peace in mutual understanding and helpfulness.

Friends of the Rasmussens say that they plan to return to United States in June, and will visit their son who is attending Stanford.

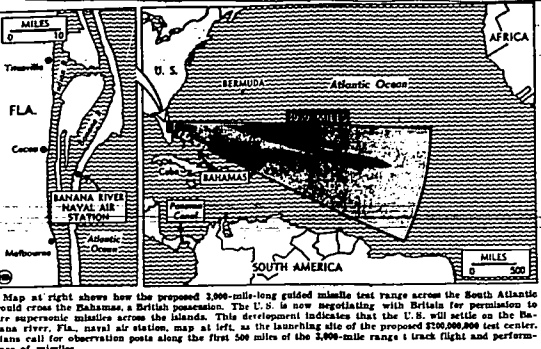

### Science Digs in Baskets of Earth for Long-Sought Cure for Virus Diseases

(Editor's note: This is the second of two articles on the discovery of a new virus which may carry out the end of the long search for a cure for virus diseases that will fight disease.)

PEARL RIVER, N. Y. (NEA)—Out of the soil in your lawn or garden, your field or pasture, might come the long-sought cure for a small pox, for measles, for the ridiculous but miserable and expensive common cold.

These are known by that type of germs called as viruses. They do not respond to the "wonder drugs," penicillin, streptomycin or aureomycin, which do so much with the two other types of infectious diseases spread by bacteria and rickettsias.

But mold from the soil produced the drugs that brought under control a score of other germs. National laboratory is combing the country for soil that may contain a mold that will prove the mortal enemy of the virus diseases.

The mycologist (fungus researcher) at Lederle laboratories in Pearl River, directed by Dr. Benjamin H. Duggar, have studied available soil samples from all over this country and to some extent from abroad. Duggar knows that certain types of mold appear in certain types of soil. Earth is gathered from far and wide that might contain the molds that will produce a new wonder drug.

The mycologist submit samples to the scrutiny of the highly trained eyes and brain of Dr. Duggar. Working under the guidance of these

specialist, "mold-hunters" are many lesser, but still important, individuals who carry out the endless tests, preceding discovery.

Some years of laboratory experience and a deep understanding of microbiology are the basic foundation for the type of ability possessed by Dr. Duggar. His discerning eye for the unusual in the behavior of molds was the essential ingredient in discovering aureomycin.

Once the discovery was made, the huge Lederle research facilities moved into action to investigate further applications of the drug and to perfect production techniques.

Aided by the institution developed from years of search, Dr. Duggar has collected innumerable specimens of soil from selected spots in the United States, as well as foreign countries. These soils have come from the most hospitable places, fields and pastures, lawns and gardens, but their selection is not at random. Complex chemical reasons, climatic conditions and other factors are considered in the selection.

Dr. Duggar discovered aureomycin, which does most of the things done by the other antibiotics and exerts several new actions of its own from the mold spore named streptomycin aureofaciens. With aureomycin now in full production, Dr. Duggar now is seeking new molds that will produce new drugs that will prove aureomycin will not do.

How far he has gone is of course, not for publication as yet, but he is willing to admit that he is working

with many hundreds of cultures that interest him enough for further study.

A small number of these are promising enough so that larger quantities are being made. Some are being made in quantities sufficient to try on living tissue.

Out of any one of these—or, for that matter, out of more than one of them—might come new antibiotics that would be as remarkable as penicillin and streptomycin," said Dr. Duggar.

The methods by which this soil is studied illustrate the way in which, in the hands of skilled scientists, such useful drugs are developed.

From each sample of earth, Dr. Duggar makes a culture of the spores it contains. Meanwhile he grows the germs against which he hopes the mold will prove effective.

On a plate he places individual spores of the mold he is testing. After the mold has a head start in growth, he spreads the germ culture on the plate. If areas develop around the mold spores in which the germ culture fails to grow, he makes further tests until he has a mold that is "antagonistic" to a given germ or a series of germs.

When such experiments indicated that he was on the trail of a valuable new drug, the research and production team at Lederle made aureomycin in larger quantities. It was given to animals with various types of infections to see if the drug had the same effect as living mold as it had against the germs in the test tube. It was also given to patients to see if it would be effective in a given infection to see whether the drug could prevent as well as cure.

### Doctors Have New Basis of Guessing Sex

SAN DIEGO, May 22 (AP)—A new, nearly fool-proof method of determining the sex of unborn babies has been developed by a group of local doctors, the San Diego Journal says today in a copyrighted article.

Physician at the Linda Vista medical center, who have been experimenting with the method for about six months, it has proven correct in 98.6 per cent of the cases.

The doctors, Winton B. Oster, Merrill H. Thayer, Richard G. Brown and G. M. Clarke, said however, that they are still improving their system and do not claim perfect results.

The Linda Vista developed system uses as its base the "Bayesian poison test" for cancer, which uses a smear and a stain, Clarke said.

While working with his test, he said, it was noticed that the test also revealed presence of estrogen or progesterone, which is produced by the ovary.

By making numerous tests, Clarke said it was found that by determining the amount of these substances, it was possible to tell whether a woman was carrying a male or female fetus.

Clarke said the doctors at the health center should not take credit for the development. He said most of the work and research was done by George Robert Talbot, a 32-year-old laboratory technician.

"By coincidence," Clarke said, "the blood shows blue-colored cells if the baby will be a boy and pink-stained cells if a girl is to be expected."

Full details had been made available to physicians in the San Diego area, Clarke said. He added that a complete paper on the tests has been completed and forwarded to the American Medical Association for study or publication.

George Chaplin, managing editor of the Journal, said his paper had learned of the tests two months ago, but had withheld publication until it was confirmed.

He said the paper had called in Merrill H. Thayer, medical writer, who re-wrote the story. He in turn completed an article which will appear in the June issue of a national magazine, Chaplin said.

### Scouting Lauded In Truman Talk

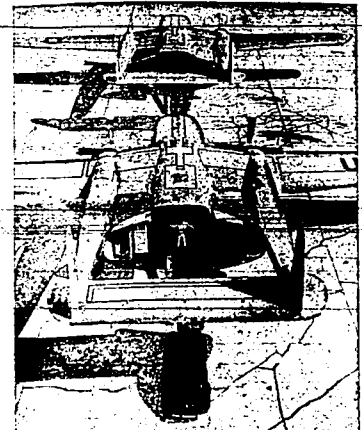
BOSTON, May 20 (AP)—President Truman said today "Scouting has earned a special place in the hearts of the American people."
