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THE SCHOOL BOND ELECTION

We can understand why taxpayers are inclined to be cold-hearted when it comes to bond issues for public improvements which are not an absolute necessity. We know what they are, it is difficult for some property owners to see the advantages which are advanced under the general heading of "progress."

But when it comes to such fundamental things as water works, sewer systems, hospital buildings, we all know we have a responsibility to fulfill. These things are the very backbone of any community and unless they are kept commensurate with a community's needs, that community is going to suffer.

We can understand what the Burley Herald meant in the lead editorial in its last week's issue, under the heading "Small Vote is a Disgrace." It described the fact that only 1,000 people voted on the school bond issue as "a disgrace to Cassia county."

It is a disgrace, that community is going to suffer.

This Friday we are having a school bond election of our own, seeking approval of a \$1,000,000 expenditure for new facilities which are seriously needed.

So seriously needed, in fact, that the proposal has stemmed largely from the efforts of a citizens' committee which has become interested and concerned about conditions in our town.

Not only has this committee gone to all the length of doing a great amount of research on its own, but it has enlisted the help of an outside consultant well qualified to analyze school problems and to recommend a solution.

The committee is submitting all these facts for the guidance of the voters in a conscientious appeal for this community to meet a serious challenge. Everything has been prepared in a fair and honest way, presented fairly and honestly without exaggeration and to the need, to our way of thinking, has been definitely established.

All that remains is for the taxpayers voters of this school district to make a wise decision. By their vote they are asked to certify a certain percentage of these voters will be opposed to the bond issue. That means that the two-thirds majority vote necessary to carry the election will require the help of every last individual voter interested in seeing our schools—above everything else—keep pace with our normal progress.

Don't let it be said after the school bond election Friday, as it was said in Burley, that the issue failed because the people didn't get out to vote.

The problem with which our schools are confronted is far too serious for any such lack of interest on our part.

EUROPEAN MILITARY AID

Western Europe's present state is an fearful one. It is a state of military aggression. It adds that not until the United States shares its might with western countries "can we hope to replace this temptation with a real deterrent to war."

The department views a military aid program as the best way we can transfer some of our strength across 3,000 miles of ocean to European shores. It calls this plan a vital companion to the North Atlantic pact. The pact signifies agreement in the past on the part of the United States and the aid program gives the pact some backbone.

The question may fairly be asked: How much backbone? We propose to provide \$1,100,000,000, a considerable amount of surplus arms and certain technical assistance to western Europe in the next year.

The first goal is to help these nations modernize the small armed forces contemplated in their 1936 budgets. There is no pretense of making Russia's huge armies. But the state departments' insistent even small force can plant fear in Soviet mind and thus deter aggression.

The administration is plainly resistant to discuss the details and future steps of military aid plan. It does not believe that larger armies in western Europe would increase rather than diminish the chance of war. And it believes too much attention to arms supply means general European recovery will suffer.

There are ample signs many members of the senate are going to pin the state department to the mat on these questions. Several say they want to know exactly how much we have—and what kind—\$1,100,000,000.

Senator Taft has no doubts that such a large military aid plan would dry up surplus war material. He puts a \$300,000,000 cap on the surplus military aid program as the best way to get the surplus war material. He says that the surplus war material appropriation should be reduced to the real hope of coming back is only to reduce western armies against possible Russian waterspouts by Russia.

Copper's Use Is Lowest in Past 9 Years

NEW YORK, May 25 (AP)—Copper consumption during April by brass mills, wire mills and foundries dropped to the lowest level in nine years, trade statistics reveal.

Actual shipments last month of copper products and copper alloys contained 53,454 tons of refined copper, the lowest monthly total since June, 1940, when shipments contained 41,716 tons. Refined copper used in March of this year totaled 52,824 tons.

New business booked by manufacturers of copper products in April also dropped sharply. Business booked last month required 57,867 tons of copper against 51,223 tons

in March, a decrease of 22,936 tons. Unfilled orders as of April 30 at 215,971 tons showed a drop of 28,667 tons from the 244,638 tons booked in March. Since new copper receipts in April of 73,797 tons exceeded shipments of the metal held by manufacturing plants rose 8,863 tons to 292,254 tons.

In the metal market picture, an additional reduction of 4 cents a pound for scrap copper has cut sales, the rise of 1 1/2 cents a pound made a week ago.

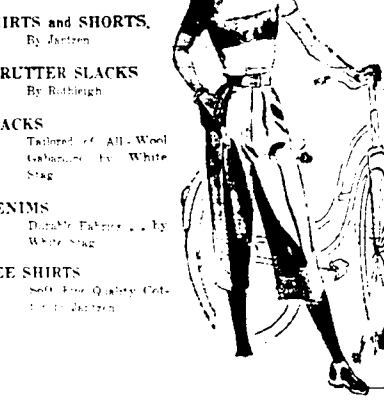

Parole Camps Opened to Aid State Convicts

BOISE, May 23 (AP)—Indiana inspectors and 10 boys from Idaho are expected to benefit from a series of parole camps, the first of which is in operation.

Officials said the inmates will be given a rehabilitation period before release on parole. The camps are being opened at the time their parole benefits from the improvement work done on the lands by the reclamation.

"Transition" Necessary

Warden L. E. Clapp said a transition period is necessary for parolees between the time they are released from the state prison and when they return to society. The parole camps provide this transition.

Edward Wozley, state land commissioner, said the men will improve the state park in north Idaho, the Bogus basin area near Boise, or parts of the Snake and Sagle land in the island park district near Idaho Falls.

The first group of 10 men is now at Heburn state park where they are living in former civilian quarters. The first group, from the state prison, is expected to arrive in Idaho Falls, state director of probation and parole.

To Shift Location

The Heburn park camp will operate for about 30 days before the parolees move to Boise, from there they go to Arco and then to island park. They may return to Heburn park later for additional improvement work.

Falls said hundreds of state prisoners are cooperating in getting the camp started at Heburn park. By a cooperative effort, the men are repairing food, bedding and supplies to get the CCC buildings.

The first group, Falls said, are mostly young men. The oldest is 43. They are all first offenders.

Fire Puts End To University Chimes Tower

SEATTLE, May 23 (AP)—A fire that started in the chimes tower of the University of Washington, today destroyed the historic building. The tower, which would have run out the 6 a. m. chime bells, as they have through countless college generations.

The ancient wooden tower burned to a mass of twisted iron and twisted steel, and the chimes fell to the ground.

Crews fled in night clothing from Alpha Xi Delta sorority house, a block away, as they snuffed flames on its roof.

A few hours later engineers and firemen circled the tower's black skeleton with a cable and pulled down the charred structure. The tower, which weighed 15,000 pounds, had remained aloft on weakened timbers.

The chimes plummeted into the rubble at the tower base.

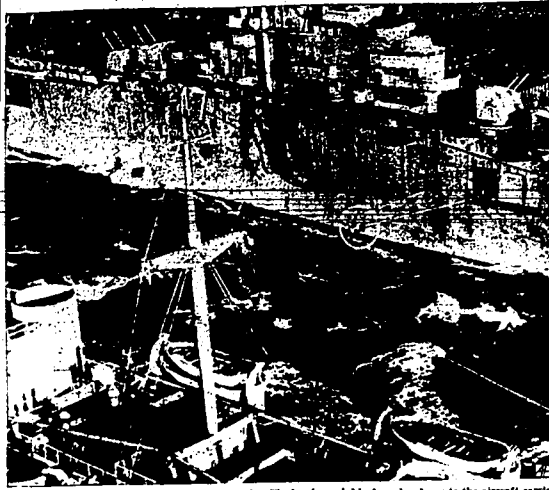
They already had sounded their morning aloft. Dean of Men Herbert T. Condon, long-time university official, had been in the tower as cold water from the fire hoses cut through the flames to his throat.

The cause of the fire remained a mystery.

The chimes were presented to the university in 1911 by the late Col. Alden J. Bletcham, then publisher of the Seattle Times.

As George Bailey, blind chimes player, heard the music playing up on the dying fire, he was heard to say: "It's sort of like part of me is lost too. Monday will be the 32nd anniversary of the fire which destroyed the tower by which the bells tolled."

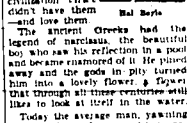
