### 3,280 Given AEC Work Before Check by FBI, Senator Asserts

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—Capital hill's atomic investigation today brought stories (1) that 3,280 persons got access to secret data or work without full loyalty investigations, and (2) a guard in the missing uranium case had a police record.

Senator Hickenlooper, R., la., fierce critic of the atomic energy commission, produced the figures on the number of persons cleared to atomic secrets without a full FBI check first on their loyalty. ACE Chairman David Lilienthal did not dispute the figures, but argued vigorously that the AEC was justified in granting these "emergency clearances."

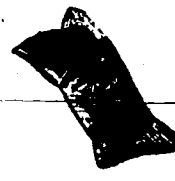

### Teacher Wins Argument on Pension Plan

ATLANTA, June 2 (AP)—While Meinhold Bonar was back her \$65.78 from the state of Georgia Wednesday after a 53-hour sidewalk strike with little food or sleep in a barnlike state office building.

"I won," said the matronly 34-year-old Columbia doctor of philosophy as she clattered her check and walked out sedately. She had to quit her job as a teacher to collect it.

Director J. L. Vaden of the Georgia teacher retirement system also counted with a sigh, "I won."

"I followed the law," he insisted. Dr. Bonar entered his office Monday morning and demanded a refund of her contributions to the teacher retirement system. She had been teaching since economics this year in Oremville, Ga.

"Well, I've got cancer. I need the money for treatment—and cancer won't wait," she said.

The state declined the refund on her terms. The Bonar sued in a state circuit court for the retirement system office and won. "I'm going to sit here until I get my money."

After three days and two nights of haggled negotiations with the determined woman, the crisis was solved.

The state finally agreed along that it couldn't legally refund the money until Dr. Bonar received a teaching job. So she agreed today—under protest, she said—to wait her resignation to her superintendency in Wheeler county.

Dr. Bonar left promptly for the Mayo clinic in Rochester, Minn., for her cancer treatment.

She received \$19,200 a month as a teaching job year.

### Area Scenery Comes to Life Under Brush of Buhl Woman

BUHL, June 2—Native scenery literally springs to life under the brush of Mrs. Eva Coad Buhl, artist painter in earnest at the age of 18. Her formal instruction has under private tutelage at the University of Oregon in Portland and the New York School of Art.

Mrs. Coad has not exhibited to any extent in formal shows but her paintings are well known. Most of her work has been done for self-entertainment.

She held one exhibition in Jackson Hole, Wyo., a few of her works have been on display at the Twin Falls County fair where they were awarded first prizes, and recently at the Buhl Women's Civic Club art show.

One of the most unusual paintings is of Mount Moran in the Jackson Hole country. This canvas Mrs. Coad calls "Harshly Blue," an apt name.

"One day," she related, "as I was looking out over the landscape, the entire horizon suddenly shifted with the most unexpected display of blue colors and I decided to try to put it on canvas."

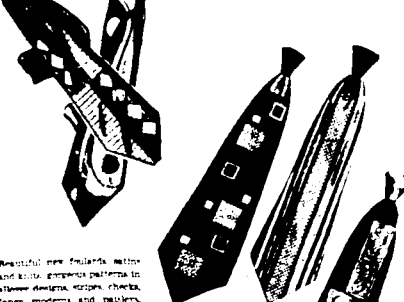

**Break out, too, they said privately.** During the war government controls were relaxed and many smaller unions so expect they could get the "best" new pay awards won by the larger unions.

This tendency for the smaller unions to demand, and get, the "pattern" awards has continued to some extent after the war. Most unions got the 15-cent raise the big unions negotiated in 1946. The best year for the pattern was about 15 cents, and in 1948 about 15 cents.

Now, the experts say, collective bargaining results depend more and more on an employer's ability to pay, or his own economic situation. Go the variation among unions is not all so well with some unions signing all the time. But this may be high, that the average may be closer to 6 cents.

The unions show a great many fourth round settlements without any pay boost at all. Outliers show unions settling for less or other insurance plans, or improvements to existing plans, or extra holidays.

**Hopes for Peace Better Than Ever Truman Believes**

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—President Truman thinks the chances for peace are "considerably better than ever."

He confided as much in a conversation Wednesday with a group of war correspondents who covered the original D-Day landings June 6, 1944.

They were part of a group which will leave from New York to take part in the American overseas trip "beachhead revisited," a tour of World War II battle routes commemorating the fifth anniversary of the Normandy invasion.

The President said the chances for world peace are better now than they have been in three years.

He told the correspondents he wished he could have been with them on D-day.

He added to be "he said, but General Marshall said it was too damned close."

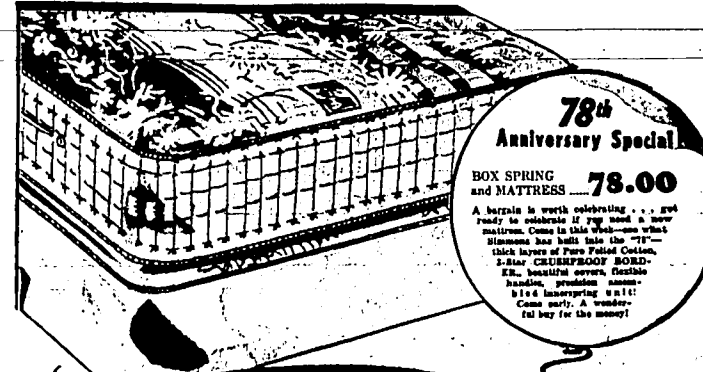

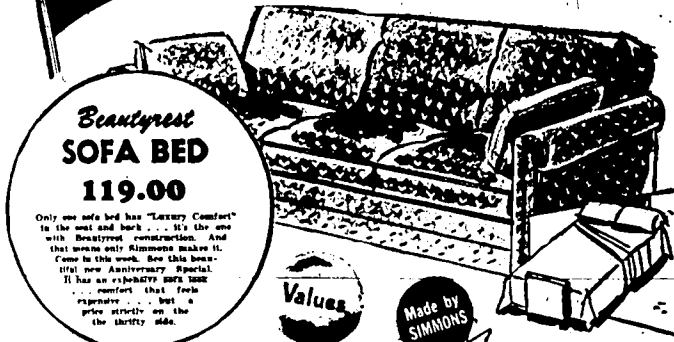

Physicians in the audience said the color-television screens provided a better view of the operation than students received in the delivery room itself. Dr. J. S. Ravdin explained that it gave a sense of depth vital in teaching surgery and which was present in slides and white television reception. 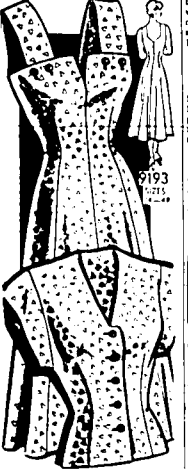

### Special Work Is Described To Rotarians

BURLY, June 7—The Rev. Don J. Smith, Methodist minister here who is leaving soon to assume the pastorate at Salmon, was the speaker at the Burling Rotary club meeting Tuesday noon, talking on community service.

The Rev. Mr. Smith, who recently attended a seminar in Washington, D. C., as representative of churches of south Idaho, reported on the meetings he attended. He said that the purpose of the seminar was to gain first hand information as to world affairs and to report directly to the people just what is going on in the rest of the world.

They heard the economic situation discussed by experts, and the general feeling was that people should be anxious to get out of the depression, but avoid panics themselves should one come at the meeting and guests were Tom Prosser, Futuam, Conn., and John Clark, Max Strong had charge of the program.
