JEROME, June 4—If you were offered the eye of a roasted lamb in Saudi Arabia, would you accept it?—or try politely to refuse it as did Nadine Dougherty last night.

Mrs. Dougherty recently returned here from three years in Saudi Arabia, where she has been employed as secretary in the Arab industrial development department of the Arabian-American Oil Company, which is owned by four American companies and called Aramco.

"If you are the honored guest, as I was—though I didn't know it at the time—of a Saudi Arabian, you are to eat the eye of the lamb. To refuse it is to insult the host and to put it mildly, it is an insult to your host and I was never invited to this particular home again."

"I was told to continue the meal by pulling off large pieces of the roast and eating them. I did so, and the host was very pleased. The coffee ladies who differ from our American brands is a little different."

"The explanation that when the host is invited to a meal, he is to eat the eye of the lamb. It is immediately after the dining room and partake of what remains on the cloth. This is the eye of the lamb, it is consumed to the last crumb."

Jerome is an American community established by Aramco and is populated by some 2,000 people. Children of the families employed by the company may attend Aramco schools, which are staffed with American teachers.

Leaving Arabia, Dougherty went by air to Kuwait, which is ruled by a king and is the most northern part of the Persian Gulf. She stayed there for two days as a guest of Abdulrahman bin Abdulaziz, who now covers a city block and was staffed by 60 servants. Estates such as this are common in the area. She took a plane from Kuwait to Baghdad, Iraq.

Kuwait is populated entirely by Muslims and is rich with oil. Leaving there she took a cargo plane from Beirut, Lebanon, and was 22 days reaching New York. The ship stopped at many Mediterranean ports: Alexandria, Piræus, Athens, Naples, London and Marseilles. Arriving in New York the first night she returned, but by plane, which will take her only 27 hours and she must be back on the job in July 27. 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Life in MAGIC VALLEY

The first day of June brought a boost in the tempo of leading marriages here in the Magic Valley. In the city of Twin Falls, Idaho, and in the county of Blaine, both of which have decided that "two can live as cheap as one" and were licensed to wed on June 1. On June 2, Howard B. Zimmerman and Rebecca Klode of Salt Lake City, had the same idea.

All of which reminds us of a wedding which appeared in the Dec. 30, 1920, issue of the Burley Bulletin. Rating front page, spot one, were the pictures of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Hayra, with this caption underneath: "They will be at home to their friends in the city of Twin Falls after Jan. 15, 1921." And here was the story:

"The residence of Mr. John Hayra, of Rock Creek, was the scene last Christmas day of a wedding of more than usual interest to the public on account of the large circle of warm personal friends of the bride and groom. Miss Anna Hansen and John E. Hayra, 21, is a pretty girl who writes a list of people to state that no other young people in Cassia county have a greater number of friends than they. Anna and John, Mrs. Steinmetz, Twin Falls officiated.

"The bride is a native of Cassia county. She received her education in the public school of Albion and in the State Normal school at that town. Her talents seem to be unlimited. She always led in whatever line she was studying. In addition to the regular course in mathematics, she completed trigonometry and surveying.

"Miss Hayra—as she is familiarly called by her friends, is a native of Missouri, but took an education at the University of Missouri. She is a woman of sterling character, a man who knows what it is to bump up against the world and take hard knocks with a smiling face. She was the engineer in charge of the survey of the city of Burley and is at present engaged in the survey of the new town of Buhl. Her bright prospects and the ability to grasp and use them to advantage are secrets of success and the many friends of this couple feel they possess both elements to a remarkable degree.

"The wedding write-up closed with a three-verse love poem, starting: "Ah, maiden and youth, you are happy today."

In the book of "Marriages" of Owyhee County, Idaho territory, there are recorded the early marriages of the land which later became Cassia county. Jesse Mary and Mary McCall were united in marriage March 11, 1874, by William W. Stewart, justice of the peace of Owyhee county, with their united consent in the presence of William Bennett and S. H. Gray.

Hardy Bears and Mary A. Heggen, both of Marsh Basin, Blaine county, Idaho territory, were married Sept. 8, 1878, by George Chapin, justice of the peace. W. C. and Jessie Thomas and Sarah Land, of Goose Creek (later Oakley), were married Oct. 24, 1878, by C. M. Gray, justice of the peace.

Speaking of Miller, we are reminded of the John Whites, who live in a two-story log house on a small hill overlooking the Miller townsite, Snake river and Miller dam. For years the Whites had a general store there and Mrs. Whites was postmistress. Communications for neighbors often came through the store, and John White went out in all sorts of weather, day or night, to deliver messages—some happy and some tragic. The Whites earned the title of "good neighbor."

Neighbors remind us of the time when Letha Webb Teater, who writes the news from up Cooding way, is a just-across-the-street neighbor of Mrs. Ethel Winnett, Heyburn; Mrs. Blanche Barstler, Rupert; Mrs. Marie Forswall, Hansen; Harry Sager, Burley; Mrs. Faye Aramo, Arimo; and Art Sager, Roy, who are 23 grandchildren and several great-grandchildren.

Leaving this week for national guard camp is Capt. Norman Smith and all the Burley lads. A lot of Magic Valley boys remember another leave-taking back in the fall of 1940, and the "year of service" stretched into five and six years. Some of the lads never came home.

Training in the national guard is serious business, and the lads who are in a circle to work it out that way. The fellows

Old times remember Tom Edwards, from up Almo-Elba way who earned the title of "riding fool" because his eye never beheld an animal he feared to ride. "Tom loved to ride in horse races and try horse each other across the lava" with games like "steal the sticks."

Another large tree was moved to Elmer camp at Albion and a third tree now lives in the Declo church yard. At Christmas time, the "Memorial tree" is bright with lights and the rest of the year it's a living memorial.

A letter came recently from Elmer E. Bauer, Pittsburgh, Pa. who was cashier at the Miller bank from 1909 to 1912, and Mr. Bauer expressed interest in the old town. Bauer corresponds with a number of people who lived in Miller during her "boom days," including Mrs. John Ingram, Palo Alto, Calif., who was secretary to Dave McWaters, general manager of all the Rubin interests; and Grace M. Reisman, who was a secretary at that time, and now lives in Pittsburgh.

A lot of the boys have gone on," Bauer writes, "among them Bob Edie, who later was chief clerk at Pocatello, and died at Paramaribo, B. A., at the Aluminum Company mine; Elmer, who was chief clerk of all the land companies at Miller; Hope Patmany, whose later address was Oil City, Pa., and my brother, Charles A. Bauer, who was manager of the Idaho Bank and Trust company at Burley.

Miller, as a town, is gone, even to the bank building in which Bauer worked—but the bank vault is still there, having defied even dynamite.
