

Action Starts In Contested Divorce Suit

Testimony was started Monday morning in district court on a contested divorce suit filed by Amanda Bolton, who lives three miles west of Buhl on U. S. highway 75, against Paris R. Bolton, route 3, Buhl.

Mrs. Bolton testified the couple was married Aug. 22, 1928, in Oregon.

She stated community property of the couple includes seven acres of land near Buhl with a house and chicken house; \$400 bank in the Farmers National Bank, Buhl; an unsum amount of U. S. government bonds; household and kitchen furniture, estimated at \$2,000; a 1937 pickup truck, estimated at \$500; a 1930 Buick car; a radio, a vacuum and farm machinery and equipment.

Mrs. Bolton seeks \$150 maintenance for the court action and \$150 permanent alimony plus costs of suit and attorney fees. She charges her husband with cruel and inhuman treatment, according to the complaint filed Sept. 3, 1948. The plaintiff further testified the couple sold 103 acres of land in the county filed Sept. 3, 1948. In February, 1948, she stated she had none of the community property but given her attorney, since the property was sold since their marriage on May 30, 1948.

Bolton testified he owned 180 acres of land near Buhl, which he sold at the time of the separation of the couple. Haystack and Rayburn, Buhl, and Lawrence B. Quinn are counsel for Bolton.
