Life of Retired Postmistress Reflects Years of Services to Her Community

BELEVEUE, June 6—What is probably the most familiar name in Bellevue? Daily association with mail hardware and groceries has given that distinction to Mrs. Maud Larsen, more specifically Mrs. Maud Larsen.

Even before 1882 the Larsens sold hardware here. In 1905 Mrs. Larsen's husband, the late Christie Peter Larsen, bought the grocery business and early this month she retired as postmistress, a position she held 15 years. A daughter became temporary postmistress.

Through the postoffice, store school and fraternal affiliations her family has been exceptionally active in community life. Longtime hospitably and the satisfaction of serving others mark the family's contribution to the community.

Early day former residents find a welcome in Mrs. Larsen's smile, and she has earned the affection and respect of the younger generation through her dealings with them at "Granna's" Maud's candy counter.

Since the death of her husband many years ago, she has run her little store and later the postoffice. Prior to that she gave a large number of teachers a real home in her own house.

Through the broad acquaintance natural to her work and because of her always cheerful readiness to serve, she has received many requests—often strange—for favors from former and present residents.

These include filling out forms to establish the age or status of her children, giving assistance in locating friends and relatives, having various inquiries but feel welcome and answering funeral notices requested to be "right."

Through all this activity Grandma Larsen has remained young, although her 87th birthday anniversary on May 16. It's just part of her spirit of serving others.

Mrs. Larsen came here as Maud Shepherd in 1899 from Montana with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. H. Shepherd. Her mother, affectionately known as Grandma Shepherd, died some years ago at 94, widely known both for her immaculate housekeeping and her stories of life in the Civil war period.

In June 1901 Maud Shepherd was married to Peter Larsen who had come from his native Denmark in 1862, at the age of 12 to join his brother, W. C. Larsen, hardware dealer here.

Peter Larsen was graduated from the Bellevue high school and was the first of the third generation of the family was graduated from the same school. After his graduation Larsen married his brother's in-law, the late Mrs. Maud Shepherd.

In 1909 he bought from Mik Andersen the building now owned and operated by his son, Ole Larsen. This was established in 1884 and has been continued in the same location since then. Five decades the original building and while it was being replaced on the same site business was conducted in a nearby tent.

Mrs. Larsen's home is the largest residence here and has the high ceiling and beautiful woodwork typical of the early days of this city. It is a lovely structure and beautifully grained doors and windows are a lovely sight.

Each year on Labor day old timers meet to reminisce about the "by mail" kindnesses of Mrs. Larsen's family. Many of the old timers are active in the community and civic projects. Many of the old timers are active in the community and civic projects.

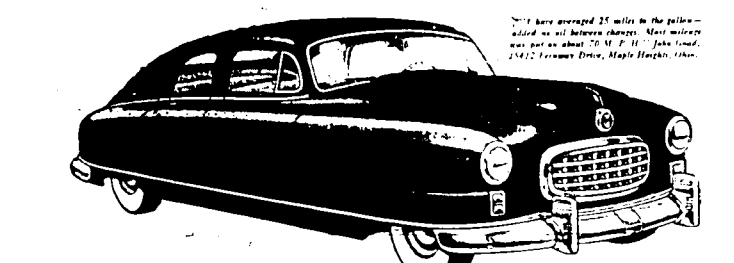
