WASHINGTON, June 9.—Secret FBI reports read today that communists planted a spy at the White Sands (N.M.) proving grounds for the Russian embassy in Mexico. The spy, identified as the alleged spy, was employed as a barber at the White Sands post exchange. It indicated that the spy was a failure. The FBI thought Chavez was a spy at Los Alamos, N. ### Solons Invent New Device on U. S. Sentiment

BY RICHARD ARNE  
AF Staffs Analyst  
Because Americans have been forced to take the war more seriously, Congress has invented an interesting new device.

"These times," Congress has voted merely to state the way the majority of the members want the nation to act in relation to other nations.

None of the three times that Congress voted in this manner has the actual words become a law. They weren't meant to.

We had Congress saying: "Look, this is the way we want our affairs to go, and this is the goal toward which we intend to work."

In the last few days 90 members of the house have proposed to use that device again. The full Congress must still approve.

First used in 1940  
Congress first used the device in 1940. France had fallen. We didn't know whether the Germans would grab the British or the Russians.

French coalition in the Caribbean  
and the United States would have to take the war to Europe.

Through this resolutions—the Pullbright (France) and Connally (Russia)—said the United States would not make a military commitment, and would take part in it.

Executive Order  
The United States was set up but it soon developed that the Russian bloc and the rest of the world couldn't get together on peace.

No last June the Senate passed the Vandenberg resolution.  
This went further than a mere statement of principle. It named specific steps to be taken to push in the United Nations. It was:

1. The veto dropped on some UN business.  
2. The U. S. to promote "regional arrangements"—such as the proposed North Atlantic pact.

3. The rest of the world to understand that the U. S. intended to act under these regional arrangements.  
4. Further efforts to set up a UN police force and to limit mass destruction weapons.

World Agency  
Now, a fourth time, a group of congressmen propose a reminder to the world that our own intention is a world agency that can prevent war.

"They want Congress to approve a simple expression of principle which may be used by the fundamental objective of the foreign policy of the United States to support and strengthen the United Nations, and to seek its development into a world federation, with limited and definite powers... not open to all nations."

What good are these resolutions?  
Clemson did star of the western hemisphere.

And since the debate on the Pullbright-Connally resolutions in 1943 this nation not only has entered a world organization but has taken a lead in it.

And since the Vandenberg resolution the U. S. government has ordered the North Atlantic pact the most powerful pact since regional arrangements "regional arrangements" the world has ever known. The pact still awaits final Senate approval, but it goes a tremendous way in the foreign relations committee.

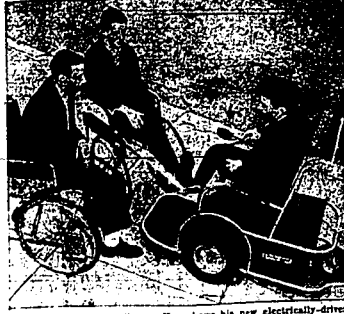

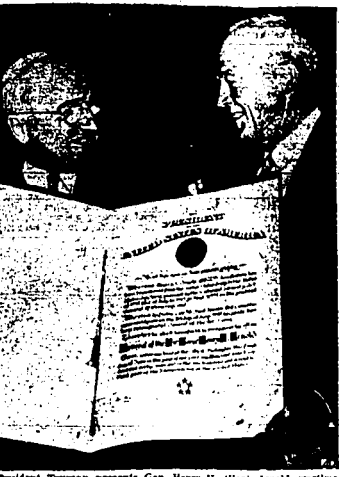

**Opponents Pour Cold Water On Truman's CVA Program**

By PETER EDSON

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Fancy streamlines are going on around here in connection with the Columbia Valley authority plan.

President Truman first tried to get senate and house to hold joint hearings on his pet bill to set up a CVA. He called Sen. Dennis Chavez, New Mexico and Cong. William M. Whittington, Mississippi to the White House to talk about it. They are chairmen of senate and house public works committees.

Whittington blocked joint hearings. He said his committee had so many other things to do it couldn't possibly get around to CVA before mid-June. Truth of the matter is that his committee is believed to be divided 14 to 13 in favor of CVA, though Whittington himself is against it. On the side, Whittington is vice president of the National Rivers and Harbors congress. This is a semi-official league in the powerful water lobby, which is opposed to all valley authority plans.

So it was left for Senator Chavez's committee to hold hearings first and alone. As near as can be figured out this senate "public works" committee has only two Democrats in favor of CVA—Chavez and Senator Sparkman, Alabama, a strong TVA man. The other six Democrats and all five Republicans—headed by Sen. Harry Cain, Washington—are against CVA. So it has no more chance than any snowball in June on capital hill. Nevertheless, the committee will go through the motions of holding CVA hearings.

President Truman's bill will be presented first. The hearings are held this week. That gives anti-CVA a week in which to prepare to give it the business during next week.

In the meantime, Chairman Whittington of the house public works committee has made a fast play of his own. On short notice, his committee held one-day hearings on what is known as the army corps of engineers-bureau of reclamation-Waver-Nevill plan for Columbia river development.

The record of the day's hearings reveals a good bulldozer technique. Nobody appeared who was opposed to the Weaver-Nevill plan. E. W. Rising, registered lobbyist for the National Water Conservation conference, seemed to be in charge. This NWCC has for its Columbia valley affiliate an outfit known as Pacific Northwest Development association. A recent audit of its books showed substantial contributions for the years 1945-46-47 from Idaho Power company, Washington Water company, Pacific Power and Light, Portland General Electric, and Northwest General Electric.

What this reveals is a privately-backed lobby opposing development of the Columbia valley authority plan. They all have a perfect right to do this, if that's the way they feel about it. But it's just as well to understand all the stunts, right out in the open.

**'Slot' Profits To Pay Tax In New City**

GARDEN CITY, June 8 (AP)—Slot machine operators in Garden City will get their license fees refunded, according to provisions of a resolution adopted by the village board of trustees last night.

The board of trustees, acting on motion of Don Chance, a board member, voted to refund the \$500 license fees required under the state slot-machine act to operators out of the first \$500 in profit made by each machine.

Thereafter, the machine operators and the city will split 50-50 the profit taken from each machine. Under state law no slot machine can be licensed for less than \$500, another \$125 to the state.  He wants federal control of the gas industry from the burner to your kitchen range. He also believes production and distribution of oil also should be under federal control.

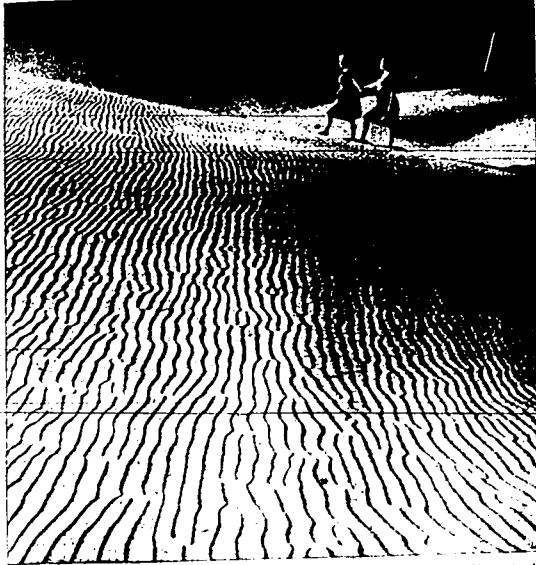

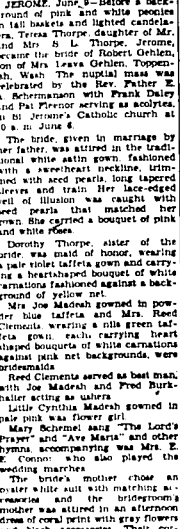

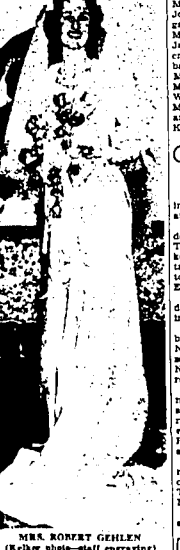

### Living Fence Being Tested In This Area

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, June 9.—Multiflora rose, the one that makes stock-proof fences and game-protecting fences, is being given a 1st chance to demonstrate its adaptability to Idaho. Thirty plantings have been made in 14 counties by the university agricultural extension division. They are scattered from the northern tip of the panhandle to the upper Snake river valley.

"There's quite a multiflora rose bloom on in the middle west," comments Vernon Ravencroft, the university's extension forester, in charge of the trials.

"I am particularly interested in the multiflora rose because a fence of it provides food shelter and predator protection for game birds," he said. One middle westerner reports to have distributed 3,000,000 plants to farmers for fence plantings.

"Three of the Idaho plantings are in Gooding county, Ravencroft reports. One planting each has been made in Jerome, Lincoln and Blaine counties.

"These plantings will tell us what types of Idaho soil are favorable to the multiflora rose and the areas where winter kill is likely," Ravencroft explains. All of the plantings are located so as to be visible demonstrations if they prove successful.

In many cases, the extension forester adds, local apartmenters have assisted the farmer and the university extension division in the planting. In addition to the plantings made by the university, the state fish and game department also has made several.

Following the dedication refreshments will be served by the wives of the small mine operators of Wood river valley, directed by Mrs. Leelle Lanning.

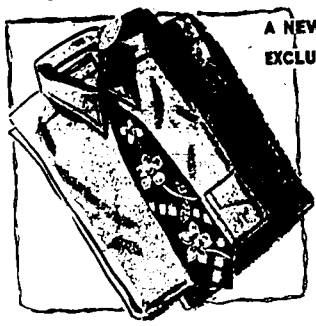

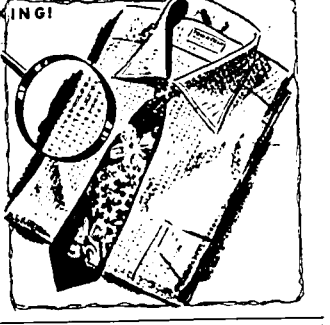

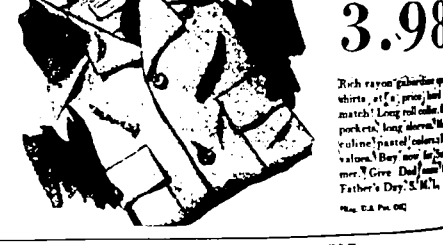
